The NOC Livestock Judging Program had success before Bedwell's arrival but now those top ten finishes are now championship finishes.

"I believe NOC can always attract the type of student/livestock judger that can compete on a national level," she said. "We have proven it at Northern this year and I think we can stay competitive on the national stage."

NOC Graduation set for May 6

The spring semester is quickly coming to an end and for those completing their degrees here at Northern in May or July, it is time to start preparing for graduation.

It is important that students talk to their advisors to ensure they have met all the requirements to receive their degree or are on track too. Students who plan to graduate are required to submit a free application for graduation, which can be found by logging into myNOC and selecting the students tab. The application is three pages: your address, your degree and plan to graduate, and a review. If submitted properly, students should receive an email from the Registrar office.

Once those steps are completed there are a few more things to do. Graduates caps and gowns will be available for pick up in the bookstore starting April 24. If the regalia needs to be sent to Stillwater or the University Center, an appli-

cation to do so can be found on the bookstore's website.

The Tonkawa bookstore will be open for pick up the Saturday, May 6 of graduation at 8 a.m. Graduation announcements are for sale now in the bookstore.

Graduates must attend one virtual commencement practice on May 3 or May 4 at 3 p.m. The zoom link to these practices will be available on the website one week prior. It should not last longer than an hour. Students will need to meet at the NOC cafeteria in Tonkawa at 8:30 a.m. the morning of graduation. Further instructions and details can be found in the commencement letters on the school website.

Begin the college transfer process

Northern Oklahoma College in Tonkawa hosted a "College Transfer Fair" for sophomores planning on attending a four-year University next year. Oklahoma State University, University of Central Oklahoma, Northwestern Oklahoma State University, Wichita State University, Oklahoma University, Tulsa University, and Southwestern Oklahoma State University were all in attendance with an abundance of information for students.

In case you missed it here is some basic information to know for the transfer process.

Research the College

Before applying to a university do some research on the campus. On any college's website, there should be a list of all degrees they offer to students. Taking a glance at the different programs can ensure they have what you're looking for. Some Universities have certain criteria to be accepted such as GPA so be sure to double-check. Most universities offer campus tours that are available before the application process. If the campus is close in location, you may want to attend a tour before deciding to apply. Get as much information as you can to confirm the college is the right fit for you.

Apply Online

Once you've decided where you would like to attend, fill out the application. Most colleges and universities have an online application that is located on their website. The applications will

require your basic information, but some may ask for an additional step such as an essay or short answer question. Most colleges and universities require an application fee so be prepared to pay a small sum of money.

Submit Transcripts/FAFSA

In addition to the application, universities will require transcripts from NOC or any other transcript with college credits. They will also require a FASFA to be submitted and sent. The 2023-2024 FASFA forms are available online to be filled out. If you are having trouble filling out the FASFA forms, or have questions, please visit the Financial Aid Office located in the Administration building on the Tonkawa campus.

After Admission

Once the application and all other forms are filled out and sent to the university, an email will be sent for your possible acceptance. In that email, there will be instructions on your next steps, as far as orientation, enrollment, and applying for housing. Make sure to check your email for any information the college needs you to know.

The transfer process can be overwhelming but there are faculty at Northern Oklahoma College who are willing to help. Contact your advisor or someone in the administration building to help get the transfer process started. If you have already applied and have been accepted, make sure you are checking your email for important dates and information.

Mavs softball and Mavs baseball hosts NOC Enid in games this week.


Mavs softball hosts the Jets Thursday, April 13 at 2 p.m. The Mavs and Jets split two games in Enid last month.

Holman was also named the Region 2 Player of the Year.


Baseball, softball review
