Donnie Jackson leaves Northern after eight years

Northern Oklahoma College Men's Basketball Coach Donnie Jackson resigned today accepting the same position at Cowley College in Arkansas City, Kansas.

Jackson's teams were 183-69 in eight seasons and earned two trips to the NJCAA National Tournament. This past season, the Mavs won the OCAC Title and the Region 2 Tournament. They lost to eventual NJCAA National Champion Coffeyville (KS) in the Elite Eight.

"Having the opportunity to make improvements and offer better standards of care, while challenging, is a passion," he says. "In the past, Indian healthcare has been viewed as substandard and behind the status quo, but tribes across the state are stepping up and showing out that we can play a vital role in being community partners and not only improving the lives of our citizens, but those around us."

Sherron was also a driving force in the White Eagle Health Clinic's determination in providing COVID-19 Vaccinations for Ponca Tribe members. The vaccinations began for Ponca Tribe members on Dec. 17 and eventually included area educators at Northern Oklahoma College, along with Tonkawa, Blackwell, and Ponca City Schools.

Sherron stays busy off the clock; he's an adjunct professor at both Northern Oklahoma College and Southwestern College, teaching business and humanities courses.

"Teaching is a passion of mine, and having Native American representation is critical with regard to faculty composition," he says.

On top of that, Sherron volunteers with the Ponca City Lions and serves on the Pawnee Nation Gaming Commission and the Ponca Enterprise Gaming Board. Sherron is father to six kids and enjoys coaching basketball, spending time with his wife and attending tribal events.





In the vice-president's update, Vice President for Student Affairs Jason Johnson reported that as of Friday, May 7, NOC had no COVID-19 cases and no contact tracing on any of the three Tonkawa. She also submitted a list of instruccampuses.

Vice President for Community Relations & Development Sheri Snyder reported that a new Pandemic Plan update would be upcoming as the college transitions to a more normal Fall 2021. She said that summer activities are being scheduled with day camps and other activities.

Dr. Pam Stinson, Vice President for Academic Affairs, thanked the regents for attending the commencement exercises on May 1 at Enid and tors for the 2021-22 school year.

Vice President for Financial Affairs Anita Simpson said that college officials have been holding budget meetings in preparation for the new fiscal year budget.

Simpson added that NOC is receiving \$7.7 million in CARES funds, \$3.9 million for direct disbursement to NOC students.

President Dr. Cheryl Evans updated the regents on the Yatika Starr Fields mural in the Cultural Engagement Center at NOC Tonkawa. The mural is nearing completion with an event planned in June for the permanent exhibit. This project was made possible with a private donation from Hugh Pickens.

Dr. Evans also said that incoming president Dr. Clark Harris will be on campus May 20-21 to tour and visit as the presidential transition continues.

The regents approved the Residential Rental Properties, Facility Rental Fees, and Faculty Usage Fees for Fiscal Year 2021-22.

Regents also approved the regents meeting dates for Fiscal Year 2021-22.

The Program Showcase for May was Vice President for Enrollment Management Dr. Rick Edgington who explained the college's new JRM system that allows the college to reach more potential students. He explained how the system sorts names from acquired lists for current high school students who wish to enroll concurrently and those attending college after high school. The next BOR meeting is Wednesday, June 16 at NOC Tonkawa.

Northern lifts mask mandate effective immediately and revises **Pandemic Protocols**

Northern Oklahoma College has updated the NOC Pandemic Plan effective immediately, according to school officials.

The college is lifting its mask policy mandate making masks no longer required, effective immediately. Exception: masks will be required in certain areas of health services. Although mask mandates for campus will no longer be in effect, community members may continue to voluntarily wear masks based on their own needs.

To continue campus safety, all NOC students, employees, and visitors are encouraged to maintain 3' social distancing, frequent handwashing, and continued cleaning and disinfecting routines.

The revised plan has relaxed some of the prior protocols as the College's most recent weekly reports have shown zero positive cases, those in the college community who wish to be vaccinated have had opportunity to do so, and state restrictions along with CDC guidelines have been adjusted recently.

The institution is making these transitions for the summer semester in hopes of providing a 2021 fall semester that is much more like students have enjoyed at NOC in years prior to this pandemic.

NOC will continue to monitor guidelines recommended by the CDC for recommended safety protocols in the workplace and classroom



and adapt as needed as it has since March, 2020, but desires to provide a "normal college experience" next fall for students.

Beginning Monday, May 17, campus facilities will also begin to reopen to the public for rentals allowing non-college events back on campus, i.e., civic club meetings, reunions, weddings, day camps, banquets. Food service and catering options will not be available this summer for external events.

In addition, the Wellness Center in Tonkawa will be open to the members of the public with paid memberships, employees, and students from 8:30 a.m. to 4:30 p.m. Monday through Thursday for the summer.

At the beginning of the Pandemic, NOC proactively froze all Wellness Center memberships when the center closed to the public and upon reopening, NOC will reactivate and extend existing memberships accounting for the time the facility was closed.

Summer camps will also once again be held on campus including the Girls' Basketball Camp and the Arts and Adventure Camp in Tonkawa. Those camps will be day camps, overnight camps will not occur this summer.
