Distinguished Alumni & Friends Reunion March 26

Northern Oklahoma College alumni Joe R. Kreger and Tara Tucker Vaughn will be inducted into the NOC Distinguished Alumni Hall of Fame March 26.

Joe Kreger, Class of 1959, and Tara Tucker Vaughn, Class of 1989, will be honored in ceremonies taking place during the NOC Alumni & Friends Reunion Dinner in the Renfro Center at NOC Tonkawa at 5:30 p.m.

The public is invited to the event and all NOC Alumni and Friends of the college are encouraged to attend, according to Kayla Wooderson, director of alumni and community relations. The deadline for reservations is March 7. Reservations are required; the \$20 payment for the dinner event may be paid in advance or at the March 26 event.

Also, the Classes of 1970, 1971, and 1972 will be honored at the event.

Joe R. Kreger, a native of Tonkawa, received his Associate of Science degree from Northern Oklahoma College in 1959 and his Bachelor of Science degree from Oklahoma State University in 1961.

Following his tenure at NOC and Oklahoma

State University, Kreger worked in administrative support positions in the purchasing and geophysics departments of Continental Oil Company while continuing to raise cattle.

Kreger left Continental Oil in the early seventies to establish Kreger Equipment, a state-wide wholesale livestock equipment business which he operated until 2001. Since that time, his efforts have been devoted to the cattle ranching enterprise.

At age 56, he began writing poetry born of life experiences. Often referred to as "Cowboy Poetry," his works were passed around, and requests for performances started to come in from farm and ranch organizations, schools and churches. This developed into a heavy speaking schedule that required travel from Texas to Nebraska and Iowa. For a number of years, Joe authored a poetry column in the "High Plains Journal." His

work has also been displayed in numerous other periodicals.

In 1988 Joe was appointed "Poet Laureate of Oklahoma" by Governor Frank Keating. He continued to perform poetry presentations for a number of years, but with the constraints of ranching and advancing age, he became somewhat inactive in poetry activities.

Then, in 2021, Governor Kevin Stitt appointed Joe to the Laureate position once more, making

him the first poet to have received this appointment twice, and by two different governors. Now, Joe is traveling across the state once more.

Kreger has been active in Christian Life Church for most of his life. He has taught Sunday School most of the time for a span of around fifty years and has served as Deacon, Elder and Trustee to the present time.

A graduate of Tonkawa High School, Vaughn earned her Associate Degree in Business Administration from Northern Oklahoma College in 1989. She went on to earn her Bachelor of Business Administration in Marketing at the University of Central Oklahoma and then earned a Master of Public Health at the University of Oklahoma Health Sciences Center.

Dr. Vaughn has practiced as a registered nurse for over 20 years and has served in the U.S. Army Reserve for over 28 years. Shortly after

joining the Army Reserve in 1993, she attended nursing school, eventually earning her PhD in Nursing from the University of Texas at Tyler in 2019. Dr. Vaughn currently serves as a registered nurse at the VA Eastern Colorado Health Care System working in the area of Community Care. She is also a Lieutenant Colonel in the Army Reserve where she is currently serving as a Public Health Nurse with the 350th Civil Affairs Command. She is board certified in Advanced Public Health Nursing.

Vaughn has taught in higher education as a Nursing Instructor for Delmar College ADN program and adjunct nursing faculty for Texas A&M Corpus Christi. Dr. Vaughn has also served as a full-time Clinical Assistant Profes-

or and Interim Director of Nursing for University of Houston at Victoria where she awarded the Johnson Foundation Endowed Professorship.

Vaughn currently resides in Centennial, Colorado. She is married to Cory Vaughn of 28 years and they have four amazing daughters: Madelyn, Sophia, Sarah, and Jaelyn. Her mother, Marion Tucker, served as a Vice President for Information Technology at NOC and currently resides in Blackwell, Oklahoma.

The event featured a number of selections from the Enid Community Choir and Praise Teams from the First Baptist Church and Grayson Baptist Church, both in Enid.

Also, Lakelin Kelley Hill read a poem, "We are America," while Lauren Kelly Hill and Johnny Campbell read letters to Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr. Elisha Ransom read a poem titled, "The Shot Meant to Silence."

NOC Instructor MaryAnn McCoy emceed the event while Vice President for NOC Enid Jeremy Hise introduced guests for the event.

NOC President Dr. Clark Harris closed the event congratulating the singers, dancers, and readers for their efforts on Saturday.

McCoy also read a list of African American contributions to the health and wellness industry.

Those contributions include the following;

Garrett A. Morgan invented the automat-

ed traffic signal in 1923. Morgan sold the rights to his patent to General Electric for \$40,000.

Frederick McKinley Jones invented the portable air conditioning unit used at military field hospitals in World War II. With the use of this invention, the military was able to store perishable, life-saving medicines and blood serum near the theater of battle, helping to save more lives. In 1935, Jones invented the first refrigerated truck.

Madam C.J. Walker was the first American woman to become a self-made millionaire. Her business was worth more than \$1 million at the time of her death in 1919. She developed hair care products and styling instruments specifically for the needs of black women.

Dr. Charles Drew discovered the technique of storing blood plasma. As a result of this discovery, the first blood bank was formed and many lives have been saved through transfusions of blood and blood products.

Granville T. Woods invented the multiplex telegraph in 1887, a device that allowed train dis-

patchers and engineers at various stations to communicate with moving trains. Prior to that, collisions were a huge problem. In 1889, he invented an automatic safety cutout for electric circuits.

In 1892, George T. Sampson received the first U.S. patent for a clothes dryer.

Richard Spikes, in 1913, invented automatic directional lights, which would eventually come to be known as automatic directional lights or turn signals.

Percy Julian developed a material known as "bean soup," a soy protein blend that extinguished gas and oil fires that could not be put out by water. This mixture saved the lives of countless sailors during times of war. In addition, athletes all over the world can thank him for the production of cortisone, which has eased the sufferings of millions.

Elijah McCoy invented the automatic oil cup, which lubricated a train's axles and bearings while it was in motion, leading to fewer stops and improved safety. It was a huge success that imitators soon tried to cash in. Engineers, though, continued to prefer McCoy's product. So, when purchasing the part, they'd ask for "the real McCoy," coining that expression.

In 1883, Jan Ernst Matzeliger developed a ma-

chine that would sew the sole to the upper of a shoe in about a minute. His "shoe lasting" machine changed the process of how shoes were made by automating this part of the process that previously was done by hand, thereby cutting the cost of making shoes in half.

In 1882, Lewis Howard Latimer invented a method of making carbon filaments for what became known as the electric incandescent lamp.

George Crum developed the potato chip in 1853.

Dr. Patricia Bath, an ophthalmologic surgeon, invented the Laserphaco Probe, a surgical tool that uses a laser to vaporize cataracts.

In 1892, Sarah Boone improved upon the 1858 ironing board. Her board featured a narrower and curved design, making it easier to iron garments, particularly women's clothing. Boone's design would morph into the modern ironing board that we use today.

Richard Spikes invented the automatic gearshift. Driving up a steep hill got a whole lot easier in 1932, thanks to this African American inventor.

Thomas W. Stewart invented the mop. He's kept us off our hands and knees since 1893.


Albert R. Robinson invented the electric trolley, which was the precursor to the rapid transit system of today.

Lady Mavs advance in Region Tourney

SHAWNEE, Oklahoma -- The NOC Tonkawa Lady Mavs rallied from 10 points down in the second half to beat NOC Enid 72-69 in the NJCAA Region 2 Quarterfinals at OBU in Shawnee.

The Lady Mavs trailed 58-49 heading into the final period but outscored NOC Enid 23-11 in the fourth quarter to earn the three-point win.

The Lady Mavs took their first lead since the first quarter on two Jordan Holman free throws with :58.6 left giving the Lady Mavs a 68-67 lead. After Enid took a 69-68 lead on two Jade Hazelbaker free throws, Holman made two free throws with :43 to give the Lady Mavs a 70-69 lead.

After getting a defensive stop, Shelby Rayner hit two free throws to give NOC a 72-69 lead.

NOC Tonkawa then got one more defensive stop to win the game 72-69.

Jordan Holman led the Lady Mavs with 27 while Shelby Rayner added 13 and Travisha Cogdell 11.

Addie Trent had eight rebounds and four steals for the Lady Mavs while Jatalyah Williams had four assists.

For NOC Enid LaKysia Johnson led the Lady Jets with 17 points while Aleisha Hester added 15 and Jade Hazelbaker 11.

Hester added 10 rebounds and four assists while Tegan Jones had four assists and Libbi Zinn four steals.

The Lady Mavs trailed NOC Enid 36-31 at half. Holman led Tonkawa NOC with 11 first half points while LaKysia Johnson led the Lady Jets with 10 first half points.

The Lady Mavs lost both regular season contests to the Lady Jets.

The Lady Mavs (13-14) face top seed Eastern Friday at 1 p.m. at OBU.

Jets upset Mavs in region tournament

The NOC Enid Jets upset NOC Tonkawa in a thrilling 82-75 double overtime Region 2 Quarterfinal game Thursday at OBU in Shawnee.

The Jets (12-18) now face Seminole in the Region 2 Semi-Finals at 8 p.m. Friday.

NOC Enid forced overtime on two free throws by Jlynn Counter with :00.4 left in regulation tying the score at 64-64.

Then, the Mavs forced a second overtime when Cam Malray dunked home a missed shot at the buzzer forcing an extra five minutes with the score tied 73-73.

NOC Enid dominated the second overtime outscoring the Mavs 9-2 earning the seven point victory.

NOC Enid was led by Quentin Harvey with 25 points while Jlynn Counter added 18 and Dakota Joachim 10. Jamarion Butler led the Jets with 10 rebounds while Counter had three steals.

Fede Federiko led the Mavs with 18 points and 15 rebounds while Nick Cham added 12 points and Cashius McNeilly 10. Cam Malray added 11 rebounds for the Mavs.

NOC Enid led the Mavs 27-25 at half.

For the game, the Jets shot 38% while the Mavs shot 39%. The Jets shot 65% from the line while the Mavs shot 60%.

The Mavs were the top seed entering the tournament while the Jets were the #8 seed.


The Mavs ended their season at 21-8.
