DMI's six graduating students will be showcasing their creative skills in Maya, After Effects, Photoshop, Premiere Pro, and much more.

Visitors are welcome to take a tour, watch demo reels, talk to the students, and enjoy traditional free ice cream floats.

DMI Director Brad Matson said, "The goal of DMI is to equip students with the knowledge and skills necessary to gain employment in the field of advanced computer graphics. The two-year program focuses on artistic techniques using today's technology. DMI students learn to transform their ideas and concepts into numerous facets of digital media, including 3D modeling, texturing, animation, motion capture, game environment and asset creation, visual effects, motion graphics, graphic design, digital filmmaking, video editing, and audio enhancement."

"This is a great opportunity to expand the awareness to potential employers as well as in-

troducing companies to a talent pool of educated, creative, and driven artists, in addition to exposing talented prospective students to the DMI program and the local educational facilities," Matson added.

DMI will also be hosting the 14th Annual Epic Shorts Student Film Festival at 4 p.m. in the Wilkin Theatre.

Seven short movies will be screened that afternoon including Killing Crows, an animated short from DMI Graduate and SCAD student, Jason McNaughton. His film won the overall Best Film at the 1st Annual Tonkawa Film Festival two years ago

"The film crew handles all the writing, directing, lighting, sound, and the three phases of production. This will be the best festival with quality of films since I started this festival," Matson said.

NOC Rocket Team in Wisconsin

The Northern Oklahoma College Rocket Team is participating in the 13th Annual First Nations Launch (FNL) High-Power Rocket Competition as part of NASA's Wisconsin Space Grant Consortium in Kansasville, Wisconsin, April 22-24.

Dr. Frankie Wood-Black, Chair of the NOC Engineering, Physical Science and Process Technology Division and mentor for the team, indicated that NOC's involvement stemmed from a request by the Team Leader Phillip Prairie Chief, a recipient of an AISES scholarship after he attended the annual AISES meeting last October, where he learned about the competition.

"Phillip was so excited when he came back from the meeting and told me about the opportunity," Dr. Wood-Black said. "He asked if this

was something that NOC could do, and I said if he got a team together, yes!"

"Within a few days, we had applied, pulled a team together and, with the help of the Wisconsin Space Grant Consortium (WSGC), found mentors that could help the team through the steps required to participate," she added.

NOC's team is leaving for Wisconsin on Thursday, April 21, and will participate in workshops and other events culminating in a final presentation and an award ceremony during the weekend's events.

Team members include Phillip Prairie Chief, Team Leader, Kaylyn Marr, Nicole Simpson, Kaylyn Marr, Rachael Chatterji, Timothy Edwards, and Megan Pickering. The team has

been supported by mentors from Tulsa Rocketry, Brien Wood and Hal Ellis.

This competition is for students attending a Tribal College or University, a Native American-Serving Nontribal Institution (NASNTI), or who are members of an active American Indian Science and Engineering Society (AISES) collegiate chapter. Teams compete to design, build, and fly a high-powered rocket to be launched as part of the spring event in Kansasville, WI.

There are three competitions, Mars, Moon and Gateway. Teams from around the country will be participating including teams in the Mars and Moon competitions from the University of Washington, the University of Hawaii, University of California, Davis, and the University of Colorado, Boulder.

NOC will be competing with Tribal Colleges in the Gateway competition.

Dr. Wood-Black says that this has been a great experience for the students and is excited to see that students are getting to participate in an event that has a national reach.

“This is what makes NOC such a great place,” she said. “Our students can come in an suggest an opportunity and we can run with it.”

The WSGC Collegiate Rocket Competition is intended to supply teams of affiliated university students with the opportunity to demonstrate engineering and design skills through direct

application.

Student teams will be required to design, construct and fly a high-power, one-stage rocket that, following apogee, will be recovered safely and in flyable condition, predict the rocket's flight performance.

Each competition, Gateway, Moon, and Mars, has slightly different parameters, with the most complex being that the rocket having to collect down-looking on-board video and include an avionic system that will actively minimize rocket roll-rate and monitor the rocket's performance throughout the flight.

NOC is participating in the entry level competition with plans to participate in the Moon competition next year, as the NOC students have enjoyed their participation.

The competition to date has included a series of design milestones, presentations, and tests. The students have built a rocket named “Quixote's Quest” that they will fly during the competition during the weekend of April 22, 2022, in Wisconsin. Several of the Team members will also be attempting their Level 1 High-Power Rocketry certification during the launch weekend.

Team members Phillip Prairie Chief and Megan Pickering achieved their Level 1 certifications earlier this year as part of the Launch 2 Learn program associated with WSCG.

NOC students attend OKP Day

Students, faculty, representatives from Oklahoma's public colleges and universities, and other supporters gathered at the state Capitol Wednesday to show appreciation for the Governor, Legislature and state Board of Equalization's ongoing support of the Oklahoma's Promise scholarship program and to encourage legislators to continue to fund the program.

To kick-off the event, Mike Jackson, Executive Director, Legislative Office of Fiscal Transparency and Jeff Peters, Chief of Staff, Oklahoma State Senate spoke to Oklahoma's Promise students about the significant positive impact of the scholarship in their lives.

Oklahoma's Promise was created in 1992 by the state Legislature to help more Oklahoma families send their children to college.

"Since 1992, more than 100,000 qualified Oklahoma students have earned the opportunity to pursue higher education through the Oklahoma's Promise scholarship program," said Chancellor Allison D. Garrett. "These are students who committed to take rigorous academic course work and earn good grades. In

return, they were promised a scholarship to pay their college tuition. Thanks to Governor Stitt and our legislators' continued support of the Oklahoma's Promise scholarship, we're keeping that promise."

Nationally recognized as one of the country's best college access programs, Oklahoma's Promise is a transformational model that combines emphases on academic preparation and financial support for college. The scholarship program pays tuition at any Oklahoma public college or university until the student receives a bachelor's degree or for five years, whichever comes first. It will also cover a portion of tuition at an accredited Oklahoma private institution or for certain public career technology programs. The scholarship does not cover the cost of fees, books, or room and board.

To be eligible, students must apply during the eighth, ninth, tenth or 11th grade, and their family's annual income must not exceed \$60,000 when they apply. A student's family in-

During the current academic year, approximately 14,000 students are expected to receive the scholarship in college. Approximately 14,000 students are also projected to receive the scholarship next year.

For the high school graduating class of 2021, over 6,300 students met the program require-

ments to earn the scholarship.

By law, the program has a dedicated funding source that helps ensure the program is fully funded each year.
