The Northern Oklahoma College Maverick Softball team will kick off their season on Feb. 15, but for now, they are preparing big in the preseason.

The NOC Mavericks played well in their fall season, and are looking to continue perfecting their game, according to Head Coach Wilde-Green. “The team performed really well. We played top-level competition and competed in every game. Tulsa, UCO, and NSU are top-level programs in NCAA D1 and D2, we competed with them and beat some other D2s and NAIA programs. Overall, I knew we could develop more and be even better.”

The Mavericks take advantage of every opportunity to better their game. Practices consist of individual infield/outfield drills, such as glove work. Later the team comes together to work on different aspects of defense and then finishes up with batting practice.

Hard work is demonstrated on the field as well as off of it. They hit the weight room in the morning three days a week and run a mile every day before practice. Academically, the Lady Mavs stay on top of their grades by dedicating two nights a week for study hall.

“In the off-season, we spend a lot of time getting stronger and perfecting our crafts.” Coach Wilde-Green commented. “We focus on the small details and making changes where they are needed. Pre-season we are working on endurance, our mental game, and fundamentals. We believe that perfecting the small things will lead to big rewards.”

Last season, the Mavericks had a favorable regional tournament placing 3rd, however only the regional champion can advance to the national championship tournament. Returning all players from last year but one, as well as adding multiple talented freshmen, this team is ready to make some noise this season.

Expectations are high from this group of ladies with their end goal being a national championship. Coach Wilde-Green also has confidence in her team. “I expect them to compete, be good teammates, and win. We have a well-rounded team this year. I think our pitching staff will be tough to beat, our hitting should be one of the best lineups in conference, and defensively we have options.”
