The ceremony is not live, but the link to the virtual commencement will be made active at www.noc.edu Aug. 8 at 9:30 a.m.

The ceremony will celebrate Fall 2019 graduates as well as Spring and Summer 2020 graduates.

NOC is partnering with Fogarty Services to provide each graduate of the NOC Class of 2020 the opportunity to share and celebrate this milestone with supporters, family, friends, faculty and staff or fellow graduates through a personalized virtual commencement celebration.

Foster got his start in the college ranks at State Fair Community College where he served as an assistant coach under Missouri Hall of Fame coach, Bill Barton.



NOC adds wind energy classes






Hise reflected on his tenure as the athletic director.

NOC scholarship deadline is Aug. 25

Northern Oklahoma College is continuing to accept scholarship applications for Fall 2020.

The deadline for scholarship application is Aug. 25 for institutional and private NOC Foundation scholarships. To apply, simply enroll at NOC, apply for financial aid and then fill out the scholarship form at www.noc.edu/ scholarships.

For the 2019-2020 fiscal year budget, the college allocated \$2.7 million in scholarship support. These waivers and scholarships continue to assist our students with academic accomplishments and participation in college activi-

Additionally, through the NOC Foundation during the 2018-2019 academic year, the Foundation awarded over \$261,000 in scholarships to 392 recipients from the Tonkawa, Enid and Stillwater campuses. So far, this 2019-2020 academic year, we have awarded over \$288,000 in scholarships to students.

According to Sheri Snyder, Vice President for Development and Community Relations, "PLC and State Regents scholarships have already been awarded based on the February 20 deadline. However, priority deadline for all other scholarships, which began February 20, is ongoing with scholarships awarded to qualified applicants on a first come, first serve basis until August 25."
