Presidential Partner, Masonic Grant applications due

The Northern Oklahoma College Foundation is offering grants through the Masonic Fraternity of Oklahoma Endowment and the Presidential Partners Program.

These funds are made available to Northern Oklahoma College programs, students and employees whose proposed projects support the Foundation's mission of providing quality educational experiences. NOCF annually determines fund availability and will award grants based on annual earnings of the endowments.

The request forms are to be completed and returned to the Office of Development and Community Relations. The Masonic Endowment request is to be used exclusively for student support. The deadline for Masonic Endowment Grant consideration is September 15.

Presidential Partners funds may be used for student or employee support. Presidential Partners Grant requests may be submitted any time during the year. The Foundation will do its best to provide full or partial funding for all requests; however, submission does not guarantee any funding will be granted.

In 2020-2021, Presidential Partners Program awarded nearly \$70,000 to support the NOC campuses, NOC students and NOC employees during the ever changing environment that was created during the COVID-19 pandemic. Below are some highlights of how the program

was utilized during the last academic year:

- President's Leadership Council (PLC) — Provided funds to President's Leadership programs at Tonkawa, Enid and Stillwater to support activities as well as promotional items for PLC scholarship students during the 2020-2021 academic year.
- NOC Employees — Provided funds at Tonkawa, Enid and Stillwater to support employee professional development opportunities and enhancements, and NOC employee Christmas gifts during 2020-2021 academic year.
- NOC Institution — Fully funded four new defibrillators installed in the Renfro Center and Kinzer Performing Arts Center at NOC Tonkawa, the Gantz Center at NOC Enid and the NOC Classroom Building at NOC Stillwater.
- Nursing — Provided funding for new lab coats for all nursing faculty and a training defibrillator to be used by the Nursing Program at each location.
- NOC Alumni Relations — Virtual Spirit Week was sponsored by NOC Alumni Relations during the week leading up to graduation. Special events were held on NOC social media to highlight past alums and new alums. During the week,

graduates were encouraged to post how NOC was life changing for them.

- Language Arts – Provided funds for honor composition students to work with online learning students during the COVID-19 pandemic. The project, which focused on gratitude, consisted of writing letters to individuals they are grateful for, reading books, and creat-

ing a book of their own.

- NOC Recruiting and Retention Mini Grants — New for the 2020-2021 year, NOC employees were asked to submit grants as a way to boost recruiting and retention efforts. The grant committee selected twenty-three proposals

Men's soccer ranked 17th for 2021

The Northern Oklahoma College Mavs are ready to begin the 2021 season after a successful spring season that saw the Mavericks win the conference championship with a 9-2 record and ranked 8th in the nation before being upset in the NJCAA Region 2 semi-final.

The Mavs are ranked 17th in the pre-season poll.

Northern returns sixteen sophomores and has sixteen newcomers this fall. The Mavs have seven returning starters, and nine players that have started games in previous seasons.

"This is the most experienced team we have ever had at Northern," said coach Michael Duroy. "We lost both of our starting central midfielders and one forward, but everyone else is back."

Northern has a number of All-Region players returning including centerbacks Kai Lewis and Kareem Williams. All-Region forwards Damorney Hutchinson and Jesus Aleman return to lead the attack. Marcovich Brown, who led the conference in assists, is returning in the mid-

field. Outside backs Rahmon Oduborisa, Eventz Malaska, and Nathan Asiedu begin their third year of college soccer due to the NJCAA adding an additional year of eligibility for athletes due to COVID-19.

There are a host of talented incoming players that are looking to break into the lineup. Daniel Clarke is a tricky midfielder from Jamaica. Jaron Frye scored over one hundred goals in high school in Texas. His pace and technical ability will add to the Maverick attack. Leon Schmitter, Casey Clemo, and Harry Archer are battling returners Spencer Braswell and Nicolas Gutierrez for time in goal. Midfielders Jake Gadsen, Levi Egli, Dylan Gwyther, and Lewis Albert will have to step up in the midfield to replace All-Region central midfielders Gio Herrera and Brooks Rogers who have moved on to Oral Roberts University and Northeastern State University.

“It’s going to be an interesting year,” DuRoy said. “Covid is going to play a large part in the season. It hasn’t gone away. We have had four players test positive already and one other in quarantine from contact tracing. Most of our players are vaccinated and few others are going to get vaccinated soon, so that helps. It’s great having experience, but we can’t settle for what we accomplished last year. We need to get better every day. I think we have a chance to be good if we can get solid play in the midfield and consistent goal keeping. I really like where we are at every other position right now. We have some dangerous players up front and our defenders are difficult to break down.”

“We are really looking forward to our season. It will be great to play a full season, and it is our twenty-fifth season, so that makes it that much more special.”

Women's soccer opens Sunday

Northern Oklahoma College is set to kick off the 2021 women's soccer season with an NJCAA Region 2 conference game on Aug. 22 against Eastern Oklahoma State College.

The Mavs had a successful spring season with a 10-5 record and broke into the top twenty in the nation at #18 last season.

Northern returns ten sophomores with nine players having experience starting at least one game.

All American Milica Bulatovic headlines the returners. The Serbian national team player was one of the nation's leaders in goals scored last season. All-Region centerback Rachael Chatterji returns to lead the back line. Jamie Rowlands and Larissa Haagsma split time in goal

last season, and Jordan Webster returns in goal as well after playing on the field last season. Janet Moreno was All-Region as a forward last season and is returning up front with Bulatovic. Marissa Neil, Cory Torres, and Nicole Anderson all started in the midfield last year.

The freshman class brings a lot of excitement to the team with several players that will break into the lineup immediately. Wingers Chloe Wilkins and Jazmine Furra have good pace and can take players on, according to DuRoy. Samantha Mendez and Abbi Vargas have been great in training in the midfield. The backline should be improved with Heidi Wiedermeier, Josie Jarvis and Lexi Albright all expected to challenge for starting spots right away.

"I'm excited about the year," said coach Michael DuRoy. "We have improved our athleticism, technical ability, and tactical ability. The women's game at this level usually comes down to who can stay healthy. We have way more depth this year than last year, but injuries at a few spots could cause us some problems. If we stay healthy we should contend for the conference championship."
