Marcus Chapman (Class of 2002)

Chapman graduated from Timberlake High School in 2000 and then received an associate's degree from Northern Oklahoma College in Enid where he was a member of the Jets baseball team for two years.

He then moved to Alva and received a Bachelor's Degree in Mathematics. During his first year as a

teacher, he attended classes at Southwestern Oklahoma State University and completed a master's degree in Education Administration. He is currently attending Liberty University seeking an Ed.D in Administration & Supervision: Educational Leadership. Chapman followed in his parent's footsteps and began a career in education. His father, Terry Chapman, was a coach, principal, and superintendent at Timberlake, Buffalo, and Cherokee while his mother, Diana Chapman, taught various grades and subjects at Timberlake and Buffalo.

He began his career as a secondary math teacher at Ft. Supply Public Schools. After one year, he moved to Oklahoma Union Public Schools where he taught math and coached baseball and football for three years. He then spent one year at Lindsay Public Schools in the same role before moving to Aline-Cleo to begin a career in administration as the K-12 Principal.

The next stop was at Canton Public Schools where he spent five years as the high school principal. His first experience as superintendent was at Ryan Public Schools. After 7 years at Ryan Public Schools, he landed in his current role as the Superintendent of Chisholm Public Schools where he is in his second year.



Alumni Hall of Fame

Dineo Heilmann (Class of 1982)

In 1985, Dineo Heilmann started his teaching career as the band director for the Chelsea Public School system in Chelsea, Oklahoma. Dineo left Chelsea in 1988 to become the Instrumental Director at Northern Oklahoma College and to later serve as Fine Arts Division Chair from 1990 to 2017.

He received his Associate degree from Northern Oklahoma College, his Bachelor of Music Education from Oklahoma State University where he was named Outstanding Music Student his senior year. He then received a fellowship to complete his Master of Music Education degree at Wichita State University.

He was named 1991's Outstanding Young Bandmaster for the state of Oklahoma by Phi Beta Mu. He has had the honor of working with famed conductor Eugene Corporon, renowned composer Jack Stamp and has performed in a master class for Richard Stoltzman.

Heilmann has been honored twice by the Northern Oklahoma College board of Regents, the first with a "Resolution" of outstanding contribution to music culture and the second he was honored along with his father with a "Resolution" for the 50th anniversary of the Roustabouts for "50 years of inspiring performances".

In 2014, the city of Tonkawa named him "Citizen of the Year." In 2015 Tonkawa High School named Mr. Heilmann as "Friends of Education" for raising money to purchase a Steinway grand piano for their Events Center.

He appeared annually with the Northern Gala Orchestra since its inception in 1996, under the baton of Conductor Gerald Steichen, performing traditional clarinet literature. Dineo has been so lucky as to have performed with New York Philharmonic Violist Dorian Rence and such soprano artists as Loraine Ernst, Julie McCoy, and Janet Gray.

In 2000 he participated in the Higher Education Leadership Academy.

He has served as the representative for Junior/ Community Colleges for the Oklahoma Association of Schools of Music. He has been a member of the Music Educators National Conference, Oklahoma Music Educators Association, and Phi Beta Mu.



Marshall Reigh (Class of 1999)

Marshall Reigh a 1997 Graduate of Yale High School, earned his Associate of Science Degree from Northern Oklahoma College in 1999.

Reigh spent all of his K-12 years going to Yale Public Schools spending his free time with his friends in the outdoors. Upon graduation he moved north to Tonkawa along with a lot of those same people to begin their higher education at NOC.

After obtaining his associate degree, he went on to UCO and after a year of the metro life jumped ship to finish his undergraduate at NWOSU in Alva with a Bachelor of Science in Criminal Justice and a Biology minor.

A few months after graduation he married his wife of 20 years whom he met at NOC and began his current career as an Oklahoma State Game Warden, his original duty assignment was in Kay and Grant counties. He later was stationed in Grant where he remains today.

He was selected as the 8th District Warden of the year 3x and was named Oklahoma State Game Warden of the Year for 2024.

As a second-generation Game Warden, he knew going into the job that relationships in the community are of great importance and became involved with the local schools and conservation groups as soon as he could. Teaching classes to all ages from Pre-K to college, he is able to make a bigger impact with the sporting public than could be made with only using a citation book.

Reigh currently resides in Medford and is involved in his community school volunteering his time as Vice President of the Board of Education. He is also the President of the Oklahoma State Game Warden Association and Vice President of the Pheasants Forever Chapter, President of the Grant County Youth Shooting Club. He teaches classes at Autry Tech on all manners of Hunting and Fishing sports and volunteers his time with both Archery in the Schools teams in his county.

His favorite time is still spent outdoors sharing his love of outdoor pursuits with his 13-year-old daughter Sydney and other youth who he takes afield.

Northern Oklahoma College Men's Basketball player Xon Williams was awarded the Jared Weiberg Endowed Memorial Scholarship Monday night before the NOC men faced Murray State.

Williams is a freshman from Millwood High School in Oklahoma City, Oklahoma.

The Jared Weiberg Endowed Scholarship is presented to a walk-on player or student assistant manager of the Maverick team whose qualities include a strong work ethic, loyalty, unselfishness, and a passion for basketball. Williams will receive a \$1,000 scholarship.

Weiberg's father Mick, coached the Mavs from 1987-2006 and also served NOC as Dean of Student Affairs.

Presenting the scholarship award certificate were NOC President Diana Morris Watkins, Sheri Snyder, Vice President for Development & Community Relations, Ryan Paul (representing the Weiberg family), and NOC Mays coach Brandon Gossett.

She is also a member of the Maverick Women's Wrestling team. She is the daughter of Mike and Stacy Wilda and a graduate of Perry High School.


She is the 8th recipient of this award and is receiving a \$500 scholarship.

The Leo Canaday Memorial Scholarship was awarded to Alanna Williams as the recipient for the 2025-2026 academic year.

Williams is a freshman Health, Physical Education & Recreation major from Hartshorne, Oklahoma.

The Leo Canaday Memorial Scholarship was established in 2004 by Canaday's wife, Pat. Through the generous support of family and friends, this scholarship provides students an opportunity to pursue their educational goals at Northern Oklahoma College in Tonkawa and is presented to a member of the NOC Women's Basketball team.

Leo Canaday attended Northern Oklahoma Junior College in 1954 and was a member of the Maverick Football team. He obtained his Bachelor Degree and Master's Degree from Southwestern Oklahoma State University. Leo returned to NOJC in 1963 where he served as Athletic Director and Physical Education Department Chairman for 30 years, retiring in 1993.

While at Northern he coached football, men's and women's basketball, track, tennis and golf. His women's basketball teams won seven conference championships, one regional championship, a 3rd place finish at the 1975 National Tournament and a National Championship in 1979.

He was named conference Coach of the Year seven times, and was named Regional and National Coach of the Year in 1979. In 2004 he was honored with the Northern Oklahoma College Distinguished Alumni Award.

NOC HOLDS INVESTITURE FOR DIANA MORRIS WATKINS



Diana Morris Watkins' Northern Oklahoma College presidency was made official as the 15th President for NOC.

Watkins has served as president since May 2024 when she was appointed president by NOC regents but Tuesday, she was officially inaugurated as the NOC president with an investiture ceremony at the Kinzer Performing Arts Center on the Tonkawa campus.

Watkins explained her vision for NOC in her presidential address. "When I met with the NOC Board of Regents about the possibility of continuing to serve as president beyond the interim period, she said. "I presented them with a document that outlined my vision for the future of Northern Oklahoma College, building on previous successes of the college and pointing to a pathway for future successes. I broke apart our mission statement and outlined what I thought it truly meant for this institution and for my role as president, confident that if given the opportunity I could lead our extremely capable executive team as we take a look at our processes and procedures searching for ways to create the most efficient and effective path forward for our students."

"I think it's pretty cool to have spent the past twenty years of my life working at the state's first public community college," she added. "Its rich history is beautifully showcased in the AD Buck museum. I'm also excited for all of you to get a chance to see that some of the rich history showcased through stories of our outstanding alumni which are displayed here in the hallways of the Kinzer Performing Arts Center as Faces of NOC and through the Distinguished Alumni showcased out front in the Eleanor Hayes Gallery."

"Being a multi-campus institution allows us to provide some unique programming in different areas," she said. "As your President, I pledged to have a regular presence on each of NOC's three campuses and in each of the four communities where we offer coursework. I hope those of you who are active in the Tonkawa, Enid, Stillwater and Ponca City communities have already recognized that is a priority for me. The partnerships with the local chambers in these communities, with workforce and economic development leaders, with Autry, Meridian, and Pioneer Technology Centers, with the University Center in Ponca City, Oklahoma State University in Stillwater, and Northwestern Oklahoma State University in Enid are vitally important to the successes of Northern Oklahoma College, and I will continue

to foster relationships with each of those groups throughout my tenure."

"Providing "high-quality, accessible and affordable educational opportunities and services" requires a strong emphasis on professional development and a strong focus on continuous improvement," she said. "Accessibility is a current strength for NOC through online and Online live course offerings but we can improve how we serve students with diverse needs. replicated in other communities and are currently working to create in more."

NOC President's Emeritus Dr. Cheryl Evans and Dr. Joe Kinzer and the NOC Board of Regents presented the Symbols of the Office to Watkins.

In introducing Watkins, Dr. Evans said she asked those that worked her to sum her up in one word.

Those descriptive words for Watkins include "driven, authentic, optimistic, visionary, energetic, smart, engaged, witty, approachable, capable, genuine, rational, objective, passionate, purpose-driven, wise, astute, sharp, and resilient."

"These words describe the impact that she has already made on the NOC community and what kind of a team player she is," Evans said.

Tonkawa's Kevin Ditmore and Enid's Bert Mackie each spoke about the Tonkawa and Enid communities and NOC's value in those communities. Sondra Ladd, the pastor at First Christian Church in Stillwater, gave the invocation and benediction.

Dennis Casey, the Oklahoma State Regents for Higher Education, spoke regarding NOC's mission in the education community.

T. L. Walker, the Executive Director of Standing Bear Foundation and the Northern Oklahoma College Tribal Institute, gave Watkins a Native American Blessing.

The NOC Choir and Concert Band performed the Pledge of Allegiance, 'For Good, and the NOC Alma Mater.

The event was followed by a reception at the Renfro Center. Watkins served NOC as a language arts instructor at NOC Stillwater, later as the Vice President for NOC Stillwater, and then as Vice President for Academic Affairs before taking over as interim president in January 2024.


The DAISY Award for Extraordinary Nursing Faculty was established by The DAISY Foundation in memory of J. Patrick Barnes who died at age 33 from Immune thrombocytopenia (ITP), an auto-immune disease.
