NOC nursing graduates achieve 100% nursing examination pass rate

Northern Oklahoma College 2023 nursing graduates achieved 100% first time pass rate on the national registered nurse licensure exam. On April 1, 2023, the National Council of State Boards of Nursing launched the Next Generation NCLEX (NGN) Examination, an enhanced version of its predecessor, the NCLEX.

NOC graduates performed ahead of state and national averages on the next generation NCLEX-RN achieving a 100% pass rate during the period of April 1-June 30, which is the first testing period of the NGN. In comparison, the state pass rate was 93.77%, and the national pass rate was 94.31% for the same time period.

“NOC nursing faculty have worked diligently to implement changes to prepare students for practice with improved clinical judgment and decision-making skills,” said Dr. Nikole Hicks,

Nursing Division Chair. “We are very proud of our graduates who are helping to fill a critical need for nurses in their communities.”

The NOC associate degree nursing program is approved by the Oklahoma Board of Nursing and accredited by the Accreditation Commission for Education in Nursing (ACEN).

“NOC has been dedicated to providing exceptional nurses for our communities for over 50 years, and NOC nurses are changing lives all over the world,” Dr. Hicks said. “Come join us. Change lives. Be exceptional. Be an NOC Nurse.”

The Northern Oklahoma College Nursing Program is accepting applications for the Spring 2024 Semester (Oct. 1) and for the Fall 2024 Semester (March 31) at the Tonkawa, Enid, and Stillwater campuses.

PLC students attend Stillwater retreat

Northern Oklahoma College President’s Leadership Council students attended the annual PLC Retreat in Stillwater Aug. 3.

OSU, NOC researchers awarded NSF funds to study rural resilience

The U.S. National Science Foundation has invested \$56 million in 11 projects, spanning a total of 21 institutions in 19 jurisdictions, through NSF's Established Program to Stimulate Competitive Research (EPSCoR) including Oklahoma State University and Northern Oklahoma College.

This investment is a component of NSF's ongoing effort to build research and development capacity and education in states that demonstrate a commitment to research but have not received the levels of investment seen in other parts of the country.

OSU and NOC are part of the Rural Confluence: Communities and Academic Partners Uniting to Drive Discovery and Build Capacity for Climate Resilience, including Oklahoma State University, Louisiana State University, and University of Nebraska-Lincoln. This project will engage rural communities to create shared frameworks for climate resilience; project climate change impacts and community resilience scenarios; and expand social, economic and STEM workforce opportunities for persons from underrepresented backgrounds. This project includes partnerships across Oklahoma, Louisiana, and Nebraska.

"We are excited to launch this new project called Rural Confluence, which is designed to bring together people and ideas from diverse but connected communities, disciplines, and institutions within the Mississippi River basin to advance the science of rural resilience and to reduce climate-related vulnerabilities in rural communities," said Tyson Ochsner, Professor,

Plant and Soil Sciences, Oklahoma State University.

Dr. Frankie Wood-Black, NOC Division Chair for Engineering, Physical Science, and Process Technology and principal investigator, indicated that "this project not only focuses on our local areas but helps provide students with the ability to experience research in a multi-disciplined, multi-institutional environment."

"As evident from EPSCoR's impact, investing in research infrastructure is a powerful catalyst for strengthening our nation's security, competitiveness, and fostering groundbreaking scientific advancements," said NSF Director Sethuraman Panchanathan. "I'm thrilled to announce this year's EPSCoR Track-2 awards, which will strengthen community and regional efforts to understand the impacts of a changing climate and enhance the resilience of disproportionately affected communities. By addressing these critical challenges, and engaging with communities impacted by climate change, we have the potential to advance innovation and promote economic stability and recovery in EPSCoR jurisdictions and beyond."

This year's projects focus on building collaborative teams of investigators in scientific focus areas consistent with NSF and national priorities. The five-year Research Infrastructure Improvement Track -2 awardees will undertake ambitious interdisciplinary research with a primary focus on enhancing climate change research and resilience capacity to create more opportunities for communities facing disproportionate impacts.
