NOC announces fall reopening plan

Northern Oklahoma College will partially open its campuses beginning July 1 as the college begins to reopen for the fall semester on Aug. 17.

Beginning July 1, the administration buildings will open for students and potential students for enrollment support services. All other campus facilities will remain closed to the public.

NOC President Dr. Evans stated, "As the situation is fluid and guidelines change, the College's comprehensive comeback plans will be made available mid-July. We look forward to the time when our Northern family returns to campus to start the fall semester."

According to the re-opening plan, all NOC students, staff, faculty, contractors, vendors, suppliers and guests must wear a face covering (mask) on campus property until further notice.

Beginning Aug. 3, all NOC campuses will be open Monday – Friday from 8 a.m. – 5 p.m.

NOC will offer multiple course formats for fall 2020 with options to match the students' learning style while continuing to follow CDC guidelines for a safe learning environment. Course options include traditional in-person classes, live online, and completely online.

Dr. Pam Stinson, Vice President for Academic Affairs said, "Classrooms will be set up to follow social distancing guidelines for in-class sessions, and campuses are being further equipped

with technology needed to expand distant education options should safety guidelines require a transition to online. Keeping our students and employees safe will be our top priority."

NOC will be eliminating fall break Oct. 16 and continuing with class instruction in order to conclude in-person classroom instruction by Nov. 20, prior to Thanksgiving Break Nov. 23-27 and continue class activities virtually during Pre-Finals Week, Nov. 30-Dec. 4. Final exams will be held online Dec. 7-11. On-campus services and project labs will remain open for

students. Additionally, on-campus housing and food services in Tonkawa and Enid will remain open for those choosing to return to campus after Thanksgiving Break.

In further reviewing current State and CDC recommendations, NOC Commencement for the Class of 2020 will be celebrated August 8 through a virtual ceremony. This ceremony will celebrate our entire Class of 2020 with our fall 2019, spring and summer 2020 graduates. Additional details will be provided on our website <http://www.noc.edu/graduation> when

Regents approve 2020-21 tuition, fees

The Northern Oklahoma College Board of Regents approved a \$23.7 million fiscal year 2020-21 operating budget during its regularly scheduled June meeting held at the Renfro Center at NOC Tonkawa.

NOC President Dr. Cheryl Evans commented on this year's budget.

"For multiple reasons, this is one of the toughest budget environments since I've been at Northern," Dr. Evans said. "The state allocation my first year at NOC for FY2012 was almost \$10.5 million. This fiscal year, NOC's budget includes state appropriations of only \$7.8 million, a 3.95% or \$321,343 decrease from just last year FY2020. State appropriations now only account for 33% of NOC's overall operating budget; this number is still significantly down from the 70% provided by the State of Oklahoma in 2002." We do understand that the unusual circumstances this year with Covid-19 and the energy industry situation limited the help that the legislators could provide. We are appreciative of the support that we did receive as it could have been even worse.

According to Evans, NOC's \$23.7 million budget for 2020-2021 represents a \$946,529 decrease from last year's 2019-2020 budget. The budget decrease is a result of reduced state allocations and because of an estimated enrollment decline institution-wide in the coming school year. Additionally, mandatory costs, such as healthcare, property, tort, EEL, and vehicle insurance premiums continue to rise, creating a negative impact on the budget.

According to the budget passed on Monday and approved by the state regents on Thursday, tuition and fees paid by students and their families will comprise 64% of the College's operating budget in the coming year.

Evans said in order for NOC to preserve the quality of instruction and to meet the budget needs for the coming year, the NOC Regents approved a 4.8% increase in tuition and

mandatory fees. This change will take effect for the Fall 2020 semester and will amount to an increase in resident tuition and fees of \$97.50 per semester or \$195.00 for the academic year for students on the Tonkawa and Enid campuses who complete 30 credit hours.

Evans said even with the increase, NOC's in-state tuition will be among the lowest in the state.

"I appreciate Anita (Simpson, Vice President for Financial Affairs) and her staff for all their hard work in preparation of this year's budget," Evans said.

Regent chair Dale DeWitt said he appreciates the work that goes into the fiscal year budget.

"These budget decisions are made very carefully," he said. "I appreciate all the hard work that goes into these budget preparations."

Also, the regents honored retiring regent Chad Dillingham with a proclamation and plaque. He retired after four years on the board.

"We appreciate your service," chairman DeWitt said.

"I truly enjoyed my time as a regent," Dillingham said. "It's been a wonderful experience to serve with such a great group of people."

In other business, the regents revised the academic calendar, approved the course catalog, student handbook, athletic handbook, campus master plan, monthly financial reports, and approved the trustees for the Northern Oklahoma College Foundation, Inc.

The regents elected officers for the 2020-21 fiscal year. They include the following: Chair – Jodi Cline, Vice-Chair – Michael Martin, Secretary – Stan Brownlee. The other members are Dale DeWitt and Jami Groendyke who replaces Dillingham. Groendyke takes office in July.

Chad Dillingham honored for years of service to NOC Board of Regents

Outgoing Northern Oklahoma College Regent Chad Dillingham was honored in his final meeting Monday afternoon in Tonkawa at the June NOC Board of Regent meeting. A proclamation was read in his honor celebrating four years of service to NOC.

NOC President Dr. Cheryl Evans thanked Dillingham for his service at Wednesday's board of regent meeting.

"Regent Dillingham served NOC so well," said NOC President Dr. Cheryl Evans. "We will miss his insight and thoughtful questions. He invested himself in Northern and helped initiate so many positive changes. He has been a great Regent."

Dillingham is from Enid.

Before his final meeting, Dillingham shared his thoughts on his tenure as a NOC regent

starting in 2016.

"As a community member, I've always been aware of NOC's importance to access to a quality, affordable and accessible education for citizens of northwest Oklahoma and thankful we had NOC in our community to help fill this need," Dillingham said. "So, when Bert Mackie and President Evans visited with me about my interest in serving as a Regent for NOC, I was proud to do my part for helping to continue on the rich heritage of NOC's mission."

Dillingham has seen many changes at NOC in his eight years.

"There have been many changes, some positive and some more on the challenging side of things," he said. "Some of the positives have

been: The completion of the new NOC – OSU Gateway Facility in Stillwater; the early retirement of debt for repayment of the bonds for the purchase of the NOC Enid Campus; the growth in corpus of the NOC Endowment, which helps to provide more scholarships to students that otherwise would not be able to attend college; successes in peer review rankings placing NOC among the top of its peer group in offering the highest quality, lowest cost college educations in the Nation, success with student athletics teams of multiple sports who have been recognized as high performing scholars while also attaining national championships within the sports they are participating; and the list goes on and on. However, some of the most rewarding outcomes I have witnessed is seeing how our amazing faculty and staff have responded positively to difficult financial budget constraints by taking on more and more responsibility for the same or less pay and with less resources, to ensure that the student's opportunities and experiences for a quality education do not suffer."

Dillingham spoke of the challenges facing higher education.

"Continued access due to inadequate public funding, which ultimately drives up tuition and fee cost that place a quality higher education out of reach for a large segment of our population; therefore resulting in a decline in eco-

nomie opportunities as a nation by not being able to provide a highly trained and educated workforce to meet the growing needs of businesses who compete in a global marketplace," Dillingham said.

What will Dillingham remember about his tenure.

"The quality of the students, faculty and staff," he said. "And how committed they all are to their various parts of the higher education journey and experience."

What does Dillingham predict for NOC's future?

"I believe NOC is well positioned for continued success in fulfilling its mission. However, for NOC or any institution of higher learning to continue to be successful, citizens are going to need to have a heightened awareness of how extreme the cuts have been in public funding over the past decade in this area; and what the long-term negative impacts that these cuts will have on our institutions, students and workforce well into the future if we do not turn around this trend immediately. The Citizens of Oklahoma need to demand that we do better and not continue this trend in reduced public funding, which ultimately caused a shift to the students seeking higher education via hyperbolic increases in tuition and fees."



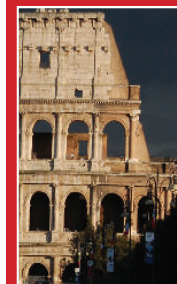
