Dr. Michelle Keylon was born and raised in Tonkawa, Oklahoma. After graduating from

Tonkawa High School in 1990, Michelle immediately went on to Northern Oklahoma College. As a first-generation college student, she found the support and guidance through Dr. Keylon, Class of 1992, and Morris, Class NOC to build a strong academic foundation that would carry her through her post-graduate degree. Michelle graduated from NOC in 1992 with an Associate of Science, followed by earning a Bachelor of Science in Secondary Education - Business Professions from Oklahoma State University in 1994.

> After working several years as a classroom teacher, she earned a Master of Science in Occupational & Adult Education from Oklahoma State University in 2000. Michelle later achieved a Doctorate of Education in Instructional Leadership from North Central University in 2014. For almost three decades, Michelle has focused her work on career and technical education, workforce development and economic development. She started as a classroom teacher in 1996 at Okmulgee High School. The following year, Michelle began teaching at Green Country Technology Center, also in Okmulgee.

> Dr. Keylon left the classroom to join the Oklahoma Department of Career and Technology Education in 2000. She was the State Program Administrator for vocational business, marketing, and information technology programs. She

In 2019, she became the fourth superintendent of Francis Tuttle. Her role has been to provide leadership for program development, curriculum design, instructional delivery, and staff development. Scott Morris

Scott Morris, a Tonkawa High School graduate, earned his Associate of Science degree from Northern Oklahoma College in 1991.

After a stellar career at Tonkawa High School, he followed the footsteps of his father, Gilbert Morris, and played basketball for the Northern Oklahoma College Mavericks.

After finishing his two-year career at NOC, Morris continued his playing career at the University of Science and Arts in Chickasha where he played both basketball and golf.

Morris then returned to NOC as the men's assistant coach under Mick Weiberg from 1993-

While earning his Master of Education degree at UCO he served as an assistant coach for children Bryce, 22, Brennen, 19, and Avery, 14. Dan Hays at Oklahoma Christian University. He then returned to NOC Tonkawa in 2000 for one season as the women's assistant coach under Greg Krause before being named the first head coach of the NOC Enid women's basketball program in 2001.

Morris and wife Summer then moved to Enid where he started the NOC Enid program from scratch and coached the Lady Jets from 2001-2020. He also taught Math at NOC Enid.

Over 19 years at NOC Enid, Morris' teams would accumulate 456 wins (averaging 24.0 wins per season), 12 conference championships, 12 NJCAA All-Americans, four Region-2 Championships and five National Tournament berths.

The Lady Jets reached Final Four appearance in 2011. The Lady Jets also achieved academic excellence by winning four NJCAA national academic titles and two runner-up finishes with over fifty individual academic All-Americans.

Morris and wife Summer currently live in Stillwater where he coaches the Stillwater High School Boys Basketball Team. They have three

Vanessa Adams-Harris speaks at Black History Month program in Enid

Vanessa Adams-Harris, Director of Outreach and Alliances at the John Hope Franklin Center for Reconciliation, spoke at NOC Enid Thursday morning as part of Black History Month. The event was organized by Dr. Mary Ann Mc-Coy, chairman of the NOC Diversity Commit-

Adams-Harris, a member of the Muscogee (Creek) Nation from Beggs, Oklahoma, is an actor, artist, producer and documentary film maker among several other talents. She is also a human rights activist, a peacemaker and the vice-chair of the Greater Tulsa Area Indian Af-

fairs Commission and president of North Tulsa Historical Society.

Most of all, she is a historian.

She told the story of John Hope Franklin, an Oklahoma native who became a historian of Black History writing the generational 1947 book, "From Slavery to Freedom," one of the most read works in the academic field. He taught over three million students in his lifetime.

When Adams-Harris met Franklin, he told her

"There is no such thing as Black History or Native American History, it's American history," she said.

Franklin, native of Rentiesville, Oklahoma, attended high school in Tulsa, then Tufts University in Tennessee, and finally Harvard where he earned a PhD in 1941. He taught at a number of universities including Duke and the University of Chicago. He received the Presidential Medal of Freedom in 1995.

Free tax prep available at NOC Tonkawa

Northern Oklahoma College Tonkawa is providing free basic income tax return preparation for students, NOC employees, and area residents every Thursday starting Feb. 8 at NOC Tonkawa. Singles or families making less than \$64,000 per year qualify for the free service.

Trained tax preparers from the NOC Business Division and area volunteers will be available for tax assistance each Thursday beginning Thursday, Feb. 8. Taxpayers also have an option to prepare their own basic federal and state tax return using the free e-filing software.

Cara Beth Johnson, Business division chair said, "This is a great opportunity for our students to provide a community service and gain tax preparation experience."

The Cultural Engagement Center (CEC) is hosting the Volunteer Income Tax Assistance (VITA) program every Thursday through April 11. The CEC will be closed March 18-22 for spring break and for inclement weather. The CEC is located in the Vineyard Administration/Library building. Interested parties need to bring a photo ID for all filers; Social Security cards and birthdates for taxpayer, spouse, and dependents; W-2 forms; 1099 forms; receipts for childcare costs, education expenses, and other deductions; checking account and routing number for refund; and 1095-A, -B, or -C healthcare coverage or exemption.

Tax preparation is done by appointment only. Please contact Cara Beth Johnson at 580.628.6340 or carolyn.johnson@noc.edu. Tax preparers are available from 5 p.m. - 8 p.m. No drop off's will be accepted, individuals must be present during tax preparation.

Northern Oklahoma College and the IRS are sponsoring the program.


