# Enid planetarium hosting Solar Eclipse watch party Monday at 11 a.m.

The NOC Enid Mackie Planetarium is hosting a watch party for the Solar Eclipse on Monday, April 8.

The planetarium will open at 11 a.m. with streaming of events from around the Nation (NASA coverage begins at noon although NOC will also be joining streams from Slooh, Wallops Flight Center and other organizations).

NOC Pre-Engineering, Rocket Team and Astronomy Students will be present during the

event.

Telescopes with solar filters and eclipse viewing materials will be provided.

Enid will have a 91.2% of eclipse totality, partial eclipse begins at 12:28 p.m., the maximum eclipse at 1:46 p.m., and the partial eclipse ends at 3:04 p.m.

Public shows are held on the first Thursday of the month at 7 p.m. throughout the year.

Former White House Press Secretary, President Ari Fleischer Communications, and FOX News Contributor Ari Fleischer spoke at Northern Oklahoma College Tuesday night about the state of politics in America and the upcoming 2024 presidential election.

Tuesday's speech was provided by the Renfro Endowed Lectureship Program.

In his political career, Fleischer said the most meaningful part was his time as President Bush's press secretary.

"It was an amazing time for me personally," he said. I would drive to work, park my car, enter the west wing and go to my office. My of-

"That is something we need to be aware heading to the 2024 election," he said.

Fleischer then spoke of the 2024 election which he sees will be very close.

"The election boils down to seven (swing) states," he said. "It's going to be a close race that from Middlebury College. can go either way."

In foreign policy, Fleischer said the Middle East is the most important crisis for the United States going forward.

"We need to support Israel anyway we can to defeat Hamas in Gaza," he said.

As a former White House Press Secretary, Ari Fleischer was the primary spokesperson for President George W. Bush and delivered the daily White House briefings from 2001 to 2003. He served as spokesman during the historic presidential recount, September 11th, two wars and the anthrax attack.



## Hullet Family Scholarship increases awards to NOC Tonkawa students

The Hullet Family Scholarship Fund, established through the generous support of Judy Hullet Wear and Connie Mack and Pat Hullet, through the Northern Oklahoma College Foundation in 2016, has recently been amended by the family to award more scholarships and scholarship dollars to qualifying NOC Tonkawa scholarship applicants.

This permanently restricted endowed scholarship fund provides students from Oklahoma an opportunity to pursue their educational goals at Northern Oklahoma College on the Tonkawa campus. Applicants must be a full or parttime non-traditional student (20 years of age or older) with at least 12 credit hours and maintain at least a 2.50 GPA. There will be no restrictions as to a major of study in determining eligibility for this scholarship. The scholarship will be awarded annually by the scholarship committee with input from the Hullet family.

NOCF Executive Director Sheri Snyder stated, "NOC is grateful and blessed to have alumni such as the Hullet family who are continuing on their tradition and commitment to higher

Northern Oklahoma College Enid student Foundation. Sophia Arnold recently received a \$1,000 cash prize as part of a Student Watch survey through NACS (National Association of College Stores). Arnold is a freshman from Enid.


According to NOC Bookstore Manager Jimilea Jansson, over 16,000 usable responses were created for data analysis through the survey.

Student Watch is an annual, web-based survey of students conducted by OnCampus Research® (OCR). OCR, the research arm of the National Association of College Stores, monitors and explores trends among college students and faculty, course content in higher education, and the collegiate retail market. Student Watch is made possible through funding from the NACS

The Student Watch study explores student attitudes, perceptions, and behaviors around course materials. The survey includes items addressing acquisition behaviors including where, when, how, and what course materials are being obtained, leading sources for purchases and rentals, where and how students find value in course materials, cost challenges students face and how they pay for course materials, and information on alternatives to traditional course materials including free materials, inclusive access, and not obtaining materials altogether

#### Regents outline president search

Following an executive session for the purpose of discussing the employment including evaluating candidates for the position of the President of Northern Oklahoma College at Wednesday's meeting in Stillwater, the Northern Oklahoma College Board of Regents voted to hold a special Board of Regents meeting on May 15 including an executive session.

update on the presidential selection process by providing the following tentative timeline:

\*February 21 Board of Regents Meeting – Announced formal National search for the next President of Northern Oklahoma College; Posted position with applications accepted until March 27, 2024.

\*March 27 Board of Regents Meeting – Execu- for the baseball/softball facility. tive Session to review applicants

\*April 24 Board of Regents Meeting – Executive Session to conduct virtual interviews with top 5 applicants

\*May 15 Board of Regents Special Meeting – Executive session to conduct in-person interviews with named top applicants

\*May 22 Board of Regents Meeting – Executive session to potentially select the next president of the College

In other business, the regents approved summer residence hall rates for Tonkawa and Enid. Students will be housed at Jets Hall in Enid and Mavs Hall in Tonkawa at a cost of \$735 per

Also, the regents approved a resolution that will allow NOC to partner with the City of Regent Chairman Brad Fox provided a brief Enid to apply for a Community Development Block Grant that would fund the beginning of renovations at Failing Field on the NOC Enid campus. The grant, if approved, would provide funding to remove the concrete bleachers, press box, and restrooms and construct four rows of bleachers for the facility. More funding will be needed in the future to complete the renovation

> The board also approved the financial report, provided by Vice President of Financial Affairs Anita Simpson, including two purchases over \$25,000.00. One is an emergency roof replacement at the Vineyard Library Administration Building for \$691,141.45 and a new Greenhouse at NOC Tonkawa for \$149,990.90 as part of the current NASNTI Grant Project.

Every school that participates in the Student Watch study receives, at no cost, an aggregate report and data tables detailing national trends, broken down by school characteristics like enrollment, term of study, and region/ location.

leading resource for data on course materials The aggregate report carefully explains each trend, placing these in historical context and pointing out any relevant variation by student or school characteristics.
