NOC Tonkawa Livestock Judging Team of the Year

NOC is National Junior College Livestock Judging Team of the Year.

A title earned by the Northern Oklahoma College Livestock Judging Team after being named the High Team Overall at the Houston Livestock Show and Rodeo March 19.

This is the first time in school history that NOC has been named National Junior College Team of the Year.

The NOC team, under the direction of coach Jennifer Bedwell, won four national livestock

judging events including High Team at The American Royal (Kansas City), North American International Livestock Exhibition (Louisville), The National Western (Denver) and the Houston Livestock Show and Rodeo (Houston).

In addition, NOC judges Anna Hannon, Kale Campbell, Olivia Gerloff, and Cooper Thompson were recognized as All-Americans.

"This was an amazing year with an amazing

Northern Oklahoma College Livestock Judging Coach Jennifer Bedwell has been named the National Junior College Livestock Judging Coach of the Year.

Bedwell, in her third year at NOC, earned the award after leading the NOC Livestock Judging Team to its first Team of the Year recognition after the Houston Livestock Show and Rodeo on March 19.

Bedwell's team also had four All-Americans including Anna Hannon, Olivia Gerloff, Kale Campbell, and Cooper Thompson.

"I am so blessed to have coached these kids," Bedwell said. "They are the hardest working kids I've seen and the fact that I received an award for their hard work is more a reflection of who they are than who I am. They earned all the accolades and I was just fortunate to be with them."

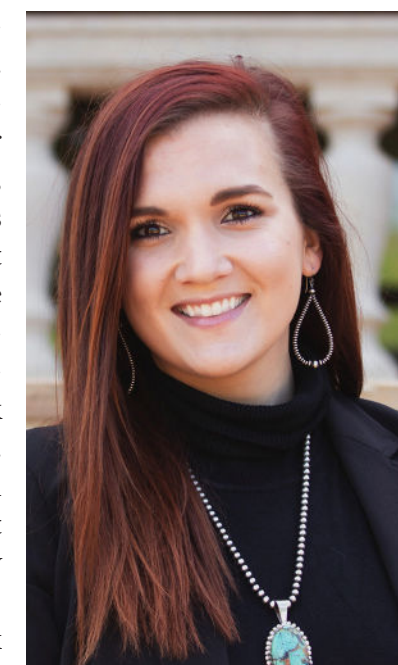
Interestingly enough, Bedwell never judged in high school at Fairview, Oklahoma. She came in as an "in-house" judging contestant at Oklahoma State University in the fall of 2016. In the span of a year and three months, with the help of her coaches, she taught herself the evaluation skills and oral reasons format in order to be competitive.

In November of 2017 the team from OSU was named the 2017 National Champion Livestock Judging Team and Bedwell was named Fourth

High Individual Overall. Upon graduating with her undergrad, she worked as the assistant coach for the 2019 National Champion Livestock Judging Team. She began working at NOC in May of 2020.

Just over six years after her first set of oral reasons, Bedwell was named the first ever female to win "Junior College Livestock Judging Coach of the Year." Along with this honor, Bedwell was the first recorded female coach to win The American Royal, The North American International Livestock Exposition and The National Western.

"I can't imagine where I would be had I not

given that first set of reasons and turned in that first judging card in practice, but my life has forever been changed,” she said.

“It is amazing what Jennifer has achieved in such a short period of time,” said NOC President Clark Harris. “From the very beginning, I could see the drive that she has to compete at a high level. A drive that she has instilled into her team. Coach Bedwell is an excellent mentor to her team and has been able to shape her team through work. That demanding work probably included listening to thousands of sets of reasons. This work has paid off as they were usually first or second in oral reasons in each competition.”

“I am pleased that she chose to coach at NOC. I am also delighted that she has recruited such talented young people, with excellent character. She and her students are a joy to be around, as they demonstrate that character every day.”

“I am beyond proud of Coach Bedwell being named as Junior College Coach of the Year,” said Tricia Moore, NOC Division Chair for Agriculture and Biological Sciences. “In the three years she has been at NOC, Bedwell has recruited some of the best livestock judges in the nation and has honed their skills to achieve outstanding results at the collegiate level. She has a

strong work ethic and the competitive nature to highly motivate her students. When I hired her, I expected her to do great things as a livestock judging coach and she has not disappointed. She has made a tremendous impact on NOC Agriculture by developing the most competitive livestock judging team in the nation, in a very short period of time. NOC is lucky to have her and we are excited to see what the future holds for our Livestock Judging Program under her direction.”

Bedwell has deep roots in the livestock industry, raising and showing cattle with her family. During her undergraduate studies at OSU, Bedwell received her bachelor degrees in both animal science and agricultural communications. She earned her Master’s Degree in Agricultural Communications from OSU in May of 2020.

Bedwell is excited to continue her coaching career at NOC and plans to bring home many more National wins to Tonkawa.

“This is only the beginning,” Bedwell said. “When I got the job at NOC, my goal was to create a culture of success. We have succeeded in doing that. However, I firmly believe you are only a success at the one moment in time when you compete a successful act. The team from NOC will continue to procure success.”

group of kids,” Bedwell said. “They are just amazing and to see their hard work pay-off with Team of the Year is a real blessing for them and for this program.”

Bedwell said she had a vision when she recruited this group of sophomores two years ago.

“I looked across the country for the right kids for this program,” she said. “Not just great livestock judges but I wanted great students. I wanted kids that would work hard, driven, self-motivating, and leaders among their peers. Those were the type of kids I wanted and was so fortunate they said yes to NOC and came here. In the end, we were able to accomplish our goals.”

When she recruited this group, she had some advice for each one.

“I told them they could clap with us or for us, but the team from NOC would be winning,” she said. “They bought into it from the beginning. Even as freshmen, they were so incredibly coachable and made my job easy. I’m very blessed that they chose to come judge for me at NOC.”

She complimented them on their work ethic. “It’s really special to see a group of 20 years-old young people that work as hard as they do,” she said. “That’s not common in today’s world but this group went above and beyond what was

expected and accomplished what few teams in history have ever been able to do. Winning four National contests has rarely been done.”

She said this group was different in that it learned from success and failure.

“They learned from each contest and that’s so important,” she said. “There have been a lot of wins but losses as well. This group of 15 was able to do what few junior colleges judging teams can and that’s to learn from a loss and improve. They could’ve given up so many times but they always persevered and succeeded.”

The NOC Livestock Judging Program had success before Bedwell’s arrival but now those top ten finishes are now championship finishes.

“I believe NOC can always attract the type of student/livestock judge that can compete on a national level,” she said. “We have proven it at Northern this year and I think we can stay competitive on the national stage.”

“This is an incredible group of young people,” said NOC President Clark Harris. “I have been very fortunate to work with these students during their time at NOC. My first interactions with them were at the Agriculture Division Retreat prior to their first semester at NOC.”

Harris continued, “You see the leadership they provide as they work with the 4-H and FFA kids that came to compete at the livestock judging camps and livestock shows on campus. They helped to host the NOC Ag Interscholastic competitions that bring in around 800 high school students. They always act with a high level of professionalism, and are great students and active on campus. It is only fitting that this great group of young people are the top team in the nation. I am very proud of Coach Jennifer Bedwell for her hard work and the entire team.

Tonkawa hosts Interscholastic contests

Students from 10 area schools participated in the Northern Oklahoma College Tonkawa Interscholastic Contest April 5.

Participating schools included Billings High School, Covington-Douglas High School, Deer Creek-Lamont High School, Drummond High School Hennessey High School, Pioneer-Pleasant Vale High School, St. Mary's Catholic School, Stillwater Junior High, Tonkawa High School, and Woodland High School.

According to Cara Beth Johnson, NOC Business Division Chair, 245 exams were adminis-

tered in 30 different testing areas.

Medals were presented for first, second, and third place to students in each contest.

Junior and senior students placing first through third place received \$150, \$100 and \$50 scholarships, respectively.

Certificates of merit were awarded to all participants. Certificates, medals and scholarships were sent directly to the schools or presented by NOC representatives at awards ceremonies upon request.

The event, organized by NOC Criminal Justice Instructor Troy Cochran, will be held at the Renfro Center from 8 a.m. – 4 p.m. with lunch provided. Lunch will be provided by the NOC Student Organization Criminal Justice Society.

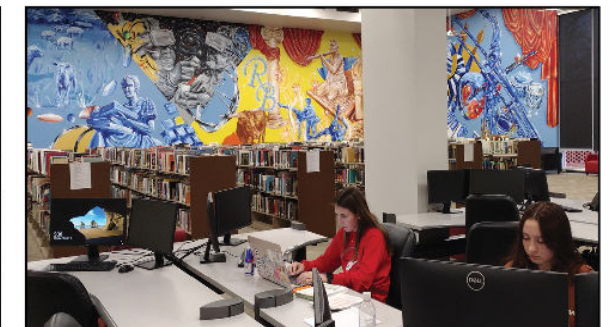
