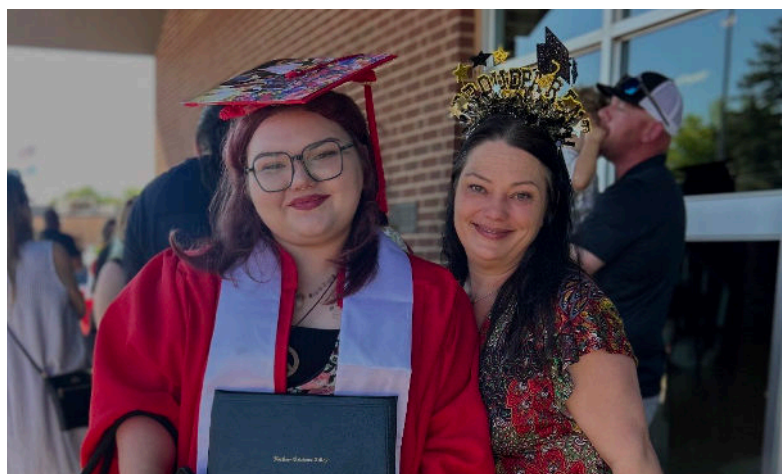
The accessibility and flexibility it provides for students. I was able to work full time while studying for my associates degree here, which was incredibly helpful.

Distinguished Alumni Hall of Fame

NOC Honored Distinguished Alums on March 29



Northern Oklahoma College alumni Marcus Chapman (Class of 2002), Dineo Heilmann (Class of 1982), and Marshall Reigh (Class of 1999) were inducted into the NOC Distinguished Alumni Hall of Fame on March 29 at NOC Tonkawa.

The three inductees were honored in ceremonies during the NOC Alumni and Friends Reunion Dinner in the Renfro Center at NOC Tonkawa at 5 p.m. on Saturday, March 29.

In 1985, Dineo Heilmann started his teaching career as the band director for the Chelsea Public School system in Chelsea, Oklahoma. Dineo left Chelsea in 1988 to become the Instrumental Director at Northern Oklahoma College Tonkawa and to later serve as Fine Arts Division Chair from 1990 to 2017.

Marcus Chapman began his career as a secondary math teacher at Ft. Supply Public Schools. After one year, he moved to Oklahoma Union Public Schools where he taught math and

coached baseball and football for three years. He then spent one year at Lindsay Public Schools in the same role before moving to Aline-Cleo to begin a career in administration as the K-12 Principal. The next stop was at Canton Public Schools where Marcus spent five years as the high school principal. His first experience as superintendent was at Ryan Public Schools. After 7 years at Ryan Public Schools, he landed in his current role as the Superintendent of Chisholm Public Schools where he is in his second year.

A few months after his college graduation, Marshall Reigh married his wife of 20 years whom he met at NOC and began his current career as an Oklahoma State Game Warden, his original duty assignment was in Kay and Grant counties and later on being stationed in Grant where he remains today.

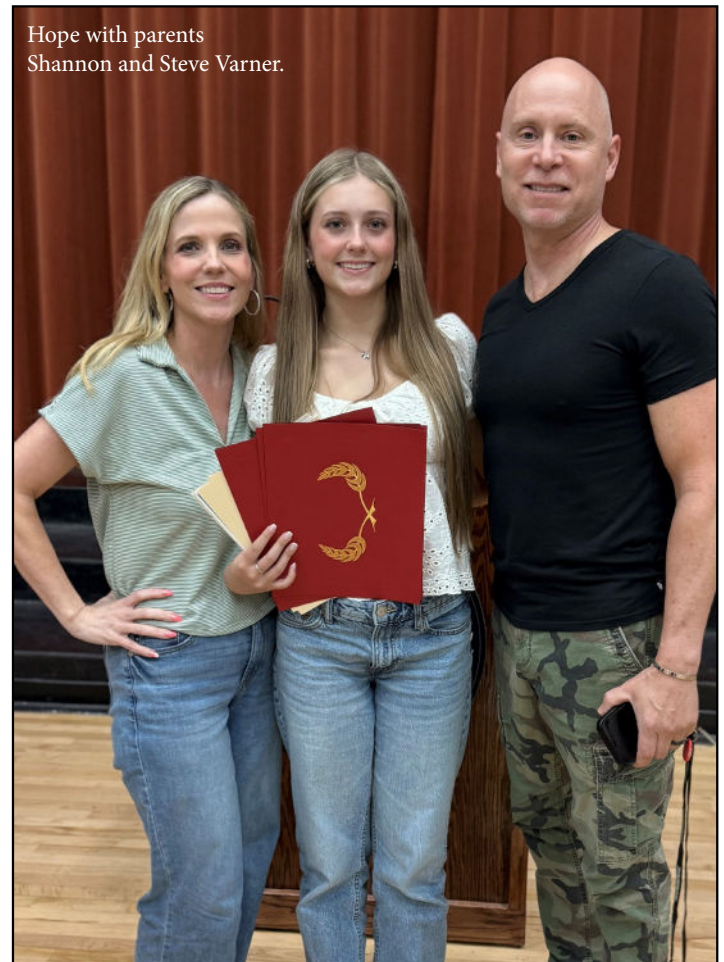
Hope Bradford Receives the NOC Legacy Scholarship

Diamond Rio performs at the NOC Renfro Lectureship Program on April 3

The popular country and western group Diamond Rio performed at Northern Oklahoma College on Thursday, April 3, as part of the Spring 2025 Renfro Endowed Lectureship Program.

The event was sponsored by the Carl and Brenda Renfro with the Renfro Endowed Lectureship Program, Northern Oklahoma College, and Northern Oklahoma College Foundation. Dinner was held at the Renfro Center starting at 6 p.m., the concert was at the Kinzer Performing Arts Center at 7:30 p.m.

Originating as The Tennessee River Boys in the 80's, the band evolved into Diamond Rio in 1989. The following year, they signed with Arista Nashville, and in 1991, with the release of "Meet in The Middle," became the first country music group in history to reach No. 1 with a debut single. The band is also known for their multi-week chart-topper "How Your Love Makes Me Feel," crossover hit "One More Day," as well as timeless hits "Beautiful Mess," "Unbelievable," "I Believe," and many more.

Selling more than 6.8 million albums and surpassing over 1.05 billion global streams, Diamond Rio has charted 20 Top 10 singles, 15 Top 5 singles, and seven No. 1 singles. Known for playing every note on every album throughout their career, the band's unwavering commitment to their craft is evident in their instrumental tracks "Big," "Appalachian Dream," and "Poultry Promenade," all of which received Grammy nominations for Best Country Instrumental Performance. Following their Arista Nashville deal, the band released two albums with Word Records – their Christmas album, *The Star Still Shines*, and their Dove and Grammy-winning Christian Country album, *The Reason*.



Amassing numerous accolades throughout the years, the band is a member of the Grand Ole Opry, won six Vocal Group of the Year Awards (four CMA and two ACM), received fourteen Grammy nominations, and won a Grammy Award for their album, *The Reason*. Known for their charitable commitments, including long-time spokespersons for Big Brothers Big Sisters, the band has raised more than \$1 million for non-profits and received the Minnie Pearl Humanitarian Award.

Rachel Kroemer earns NOC Nursing DAISY Award®

Northern Oklahoma College nursing faculty member Rachel Kroemer was honored with The DAISY Award® for Extraordinary Nurse Educators at the NOC 2025 Nurses' Pinning Ceremony Friday, May 2 at NOC Tonkawa.

The award is part of The DAISY Foundation's mission to express gratitude to nurses with programs that recognize them

for the extraordinary, compassionate and skillful care they provide patients and families.

DAISY Award recognitions honor the super-human work nurses do for patients and families every day wherever they practice, in whatever role they serve, and throughout their careers – from Nursing Student through Lifetime Achievement in Nursing.

Rachel Kroemer received her Bachelor of Science in Nursing from Washburn University in 2011 and completed her Master of Science in Nursing Education from Fort Hays State University in 2023. She is a member of Phi Kappa Phi and Sigma Theta Tau Honor Societies.

Kroemer started at NOC in January 2021 as a part-time clinical instructor moving into a full-time position in October 2021. She started Introduction to Nursing in Fall 2024, loves teaching students in Maternal Child and is the faculty advisor for Alpha Delta Nu Nursing Honor Society. Her favorite part about bedside nursing was teaching new Moms and Dads about their newborn and now she enjoys watching and helping students expand their skills and knowledge base as they begin their nursing career.

NOC Nursing Division Chair Dr. Nikole Hicks said, "Rachel Kroemer leads by example and strives for excellence in herself and in those around her. According to her nomination story, she makes learning feel real, and is the kind of instructor who wants you to succeed and works hard to make sure the material makes sense for everyone. She connects with students on a personal level, treats everyone with dignity, and encourages students to do the right thing, not the easy thing. She models excellence, integrity, and resourcefulness."

The DAISY Award for Extraordinary Nurse Educators was established by The DAISY Foundation in memory of J. Patrick Barnes who died at age 33 from Immune thrombocytopenia (ITP), an auto-immune disease. The Barnes Family was awestruck by the clinical skills, caring and compassion of the nurses who cared for Patrick. They created this international award to demonstrate appreciation to faculty for their commitment and inspirational influence on their nursing students and to say thank you to nursing faculty everywhere.

NOC Nursing Division Chair Dr. Nikole Hicks said, "This year's nominations all came from nursing students who wrote about how each nominee has had a life-changing impact through their tenure in Northern Nursing. It is so meaningful when students take the time to share these stories and so important for faculty to know how they are making a difference in students' lives."

Blind nominations for the award were submitted with a designated committee reviewing and ranking the nominees based on their commitment to student learning and success, utilizing personal interaction, providing rigorous instruction and innovative technologies, striving to provide high quality, accessible nursing education, and modeling the values of excellence, integrity, resourcefulness,

impactful relationships, and compassionate service.

The winner was selected by the The DAISY Award® Selection Committee.

Semi-finalists include Kroemer, Elaine Briggs, and Brian Baird.

The winner in 2024 was NOC faculty member DAISY Award was Dr. Marie Head.

Brian Baird, Nominee

Brian received his B.S.N. from the University of Oklahoma in 1986 and his M.S. from Southern Nazarene University in 2008. The majority of his nursing career has been spent serving special needs children in their homes and serving within the ICU. His work in the ICU included a nearly 14-year period at Hillcrest Hospital Cushing when it was named Cushing Regional Hospital and a stint at Mercy Hospital in OKC. In 2006, he began teaching freshman nursing students at Northern Oklahoma College; a privilege he continues to enjoy to this day. Baird’s passion for teaching has been life-long and has



been evident to anyone who has known him. He loves to use creativity in his approach and is known for his use of multiple teaching/learning methods. He himself loves to learn and wants his learners to enjoy the process as well. His use of simulation and gaming has earned him a lead role in NOC Nursing’s simulation program. Brian is a Certified Healthcare Simulation Educator (CHSE) and currently serves as the Nursing Simulation Coordinator. Baird and his wife, Robin, have been married almost 36 years. They have four children and two grandchildren. They reside in Perkins in a home they have been building.

Elaine Briggs, Nominee

After graduating high school in 1979, Briggs attended Central Vo-Tech in Sapulpa in a medical assistant program where she decided she wanted to be a nurse. She completed Oklahoma Baptist University’s nursing program and started her nursing career at St. Francis Hospital in Tulsa where she worked in orthopedics and cardiac care. She then worked in Home Health Care before moving to Oklahoma City where she worked at University Hospital in newborn and special care nursery. Briggs then moved to Blackwell where her husband started a medical practice. She took time off from nursing to raise her children and then started at NOC as an adjunct instructor, joining NOC as a full-time faculty member in January 2016. She currently serves as the Nursing Success Specialist.

THE GATHERING

The Gathering was held Friday, May 2, at the Osage Casino and Hotel in Ponca City. This event, in its third year, brings together alumni and friends of the NOC Agriculture Programs for an evening to reconnect with friends and to celebrate the successes of the Division of Agriculture that have taken place over the year. As part of this year's program, NOC Agriculture Division updates were given by Tricia Moore, Chair of the Division of Agriculture & Biological Science, NOC Sheep Center updates were given by Sheep Herdsman, Bart Cardwell, and updates on the NOC Livestock Judging Team by NOC Livestock Judging Coach, Jennifer Bedwell. Dr. Kurt Campbell, added comments about the growth of the agriculture program that has occurred over the 21 year span of his tenure at NOC. Dr. Campbell also reported on The Gathering Golf Scramble, held on Friday morning in conjunction with the event.

Livestock Judging Coach, Jennifer Bedwell recognized the 12 Sophomore Livestock Judging students for their accomplishments and gifted them each a canvass of the team. All twelve will be judging at 4-year universities and have received scholarship monies totaling \$320,000. The 17 members of the Freshman Livestock Judging team were also recognized.

Additionally, both a live and silent auction was held in an effort to raise money for support of the agriculture programs. The auctioneer for this year was Miss Logan Snider, The 2024 Oklahoma FFA State Champion Auctioneer. There were approximately 15 lots in the live auction, while the silent auction, hosted by SC Online Sales, sold multiple lots. Both auctions raised a combined total of just under \$30,000 for the programs. These funds will be used for scholarships, travel and personnel expenses, and general support of the agriculture programs at NOC.

Tricia Moore, Chair of the Division of Agriculture and Biological Sciences, commented, "We could not be more pleased with the support we have had for this event. What started as a vision several years ago, has become a reality and will continue to be one of the premier events hosted by NOC each year". She added that "we are truly thankful for all the donors and supporters of our programs here at NOC and are excited to continue this rich tradition of success." The date for next year's Gathering has been set for Friday, May 1, 2026, at Osage Casino and Hotel in Ponca City.

NOC holds commencement exercises in Tonkawa, Enid

Northern Oklahoma College Students at the Tonkawa campus went through graduation exercises at the 119th Annual Commencement Saturday at Foster-Piper Fieldhouse. Enid and Stillwater NOC graduates went through exercises at the Briggs Auditorium in Enid.

A total of 619 graduates were honored at the two ceremonies. NOC Vice President for Academic Affairs Dr. Shelly Mencacci opened the ceremony, congratulating the students on reaching their goals for the academic year.

Dr. Mencacci also announced students that maintained a 4.0 GPA and those that earned two associate degrees. She also introduced the Flag Bearers for each academic division.

Mencacci then presented the class with President Diana Morris Watkins conferring the degrees.

The speaker for the commencement ceremony was former Oklahoma governor George Nigh.

In a message to students, the 97-year-old former governor gave a number of example of Oklahomans who came from small towns and community colleges to do great things.

He listed Sen. Robert S. Kerr (Ada), Rep. Carl Albert (Bugtussle), Reba McEntyre (Chockie), Gov. Henry Bellmon (Billings), and Will Rogers (Claremore) as Oklahomans who were born and educated in small communities and community colleges.

"You can do it from here," Nigh said. "You can do it from Oklahoma."

The highlight of Nigh's speech was the retelling of the story of how the song 'Oklahoma!' became the state song in 1953.

Nigh, an Oklahoma legislator at the time, said he sponsored a legislative bill to change the song but the change was facing legislative opposition. He asked for and was granted one more day before the vote on the new legislation to change the state song.

In a day's notice, Nigh recruited the USAO women's choir, an Oklahoman who had played 'Curly' in the state play 'Oklahoma' on Broadway, and then arranged a piano for the song to be performed to the legislative body the next day. After the song was concluded, Nigh offered the bill for passage and it passed.

The NOC Concert Band then performed 'Oklahoma!' for the graduates and guests to a standing ovation.

"You are at the beginning of your life's journey," Nigh told the graduates. "Just remember that anything is possible and you can do it from here, you can do it from Oklahoma."

The NOC Concert Band also performed the Armed Forces Salute and the college choir performed "For Good."

After the candidates for graduation were announced and their tassels turned, the college choir performed NOC's Alma Mater.

Northern Oklahoma College, the state's first public two-year community college, is a multi-campus, land-grant institution that provides high quality, accessible, and affordable educational opportunities and services.

NOC serves nearly 4,000 students through the home campus in Tonkawa, branch in Enid, and NOC/OSU Gateway Program in Stillwater. Of these students about 80% receive financial aid and/or scholarships. 75% of NOC students complete their degree with zero debt.

The college is accredited by the Higher Learning Commission and offers associate degrees in three general areas: Arts, Science and Applied Science; the Accreditation Council for Business Schools and Programs; and the Accreditation Commission for Education and Nursing.
