Diana Morris Watkins became the 15th President of Northern Oklahoma College on June 1, 2024.

Her move to post-secondary education came in 2000 when she joined the Oklahoma State University Honors Program, now Honors College, as an academic counselor before spending four years as an "early childhood educator," taking on the role of full-time mom until her daughter

the investiture is an academic ceremony held to confer the official power of the office upon a new college president, usually held during their first year in office. An investiture reflects academic traditions, celebrates institutional history, and symbolizes a new era in the life of the institution. The ceremony begins with a formal procession, much like a commencement. The procession includes the individuals in the platform party participating in the ceremony, delegates from the other Oklahoma colleges and universities, and from NOC faculty. Faculty will wear full academic regalia during the investiture procession and ceremony that follows.

The NOC College Choir and Concert Band will perform. A reception will be held at the Renfro Center following the event.

Ten contestants from NOC Enid and NOC Tonkawa are participating in the event.



Northern Oklahoma College received a clean ing timely information and supporting docuaudit report at the November Board of Regents meeting in Enid on Wednesday.

The external audit, performed by Hinkle & Company, PC, of Tulsa, audited the college's financial statements for the year ending June 30, 2024. The report was given by Kirk Vanders-

Vice President for Development & Community Relations Sheri Snyder reported the First-Gen/ First Choice Campaign was held Nov. 8. The campaign raised nearly \$10,000 and an anonymous donor has matched those fund-raising efforts with another \$20,000 making a total of \$30,000 for the program.
