

Ballard, Ging, Bolz honored as Best Faculty for 2022

Northern Oklahoma College faculty Cathy Ballard, DeLisa Ging, and Matt Bolz were named Best NOC Faculty for 2022 at the employee service awards meeting last Friday in Tonkawa.

Ballard is a math instructor at Tonkawa, Bolz is an agriculture/biological science instructor at Enid while Ging is a language arts instructor at Enid.

Candidates were chosen based on student comments through campus surveys.

Vice President for Academic Affairs Diana Watkins said that though these three faculty were recognized, other faculty received positive comments from students.

"We're fortunate to have outstanding faculty and staff at Northern," Watkins said. "Our students responded to the survey concerning who had helped them learn the best at NOC by saying wonderful things about almost everyone who teaches a course."

Watkins is currently the Vice President for NOC Stillwater and has also served as the interim Vice President for Academic Affairs since Dr. Pam Stinson left NOC in December 2021. As vice president for academic affairs, she will continue to serve as a member of the NOC Executive Council.

Reporting directly to the president, Watkins will be responsible for providing an institution-wide vision, leadership and strategic direction for academic programs. In her position, she will provide oversight and leadership for all functions of academic affairs for the college, a

multi-campus institution. Watkins will work closely with the president, other vice presidents, academic division chairs and program directors to facilitate the overall mission of the college and provide the vision and leadership that promote and support a commitment to academic achievement, excellence in instructional methodology, assessment of teaching and learning and student success.

Watkins, a doctoral student in Oklahoma State University’s Higher Education and Student Affairs Program, is a proud graduate of Perry High School and the Oklahoma State University Honors Program. She began her tenure at the NOC/OSU Gateway Program in 2005

After joining the Language Arts Department full-time in 2007, she was chosen the Distinguished Faculty Member for NOC Stillwater in 2009 and was named Vice President for NOC Stillwater in March of 2019.

Watkins has been an active member of the NOC community, serving on a number of committees and as sponsor of the NOC Stillwater President's Leadership Council. Extremely passionate about student success, Watkins served on the task force that developed NOC's First Gen Mentor Program, a program designed to assist students who are the first in their families to attend college. Watkins currently serves as a liaison for NOC's involvement with the Pedagogy, Advising and Curricular Excellence (PACE) Project and chairs the committee on recruitment and retention for NOC's 2019-2025 Strategic Plan. She has traveled with NOC students to Washington, D.C., to Europe on a number of short-term study tours and has taught on short-term residential programs in London, England and Dublin, Ireland. Watkins developed the NOC Honors Program in an ef-

fort to facilitate the successful transfer of NOC students into the OSU Honors College. She has presented at numerous conferences, including the National Association of Developmental Education Conference and the National Collegiate Honors Council Conference.

A graduate of Leadership Stillwater Class XX-VIII, Watkins serves on the Stillwater Public Education Foundation Board of Trustees, the Stillwater Chamber of Commerce Board of Directors, and as a mentor for the Oklahoma State University Honors College. Watkins enjoys practicing yoga, running, reading, world travel, writing, and attending concerts and theatre performances.

"As the daughter of someone who's life trajectory was positively impacted by a community college, and as someone who has spent the past 17 years witnessing the positive effect NOC faculty and staff have on students, I am thrilled to take on this role in Academic Affairs. Regents discuss youth aviation program at NOC Enid campus

A new aviation program for youth is coming to the Northern Oklahoma College Enid campus. NOC Enid is partnering with Redtail Youth – Making a Difference. The partnership would provide a facility for Redtail Youth – Making a Difference in a building located on the north-west corner of the NOC Enid Campus, that has been unoccupied for a number of years. The Northern Oklahoma College Board of Regents approved a grant application for replacement of the heating/cooling system for the building.

Vice President for Enid Jeremy Hise said the non-profit has been looking for a facility to house their aviation program. The non-profit would renovate the building to house program events. The aviation program partners with Vance Air Force Base, Woodring Airport, Enid Schools, and Autry Technology Center.

Board members also discussed a number of projects over \$25,000 detailed by Anita Simpson, Vice President for Financial Affairs. Those projects include Professional Design Services for the P-Tech Building at NOC Tonkawa, Repairs of the NOC Enid Primary Monument Sign, Sewer Line Repair at Markley Hall at NOC Tonkawa, Document Imaging Maintenance and Support, Desktop Computers for Tonkawa and Enid libraries, Microsoft Licenses, New Telephone Services/Equipment, and Printing Services Equipment.

In administrator updates, Vice President for Academic Affairs Diana Watkins reported that Enid Language Arts Instructor Dr. Paul Bowers recently had a book published, his third book of poetry, *Ten Acres of the Universe*. She also reported that the NOC Rocket Team enjoyed their trip to Wisconsin and was the winner of the Outreach Award.

Vice President for Community Relations &

Development Sheri Snyder reported that four finalists were selected for the Daisy Award, a new award for nursing faculty to be given at the NOC Nurses Pinning Saturday night at NOC Enid. The four finalists are Robin Baird, Kim Brewer, Marie Head, and Tricia Michaelis.

Anita Simpson, Vice President for Financial Affairs, said her office has refunded \$1.9 million to NOC students in HEERF Funds (Financial Aid Refunds) related to the COVID-19 Pandemic.

Vice President for Enrollment Management Dr. Rick Edgington reported that summer and fall enrollment is underway adding he is cautiously optimistic about enrollment for summer and fall. He added that enrollment management staff members have been visiting schools and enrolling students at off-campus locations to ease the enrollment process.

Jason Johnson, Vice President for Student Affairs, reported that Bo Charboneau from NOC Tonkawa and Slater Eck from NOC Enid were named the student athletes of the year. Charboneau is a baseball player for the Mavs while Eck is a softball player for the Jets.

Vice President for Enid Jeremy Hise reported that he is working with the Enid Public Schools on a pathway for students to take courses at NOC Enid as part of a new program called “Early 30.” NOC is also partnering with Enid Schools in a program that would allow EHS students to earn an Associates of Arts while attending high school.

President Dr. Clark Harris discussed the NOC Tonkawa Library remodeling project. Harris also shared that Diana Watkins has been selected as the new Vice President of Academic Affairs.

The next board meeting is at the Gantz Center on the NOC Enid campus May 18 at 1 p.m.

Northern Oklahoma College Regents Brad Fox, Ponca City, and Jason Turnbow, Enid, were appointed by Gov. Kevin Stitt to serve on the NOC Board of Regents on Thursday, May 12.

Fox and Turnbow were appointed by Gov. Stitt after approval by the Oklahoma State Senate.

Fox's appointment was carried by Sen. Bill Coleman (R) from Ponca City while Turnbow's

appointment was carried by Sen. Roland Pederson (R) from Burlington.

Turnbow, who succeeded Stanley Brownlee, will serve through June 30, 2025. Fox, who succeeded Dale DeWitt, will serve the remainder of DeWitt's term through June 30, 2022, and then a five-year term through June 30, 2027.



Scott Carter speaks to graduates

Northern Oklahoma Students at all three campuses went through graduation exercises at the 116th Annual Commencement Saturday in Tonkawa and Enid.

A total of 536 graduates earned degrees at the two ceremonies.

NOC Vice President for Academic Affairs Diana Watkins opened the ceremony, congratulating the students on reaching their goals for graduation and persevering during a pandemic. She also announced students that maintained a 4.0 GPA and those that earned two degrees.

She also introduced the Flag Bearers for each academic division.

President Dr. Clark Harris introduced special guests at the ceremony and then presented the class for the conferring of degrees.

The speaker for the ceremony was M. Scott Carter, a NOC Distinguished Alumni.

Carter congratulated the students for perse-

vering during the pandemic.

"I was in exactly the same place you are 39 years ago," he said. "It takes bravery and courage to be where you are today. Earning a college degree is challenging under any circumstances but you did it during a pandemic."

Carter spoke of musician Chuck Berry and Bartlesville librarian Ruth Brown who showed bravery and courage in the 1950's. Berry wrote what at the time were controversial lyrics to the song "Johnny B. Goode" while Brown believed in equality for all who wanted to use library services.

"Today, people remember Ruth Brown and Chuck Berry for their courage and bravery but no one remembers their critics," he said.

He also challenged the graduates to make a difference and show bravery and courage in their everyday lives.

The NOC Concert Band performed the Armed Forces Salute and the college choir performed Oklahoma Rising. After the candidates for graduation were announced, the college choir performed NOC's Alma Mater.

Enid and Stillwater graduates went through exercises at NOC Enid in the afternoon while Tonkawa students went through exercises in Tonkawa in the morning.
