

Jeremy Hise named Vice President for NOC Enid

Jeremy Hise, currently serving as an employee at Enid Public Schools, has been named vice president for NOC Enid replacing Raydon Leaton. He was previously employed by Northern Oklahoma College for 20 years. He will assume his new duties beginning May 24, 2021.

Hise will be located in the Everest Administration building on the Enid campus and will report directly to the president. As vice president, he will serve as a member of the NOC Executive Council and provide vision, leadership and strategic direction for NOC operations in Enid.

He will work collaboratively with others and provide leadership in the planning, organizing, and follow through of the Enid Campus's educational offerings for NOC, a multi-campus institution. Additionally, he will instruct six

credit hours during each fiscal year. Hise will also represent the institution to a variety of constituencies and promote the overall mission of the college; and will be responsible for ensuring the success of NOC Enid location.

"I'm pleased that Jeremy has accepted the responsibility of leading NOC Enid," NOC President Cheryl Evans said. "Jeremy loves Northern. He is a hard-working individual who will hit the ground running. I am confident that he will help guide NOC Enid in a positive direction with a focus on recruiting new students and helping the institution fulfill its mission in the Garfield county area."

During his career at Northern Oklahoma College, he has served as the assistant baseball coach, as a social science instructor and academic advisor earning the 2009 NISOD Excel-

lence Award for teaching, and President's Leadership Council advisor.

Hise spent his last seven years serving as the athletic director for the Enid and Tonkawa campuses of Northern.

Hise is a 1994 graduate of Perry High School. He earned an Associate of Arts degree from Northern Oklahoma College in 1998, a Bachelor of Arts in Education from the University of Central Oklahoma in 1999, and a Masters of Education from Northwestern Oklahoma State University in 2002.

Jeremy and his wife, Brandy, have been married since 1997 and have two adult children, Logan and Grace. Grace will graduate from NOC this spring making the entire family NOC alumni.

"Returning to NOC is a privilege and an honor," Hise said. "I want to thank Dr. Evans and

the search committee for providing me this opportunity. I look forward to working with all NOC students and staff to support them as they pursue their goals and grow the Enid campus."

Students select top NOC instructors

Northern Oklahoma College students selected instructors Cathy Ballard, Brian Baird, and Scott Harmon as the top instructors for 2020-21.

Instructors are selected based on the results of a survey with 221 students responding on which teacher helped them learn better than any other and what the teacher did to make that difference.

"It is so rewarding to read the results of the survey," Vice President of Academic Affairs Pam Stinson said, "because we can celebrate the top 3 for the time, energy, and passion that they put into helping students while also seeing how many of our instructors are having a similar impact."

"She made sure we understood. If you were struggling, she would take the extra time to work with you and help you. I never was good with math; because of her I was able to excel in both classes I had with her."

"Mrs. Ballard not only helped me learn but she also helped me feel more at home. She asked questions on how we were and told us stories about her life. I saw her on campus and she asked how my classes were going and offered help if I needed it."

"She takes her time to actually teach while still making sure we get all the material we need in. I feel that she truly cares about her students' education rather than just rushing through the course."

"Mrs. Ballard really took the time to make sure I was learning what she was teaching. If I didn't understand something, she wouldn't give up until I got it. She takes her time, is patient, and very kind."

"Mr. Baird takes the time to thoroughly explain his lectures. When one of his recordings didn't upload, he took the time to stay after class and go over the almost two-hour lecture again, just so it would be available to nursing students. Mr. Baird is an asset to NOC!"

"He engaged the class with questions, real life scenarios and made learning fun by providing comedic skits to enhance our memory."

"He is the most amazing, charismatic teacher that fights with his student to understand the material and walks with us to clarification. He goes out of his way to encourage each individual to do their best and strive for academic success and on top of that

Board of regents hear enrollment plans

The Northern Oklahoma College Board of Regents met Wednesday in Tonkawa hearing a report that enrollment for Summer 2021 and Fall 2021 will begin March 22.

Vice President for Enrollment Management Dr. Rick Edgington said approximately 5,000 prospective students would be receiving enrollment information from NOC through the new Jenzabar system. He also said that NOC would be contacting 2,000 high school students regarding the concurrent enrollment program with area high schools.

Regents also approved an Associate of Applied Science in Applied Technology degree option at Wednesday's meeting. Vice President for Academic Affairs Dr. Pam Stinson explained the degree option is part of a statewide initiative.

She explained the option allows NOC to accept technology certificates for credit toward a degree.

"It will allow more flexibility for students that are coming to NOC from the career tech system," Stinson said.

Vice President for Stillwater Diana Watkins said she has been setting up school days with Stillwater area high schools where students visit

the NOC Stillwater Classroom Building.

Vice President for Development and Community Relations Sheri Snyder announced the NOC Distinguished Alumni event is scheduled for Saturday, March 27 at the Renfro Center in NOC Tonkawa. Snyder said the event would be the first in-person event scheduled this spring. She said that five honorees will be inducted including Risha Grant, Jon Kissinger, and Marta Sullivan from the Class of 2020 and Dr. Justin Funk and Evelyn Coyle in the Class of 2021.

The program showcase was NOC Nursing Division Chair Dr. Nikole Hicks who highlighted the nursing program.

Dr. Hicks told regents that 124 students are currently enrolled in the nursing program at Tonkawa, Enid, and Stillwater campuses. She said the program has 12 full time and 11 part time faculty members.

She said the student nurses have assisted the Kay, Noble, and Payne Count Health Departments with COVID-19 vaccinations starting in December.

The next meeting is Wednesday, April 7 at the Renfro Center at NOC Tonkawa. Meeting time is 1 p.m.

CEC receives Tonkawa Tribal Language, historical books

The Northern Oklahoma College Cultural Engagement Center is the recipient of 10 Tonkawa Tribal Language Books and 10 historical books on the Tonkawa Tribe.

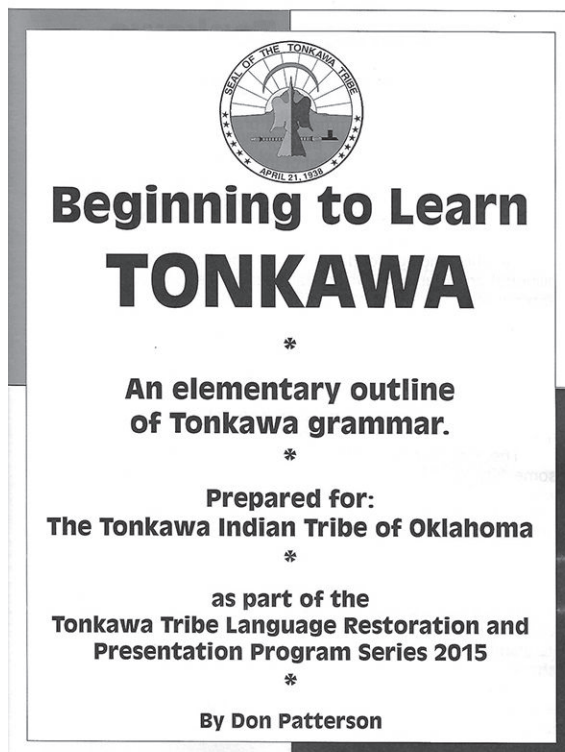
The books were prepared for the Tonkawa Indian Tribe of Oklahoma as part of the Tonkawa Tribe Language Restoration and Presentation Program Series 2015.

The Tonkawa Language book was written by Don Patterson, former Tonkawa Tribal Chief and is an elementary outline of Tonkawa grammar. The 22-page Tonkawa Language Book and History of the Tonkawa Tribe and Culture are available in the Cultural Engagement Center at NOC Tonkawa.

“Oklahoma holds the highest density of indigenous languages in the United States,” said Anna Roland, NASNTI (Native American Serving Non-Tribal Institution) Grant Project Director. “This ‘language hotspot’ includes languages originally spoken in the area as well as the languages of tribes from farther east that were forcibly relocated onto reservations in Oklahoma during the 1800’s. Many of these languages are highly endangered as the younger generations shift to speaking English. As an institution striving to support Native American students, NOC strives to support their culture and heritage in partnership with local tribes.”

The cultural/linguistic resources such as The Tonkawa Language book have been purchased by a U.S. Department of Education grant through the Native American-Serving Nontribal Institutions (NASNTI) program. The program is supportive of the initiative to develop support for Native American student success.

Anna Roland added, “The effort that has been made by the local tribes, nations and NOC staff

NOC students connect with legislators at Higher Ed Day

Students from Oklahoma's state system institutions and members of the public higher education community across the state connected with area legislators Tuesday, March 9, during a virtual advocacy day to promote the value and importance of higher education in Oklahoma.

Northern Oklahoma College had a total of 36 participants including NOC Regents, NOCF trustees, PLC students and NOC staff for Virtual Higher Education Day Tuesday morning. Representative Trish Ranson and Senator Bill Coleman joined in the virtual meeting.

In lieu of in-person legislative office visits and a formal program at the State Capitol, state system colleges and universities sponsored a variety of virtual activities on Virtual Higher Education Day to allow students, campus personnel, and community leaders to safely engage with legislators to demonstrate the critical role of our state system of higher education in Oklahoma's continued workforce development and

economic growth.

"We thank the students, faculty and staff from our public colleges and universities and the community champions across the state who support our campuses for reaching out virtually to Oklahoma House and Senate members to highlight the value of a college degree," said Chancellor Glen D. Johnson. "We look forward to working with Governor Stitt and the Legislature during this legislative session to demonstrate that our budget request for the state system of higher education is specifically designed to strengthen our state's economy and workforce."

For FY 2022, the Oklahoma State Regents for Higher Education have requested \$859.2 million, which reflects an increase of \$88.8 million or 11.5% over the FY 2021 appropriation of \$770.4 million.

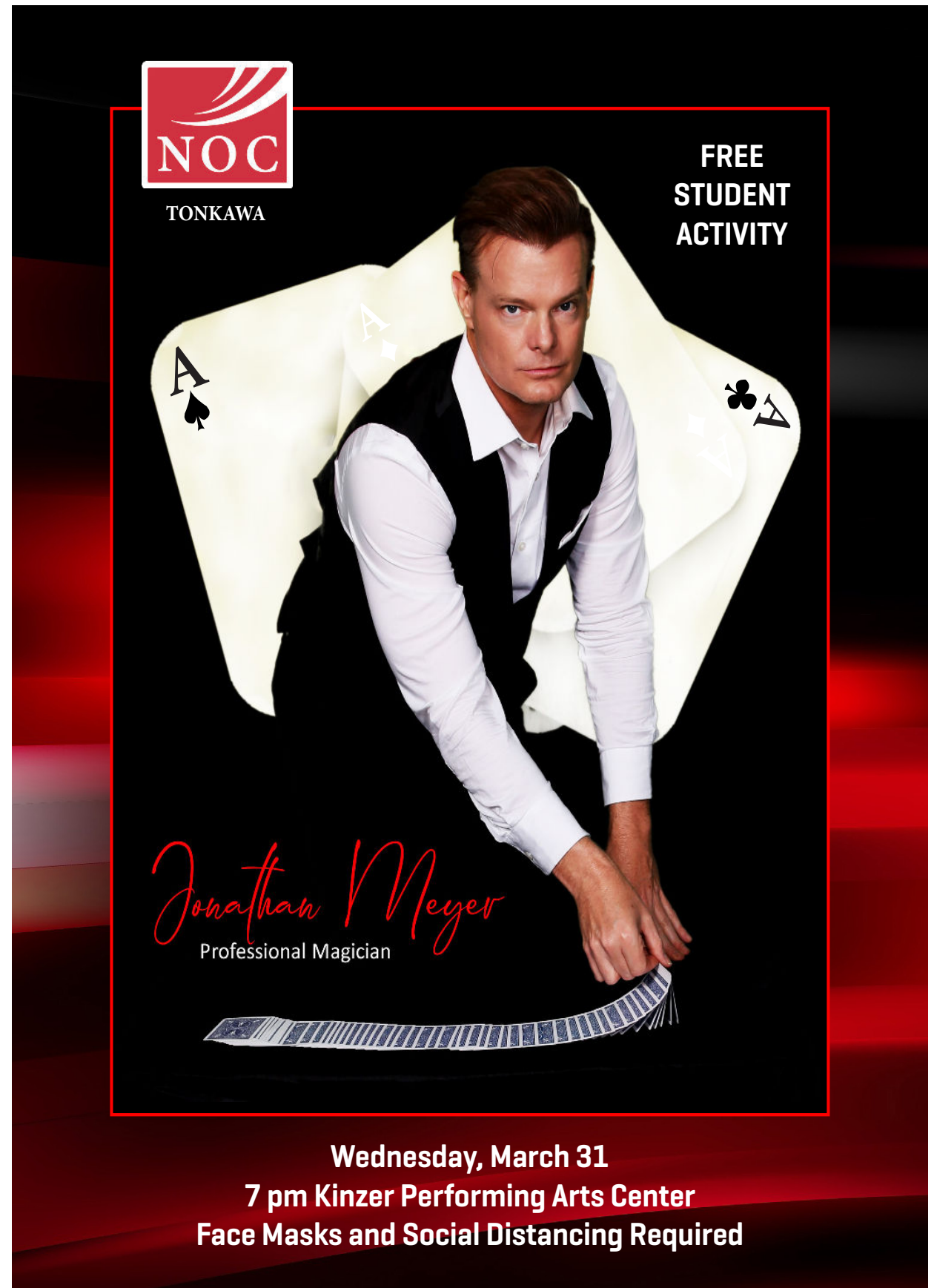
for cultural preservation has been outstanding and it shows."

Northern's Native American Student Success Specialist, who manages the center.

The CEC opened in 2017 and includes contemporary learning spaces where students, faculty, and/or tribal leaders can meet; individual study or collaborative projects can be conducted; culture-based learning activities and community/cultural events can be provided; professional development can be held; and small group or individual tutoring can occur. Northern is continually striving to support the Native American student population.

The State Regents are requesting \$33.8 million for STEM workforce development initiatives, including funds to help meet engineering, nursing, and teacher education workforce needs, increase the number of physician residency slots in the state, and develop microcredentials and rapid re-employment strategies.

Requests to restore financial aid and scholarship programs (\$9.8 million), to fully fund the concurrent enrollment program for high school seniors and juniors (\$4 million), and to provide endowed chair state matching funds bond authorization and debt service (\$10.4 million) are also top priorities in the budget request.

In addition, the State Regents are requesting \$30.8 million for operational cost increases, including systemwide mandatory fixed costs, Section 13 Offset deferred maintenance for campus infrastructure improvements, and funds to support STEM Summer Academies.

Another state system priority in the upcoming legislative session will be to maintain the

current law regarding weapons on higher education campuses. Oklahoma higher education supports the second amendment and gun ownership. Under current law, campus presidents have the discretion to authorize who may carry weapons on campus when the individual circumstances warrant it. The State Regents and the presidents of all 25 state system institutions strongly believe that the current law with regard to weapons on campus is working.

The State Regents will also continue efforts to preserve the dedicated funding source for the Oklahoma's Promise scholarship. Recognized by the Southern Regional Education Board as one of the top college access scholarship programs in the nation, Oklahoma's Promise is considered a national model that combines emphases on academic preparation and financial support for college. More than 95,000 students have earned college tuition scholarships through Oklahoma's Promise since the program's inception in 1992.
