

8th ranked Jets open season

The NOC Enid Jets opened the 2021 season Tuesday with an 8-7 win over Hutchinson (KS). The Jets won the NJCAA National Championship in 2019 and were 8-10 in an abbreviated schedule due to Covid-19 under head coach Scott Mansfield in 2020.

NOC Enid is ranked 8th in the pre-season NJ-CAA Division 2 poll.

"Overall, I feel really good about where we are



at this point in the year," Mansfield said. "As is the goal every year, we're looking to compete at an extremely high level and hopefully put ourselves in position to win some hardware at years end."

Mansfield said the Jets' strengths are a sophomore laden lineup and a talented young pitching staff.

Returning are infielders Ambren Voitik, Cale Savage, Kyle Bass, Brandon Lees, Gage Ninness, and catcher Jordan Coffey. Returning in the outfield are Connor Thaxton and Merek Hawthorne.

"I feel as our sophomore heavy offense and defense will be a big asset for us but we're also excited about our pitching staff that has youth but good tools and talent to give us a chance to win daily," Mansfield said. "The biggest strength though is our chemistry, this alone will take us a long way to achieve our goals."



Mavs open season ranked 3rd

The Northern Oklahoma College Mavericks Bartosovsky, and Bryant Bailey. opened the 2021 baseball season Tuesdayspliting a pair of games against Heston.

The Mavs, under 7th year head coach Ryan Bay, are ranked 3rd in the NJCAA pre-season poll.

The Mays were 23-4 last season when the season was canceled due to Covid-19.

"We've got a good group of guys that have dealt with Covid-19 and the restrictions really well," Bay said. "They've all made personal sacrifices to give our team a chance to play this spring."

Bay said depth of starting pitching should be a key for the Mays' 2021 season.

"Depth on the mound should be a strength if we can stay healthy," he said. "We return five of our top six arms from last season and have addsemester transfer."

Returning pitchers include Jacob Ellis, Jackie Robinson, Josh Bumgarner, Blake Hubbard, Kirby Lohrengel, Chase Defillippo, Zach Stephenson, and Clayton Solomon.

One of Bays' concerns is the lack of preparation time for the Feb. 2 opener.


Wood averaged 13 points in two NOC Enid contests.
