The service provides free transit services, loaner laptops, and hotspot access. Students in financial hardship, Marshallese, Hispanic, or the first member of a family to attend college may qualify.

said that NOC could not provide these services without the assistance of AT&T and the City of Enid.

Tip-off is set for 5:30 p.m. and 7:30 p.m.


The Lady Jets (7-6, 2-3 in conference) while the Lady Mavs (5-9, 2-1 in conference play.
