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'The Summoning of Everyman' set for Sept. 24-27

The Northern Oklahoma College Fine Arts Division is presenting "The Summoning of Everyman," Sept. 24-27 at the Kinzer Performing Arts Center on the Tonkawa campus.

Show times are Sept. 24-26 at 7:30 p.m. and Sunday, Sept. 27 at 2 p.m.

The morality play is directed by Anthony Luetkenhaus, NOC Director of Technical Theatre.

Admission is free, children under 12 must be accompanied by an adult.

According to Luetkenhaus' director's notes, "The Summoning of Everyman" is the best-known example of the traditional medieval morality play. The morality play, born out of liturgical drama of the Catholic Church, was the most popular style of medieval theatre. Focused on the saving of the mortal soul, these types of plays traveled the countryside and were performed by acting troupes in town squares across Europe. They served an important role in the translation of liturgical works into a common tongue, as church services were conducted in Latin and most of the population was illiterate.

"Everyman" is presented as an allegory, with each character representing an ideal present in the human condition, Luetkenhaus said. "This makes this work particularly challenging for young performers. Pushing the boundaries of symbolism and theme has forced our young

cast out of their comfort zone and into new, unexplored territory. They also confronted the challenge of the language barrier of a 525-year-old play. This production is a first for many of our cast in presenting non-contemporary English. They have put great effort into presenting this language in a modern and accessible way."

"Morality plays also presented spectacle like had never been seen in performance before," he added. "Travelling with large sets on carts called "pageant wagons", special effects and over-the-top presentation were the norm for nomadic morality plays. They placed emphasis on the supernatural, the miracle, and the concepts of heaven and hell."

"Everyman" is inherently religious in its language and its overtones," he continued. "However, I feel that the message of this story and its basis in the concepts of salvation through good works and selflessness are just as important and secularly universal today as they were in 1495 when it was written. We are living in unprecedented and historic times. It is my hope that through this production we can all walk away with a new sense of what it means to live through adversity."

Flu shots offered early October

NOC is offering on-site flu clinics in October. Flu shots will be available in Tonkawa and Enid on Oct. 6 and in Stillwater on Oct. 8.

Flu shots will be available in Tonkawa at the Renfro Center from 9 a.m. – noon and at Enid in the Gantz Center from noon – 3 p.m.

Flu shots at Stillwater will be Oct. 8 from 1:30 p.m. – 3 p.m. in Room 120.

All employees must wear a face mask or face covering prior to arriving for the immunization clinic and for the duration of their visit.

Employees are asked to bring their insurance card(s) to avoid any delays in immunization.

Employees should only attend the clinic if they intend to receive an immunization. They are asked not to attend if they are feeling sick, have a fever, or are exhibiting any respiratory symptoms.

Employees are also asked to practice social distancing guidelines maintaining at least six-foot distance from others.

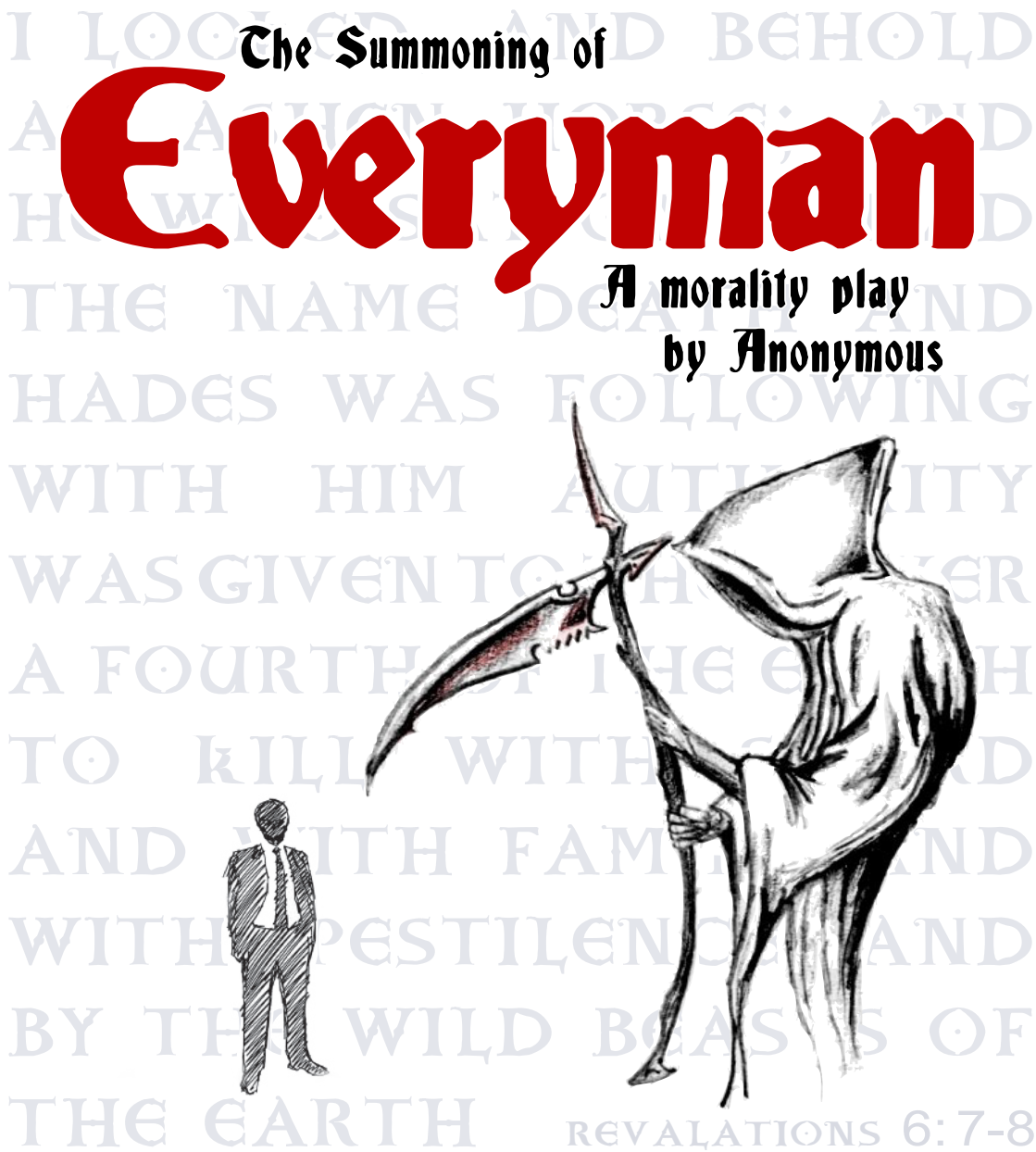
A pharmacist will take the temperature of each employee with a touch-free digital thermometer, immunization should be avoided if the employee is sick or has a fever.

Carl Renfro named to Oklahoma Higher Education Hall of Fame

Ponca City's Carl Renfro is among 11 individuals selected by The Oklahoma Higher Education Heritage Society for induction into the Oklahoma Higher Education Hall of Fame.

The 2020 induction ceremony, scheduled for Nov. 2, has been cancelled due to the continuing health and safety risks of the COVID-19 pandemic. The society will announce its plan for rescheduling the event to honor the class of 2020 in the near future.

"Carl has made significant contributions to the Northern Oklahoma College Foundation to endow a lectureship series for education, history and the arts," said Dr. Cheryl Evans, NOC President. "This beloved event brings the people of our region to campus to enjoy enriching experiences once each semester. Carl was honored by NOC, by naming a new facility the Renfro Center. In 2017, the Carl Renfro Scholarship Fund was established to assist deserving students from single parent households or single parent students reach their goals. I'm so proud that Carl is being honored by the Heritage Society. His support of students is deserving."

Renfro is a community and state leader promoting arts, education, economic development and the preservation of Oklahoma history. In 1993, Renfro co-founded the Standing Bear Native American Foundation and Standing Bear Native American Park. This park and foundation are overseen by a Native American committee consisting of leaders from six neighboring tribes: Kaw, Osage, Otoe-Missouri, Pawnee, Ponca and Tonkawa. Carl has raised millions of dollars to preserve and share the story of Chief Standing Bear, the first civil rights Native American leader.

Renfro played a major role in establishing

the University Center at Ponca City, which now provides higher education courses for Kay County. He also established the University Center Foundation, to provide scholarships for needy students, and he and his family endowed the foundation with permanent scholarship funds.

The Renfro's also made a significant contribution to the Northern Oklahoma College Foundation to endow a lectureship series for education, history and the arts. This beloved event brings the people of our region to campus to enjoy enriching experiences once each semester. Carl was honored by NOC, by naming a new facility the Renfro Center. In 2017, the Carl Renfro Scholarship Fund was established to assist deserving students from single parent households or single parent students reach their goals.

Renfro served on the Oklahoma State Regents for Higher Education for 12 years and served as chairman in 2004. In 2007, Renfro received the Distinguished Service Award from the Great Expectations Foundation for his past support of education.

Carl Renfro and the Renfro Family Foundation received the Oklahoma State Regents for Higher Education Business Partner Excellence Award as an outstanding partnership with Northern Oklahoma College. This award is designed to highlight successful partnerships and to further cultivate the higher learning environment through the State Regents' Economic

Bert Mackie named to Oklahoma Higher Education Hall of Fame

Enid's Bert Mackie is among 11 individuals selected by The Oklahoma Higher Education Heritage Society for induction into the Oklahoma Higher Education Hall of Fame.

The 2020 induction ceremony, scheduled for Nov. 2, has been cancelled due to the continuing health and safety risks of the COVID-19 pandemic. The society will announce its plan for rescheduling the event to honor the class of 2020 in the near future.

"Bert is passionate about helping people and creating opportunities for students," said Northern Oklahoma College President Dr. Cheryl Evans. "He is a man of his word and is an extremely hard worker. He is a very humble man who never seeks credit or the spotlight, however he has spent a lifetime quietly working behind the scenes to make things happen for others especially in education. He understands and values the important role that higher education plays in our state. I'm thankful that he has been willing to spend so much of his time invested in our students. We are thrilled that Bert is being recognized with this well-deserved honor."

As a young businessman, Mackie supported the former Phillips University in Enid and was an integral member of the scholarship fundraising team. He is a gifted fundraiser and has raised money to help students attend college for decades including Northern Oklahoma College and Northwestern Oklahoma State University students. In addition, he has served on the foundation boards of both NOC and NWOSU.

Mackie has been an advocate for the Oklahoma higher education serving as an Oklahoma State Regent for Higher Education from 1977-89 and as an advisory director for Oklahoma City University, and he is a past member of the board of

directors for the United Way of Enid and past president of the Enid Chamber of Commerce. He was named United Way Citizen of the Year in 2011 and is a recipient of the Enid Lifetime Achievement Award and the Pillar of the Plains Award, among numerous other honors.

He served as president of the Oklahoma Foundation for Excellence, a nonprofit organization that supports academic excellence in Oklahoma's public schools. Mackie is one of the foundation's founding trustees and continues to serve the organization since 1985.

He was also president, chief operating officer and vice chairman of the board for Security National Bank and served as trustee and asset manager for the Harold Hamm Family Trust. He also served as director of ONEOK and was one of nine members of the presidential-appointed board of governors for the U.S. Postal Service.

Mackie was a founding member of the Enid Higher Education Council and helped bring first the Enid Higher Education Learning Center to Enid and then Northern Oklahoma College and Northwestern Oklahoma State University campuses. He helped establish the "Bridge Program" between NOC and NWOSU even helping bring in a restored bridge to place between the schools' properties to show the partnership that exists and to remove physical barriers between the campuses.

The Mackie Planetarium on the NOC Enid campus is named in Mackie's Honor.

The test has been authorized only for the detection of the IgG antibody against SARS-CoV-2, not for any other viruses or pathogens. Blood drives will be managed according to CDC safety recommendations. Test results will be made available post-donation.
