Regents hold final meeting for 2020

The Northern Oklahoma College Board of Regents held their final meeting in 2020 Wednesday afternoon at the Renfro Center at NOC Tonkawa.

Wednesday's meeting was the final one for Vice President for NOC Enid Raydon Leaton. Leaton is retiring in Oklahoma and taking a new position in Florida.

Regent Chairman Jodi Cline thanked Leaton took their final exam Dec. 9. for his service to NOC.

"I just want to thank you for your years of service to NOC," Cline expressed to Leaton. "You will be missed by the faculty, staff, and students."

"It's been an honor and a privilege to serve NOC the past 20 years," Leaton said.

to offer the standard undergraduate astronomy course taken by 300,000 university undergraduates each year. NOC also developed standard 3-credit astronomy courses for students who are required to have seven credits of science for core requirements for those who may wish to pursue undergraduate astronomy degrees at OU and other American universities.

While at NOC, Osell has built one of the most care and maincomplete astronomy centers in Oklahoma. It has been used to conduct asteroid research for trees and flo-NASA programs enabling NOC undergraduate ra on campus students to work with community members. NOC students have also successfully utilized the observatory to track asteroids in partnership with the University of Arizona and other universities.

Osell was asked by Dr. Kinzer to build a planetarium. The Bert and Janice Mackie Planetarium on the Enid campus is one of the largest college planetariums in the United States. The planetarium is not only used for teaching it is also used to present shows to the general public. To date the astronomy center and planetarium have hosted over 25,000 visitors.

core samples in the science building which were part of the geological sample collection inherited from Phillips University. 
Tom Ellis
