






Northern Oklahoma College Tonkawa is providing free basic income tax return preparation for students, NOC employees, and area residents starting Feb. 2 at NOC Tonkawa.

Singles or families making less than \$60,000 per year qualify for the free service.

Trained tax preparers from the NOC Business Division and area volunteers will be available for tax assistance beginning Thursday, Feb. 2. Taxpayers also have an option to prepare their only. The Cultural Engagement Center (CEC) is hosting the Volunteer Income Tax Assistance (VITA) program every Thursday through April 13. The CEC will be closed March 13-17 for spring break and for inclement weather. The CEC is located in the library in the Vineyard Administration/Library building.

Interested parties need to bring a photo ID for all filers; Social Security cards and birthdates for taxpayer, spouse, and dependents; W-2 forms; 1099 forms; receipts for childcare costs, education expenses, and other deductions; checking account and routing number for refund; and 1095-A, -B, or -C healthcare coverage or exemption.

Tax preparation is done by appointment Tax preparers are available from 5 p.m. - 8 p.m. Cara Beth Johnson, Business division chair No drop off's will be accepted, individuals must be present during tax preparation.



A reception with the artists is scheduled for Saturday, Feb. 4 from 3 p.m. – 4 p.m. and it is open to all.

Schmitz curated the exhibition with a vision of recognizing and celebrating the quality and diverse styles of art being produced by educators. A "teaching artist" is defined as a practicing professional artist who has a dual career as an educator and who may work in many settings, from schools and art centers to hospitals and online venues.

Over 65 works of art include oil, watercolor and acrylic painting, digital imagery and photography, monoprints, pastels, mixed-media sculpture, ceramics and jewelry. Styles range from realistic subject matters to fantasy and expressive abstract works. All of the artists demonstrate technical mastery and experimentation with media and reveal a shared celebration of color. Viewers will find the diverse works strategically grouped to create visual experiences capitalizing on related properties of color, line, shape and composition. The majority of the art is available for purchase.

The NOC Mavs Baseball Team opens the season this weekend hosting a four-game series against Des Moines Area Community College.

First pitch is noon Saturday and Sunday.

Coach Ryan Bay enters his ninth season at the Maverick helm.

"There's a lot to like about this team," Bay said. "We've got good balance offensively with several quality hitters from both sides of the plate and some guys with some pop that will hit for power as well as some speed guys that can set a table for us."

"Our pitching staff continues to improve each week. If we can stay healthy on the mound we'll be very competitive in Region 2."

What does Bay see as his team's strengths in 2023.

"We're pretty balanced at the plate and on the mound in terms of lefty/righty matchups. That should give us an advantage matching up with how teams try to line up with us this spring," he said. This will be one of the better hitting teams we've had in the past 2-3 years."

As with any team, health is a key concern.

The first base and designated hitter duties will start with Cade Tucker and Enrique Alvarez, Jr. seeing duty at both. Second base will start 2023 with a Jorge Olive and Matt Stancliff platoon.
