Telara Day, Lexi Neahring crowned Thursday night

Winners of the dual Miss Northern Oklahoma College Scholarship Pageant held at NOC Tonkawa Oct. 26 were Lexi Neahring of Enid, Miss NOC Enid 2018 and Telara Day of Owasso, Miss NOC Tonkawa 2018.

They were crowned, respectively, by Miss NOC Enid 2017 Tarren Land, Enid, and by Miss NOC Tonkawa 2017 Kristen Hooper, Ponca City.

Each received a \$1000 scholarship expense award, Miss America crown and pin, sash and a bouquet of long-stemmed red roses. They will advance to the Miss Oklahoma Scholarship Pageant in Tulsa next June, according to pageant co-directors Terri Sunderland, NOC Enid, and Shannon Varner, NOC Tonkawa.

The new Miss NOC Enid is a sophomore majoring in business administration. She is the daughter of Dorothy and Donnie Neahring, Enid. Miss NOC Tonkawa 2018 is a sophomore majoring in music theatre. She is the daughter of Rebecca and Jerry Day, Owasso.

First runners-up in the pageant were Brianna Crosswhite of Enid, NOC Enid, and Taryn Pruett, Ponca City, NOC Tonkawa. Each received a \$600 scholarship expense award.

Second runners-up were Loren Decker, Ringwood, NOC Enid, and Malerie Davis, Blackwell. NOC Tonkawa. Each received a \$400 scholarship expense award.

Others vying for the title of Miss NOC Enid

were Veronica Fuxa, Enid; Kylee Smith, Kingfisher; and Chanley Young, Blackwell. Competing for Miss NOC Tonkawa were Kady Bonifield, Newkirk; Shelby Cosby, Kingston; and Kristin Phelps, Tonkawa. Each received a \$250 tuition waiver participation award.

Contestants were judged in lifestyle and fitness in swimwear, artistic expression, presence and poise in evening wear and on-stage question. Earlier in the day they were individually interviewed by the judges.

Edward Dixon, NOC Fine Arts Division chair, served as master of ceremonies for the evening. Miss Oklahoma 2017 Triana Browne spoke about her platform, "Bridging the Great Cultural Divide," emphasizing the importance of nurturing cultural compassion by motivating, empowering and educating children and young adults about other cultures. She entertained the audience by singing "Summertime" from the musical Porgy and Bess.

Special entertainment was by Miss NOC Enid 2017 Tarren Land, singing the Eagles' hit "Desperado," and Mr. Dixon, singing "Waving through a Window" from the Tony Award-winning musical Dear Evan Hansen. NOC alumnus Taylor Varner teamed with Mr. Dixon to sing "Those Magic Changes" from the Broadway musical Grease.

NOC hosts 'Concert in the Chapel' Sunday at Bivins Chapel in Enid

**NOC Music Department instructors Dineo Heilman, Dr. Abigail Mace and Brandon Haynes will appear at pipe organ restoration fund raiser at Marshall Building*

Northern Oklahoma College is hosting a "Concert in the Chapel" benefit at the Bivins Chapel in the Marshall Building Sunday, October 29 at 3 p.m.

Admission is free. Donations will be accepted for the restoration or replacement of the organ console and the repair of the pipes.

The concert is sponsored by the Northern Oklahoma College Music Department, featuring clarinetist Dineo Heilmann, pianist Dr. Abigail Mace and vocalist Brandon Haynes.

Dineo Heilmann is heading the Bivins Chapel Organ fund-raiser, with a goal of \$120,000.

Heilmann previously initiated a campaign to raise money for a Steinway grand piano for the Tonkawa Events Center. A total of \$54,000 was raised in less than three months.

Heilmann said he is excited to take on another fund raiser, especially one that is to save a great instrument with such historic value.

Heilmann, in his 30th year at NOC, is the former Division Chair serving 27 years in that position.

He was also an adjunct woodwind professor at Phillips University from 1997-1999.

The history of the organ dates to the 1950s.

According to a program from a dedication recital, the organ was originally dedicated in 1953, three years after the completion of the Marshall Building. The second dedication was in 1985.

When Dr. Joe Jones became Dean of Phillips University Seminary in 1975, he found the organ in disrepair and unplayable. For the next 10 years he raised money for the organ's resto-

ration.

A sum of \$54,000 was raised and the original builders of the organ, Haggard-Cotner Organ Company of Oklahoma City, removed the organ from the chapel and returned it to Oklahoma City for a total restoration. The organ has 29 ranks with 1,800 pipes. The exposed pipes were added in the 1985 restoration.

The first performance on the renovated organ was in 1985 at the wedding of Dr. and Mrs. Jones' daughter. The official debut of the organ followed in the fall of 1985 when Dr. Lawrence P Schreiber, Minister of Music at the National City Christian Church in Washington, D.C. played at the dedication service.

A Phillips University graduate, Barbara Angle, was one of the first to play the Haggard-Cotner pipe organ in the early 1950's.

"I used to play the organ for seminary and for chapel services," she said. "It was challenging to play but a lot of fun.

"I hated to practice," she joked. "It was in college that I became interested in the clarinet and organ so I studied organ while going to school at Phillips."

Funds donated will be used to renovate or replace the organ console and pipes.

The organ restoration will make the Bivins Chapel a venue for performances and celebrations. It will be an attraction for visitors to the Enid area and for those interested in the history of Phillips University.

Miss Oklahoma speaks to students at Cultural Engagement Center

Miss Oklahoma Triana Browne spoke to approximately 30 students regarding "Bridging Cultural Diversity One Step at a Time" at the Cultural Engagement Center on Thursday.

The speech and reception were sponsored by the Northern Thunder Club. Club members presented Browne with a jacket after her speech.

Browne, 24, was named Miss OSU while a student at Oklahoma State University. She was then later named Miss Oklahoma City before being named Miss Oklahoma. As Miss Oklahoma she represented Oklahoma in the Miss America Pageant in September.

Browne who is part Chickasaw and African American, told students about racial prejudice she faced as a young child.

"It was never an issue in my family," she said. "But it was to others."

She spoke of being an 8-year old where she was teased about her race.

"Even at a young age I realized that I was alone," she said. "I was a victim of bullying to the point that I was depressed and suicidal. That is a terrible thing to experience. I didn't look like anyone else and it was hard to deal with but I chose not to take a side."

She added she was a victim of racial bias at OSU.

"I was going to track practice one day and someone yelled at me saying, 'go back where you came from.'" She said.

"I wasn't sure exactly what they meant," Browne said with a chuckle. "Where would I go, Africa or Tulsa? It was sad to think that in today's time someone would say that but that is the world we live in."

"That's why my platform is about bridging those cultural gaps by having uncomfortable conversations because they are uncomfortable," she said. "As uncomfortable as they are we need

to have them."

She said the key to uncomfortable conversations is not to be angry.

"We are an angry society," she said. "But we have to remain calm and not allow our emotions to get the best of us. We can be passionate without being all about emotions."

Browne said she ran track at OSU and became involved in pageants to help her mother financially.

"There were scholarships available if you won the pageant," she said. "My mother was having



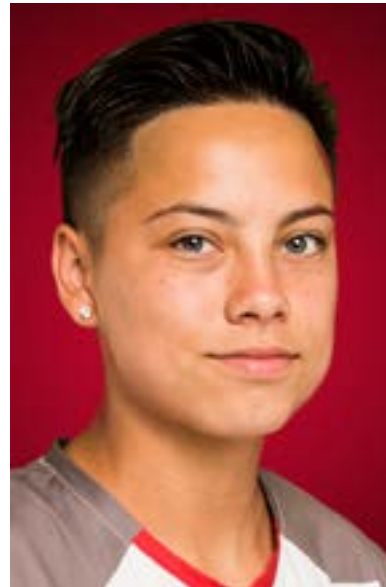
