



Northern Oklahoma College Tonkawa is providing free basic income tax return preparation for students, NOC employees, and area residents starting Feb. 2 at NOC Tonkawa.

Singles or families making less than \$60,000 per year qualify for the free service.

Trained tax preparers from the NOC Business Division and area volunteers will be available for tax assistance beginning Thursday, Feb. 2. Taxpayers also have an option to prepare their own basic federal and state tax return using the free e-filing software.

Scholarship deadline Feb. 21


Northern Oklahoma College is continuing to accept scholarship applications for Fall 2023.

Earn four credit hours of lab science through Northern Oklahoma College's Botany course, offered in the beautiful and fascinating country of Belize. The coral reef, the ocean, the islands and rainforests will serve as your science lab as you explore and study the neo-tropical ecosystems of this Central American country.

Students are required to take the following class during the summer semester for a total of 4 semester credit hours.

- BIOL 1314 (N, L) Introductory Plant Biology (Instructor: Mary Gard) covers the basic principles of plant biology, with emphasis on adaptations to tropical ecology. Appropriate laboratory work and demonstrations to implement the fundamental principles and concepts learned in theory. This course will transfer to Oklahoma State University as PBIO 1404, a natural and laboratory science (N, L).
- This is an early summer session class, with pre- and post-program assignments required.

COST: Approximately \$3,380* (\$4,282 non-resident). Includes airfare, lodging, most meals, airport transfer in Belize, all required activities, primary medical and travel insurance, incountry transportation, expert local guide and driver, study abroad t-shirt, and and four credit hours of lab science college credit (L/N). Student will be responsible for Oklahoma airport transfers, money for lunches and snacks, passports, \$25 for guide/driver tips, and miscellaneous expenses.

A \$740 non-refundable deposit in the Fall of 2022 or the Spring of 2023 (if not sold out) will be applicable to in-country program costs. A second payment of \$1,930.40 will be due in the Spring 2023 semester; *\$709.60 tuition will be due in Summer 2023.



*Out-of-state tuition of approximately \$1,611.60 will be applicable for the tuition costs only.

Jets' baseball opens Saturday

The NOC Enid Jets open the season Saturday at David Allen Memorial Ballpark against Northeast Nebraska for doubleheaders on Saturday and Sunday.

"Every start to a baseball season has excitement and potential so this year isn't much different," said coach Scott Mansfield. "We're ready to get going, ready to be in the same dugout competing for the ultimate goal. Think we have some good talent, good depth but more importantly, this group seems really close which gives a lot of hope to the upcoming five months."

Mansfield said the Jets are going to be young in 2023 but NOC Enid does return three weekend rotation pitchers in Zach Roden, Jack Cline, and Robert Dibrell.

"We have some experience and maturity on the mound and both offensively and defensively," he said.

"We are young and inexperienced," he added.
"We have a lot of young pups that we are going to rely on this year so we'll see how they develop as the year goes along."

Region 2 is always a challenge and Mansfield said this year is no different.

"I think this region is one of the toughest in the nation and this year will be no exception," he said. "I think the region just keeps growing with talent throughout Oklahoma and Arkansas and the additions of new teams over the years keeps the region very balanced and competitive top to bottom, every weekend series will be tough." The tentative lineup for the Jets is Mason Poppen and Jase White at catcher, Nathan Gutierrez at first base, Conner Duncan and Kade Goeke at second base, Sammy Harris at shortstop, and Ty Chapman at third base. The outfield includes Zane Chavez, Solomon James, and Owen Tracy and Brayden Bock at designated hitter.

The weekend rotation includes Roden, Cline, Dibrell, and Cameron Ebert while the back end of the pen will be Jesse Slimp and Josh Rains.



Coach Megan Hill, starting her 4th year at NOC Enid, is excited for 2023.

"We are super excited for this season," Hill said. "There is a different feel and a different atmosphere than what we have had in the past." What are the strengths of the 2023 Jets' team?

Region 2 is always tough but Hill thinks it's wide open this year.

"The region this year I believe is up in the air for anybody to take," Hill said. "We have one of the toughest regions top to bottom in the nation but I truly believe our region is so talented, it will be a very competitive season.

Pitching is always a key and Hill believes in her staff. She said the Jets won't have a specific pitching rotation, we don't have a specific order, but will be use four as starters/relievers and one as a late relief/closer.


"As we move through season they may filter into more individualized roles as starters or relievers but as of right now we have four that will be starting," she said. The rotation will be designed in a way to give days off in order to
