Regents hold first meeting with Dr. Harris

The Northern Oklahoma College Board of Regents met Wednesday at NOC Tonkawa in Dr. Clark Harris' first meeting as NOC president.

"I am so excited to be here," Dr. Harris said.
"The Northern employees and area communities we serve have made me feel so welcome.
Everyone has been phenomenal and I can see the tremendous work ethic of our employees.
I've been having meetings to get acclimated and I think things are going well in my first month."

Regent Jami Groendyke was administered the Oath of Office by Hon. Lee Turner, Kay County Special District Judge for Kay County. Groendyke was appointed by Governor Kevin Stitt in 2020 to a one-year unexpired term and reappointed to a five-year term in 2021.

Wednesday's meeting was also the first meeting for Regent Chair Michael Martin of Stillwater. During introductions of visitors and guests, he welcomed Assistant Attorney General Whitney Herzog Scimeca who is newly assigned to represent our institution on behalf of the legal counsel division of the Oklahoma Office of the Attorney General.

The regents approved the school's food service vendor for NOC Tonkawa and NOC Enid. NOC has entered into a contract with Aladdin Campus Dining. Vice President for Financial Affairs Anita Simpson said she is excited about

The Northern Oklahoma College Board of the new vendor and what they are going to offer gents met Wednesday at NOC Tonkawa in students this fall.

In other business, the regents approved the installation of a new signage on the NOC Enid campus. The sign is located on Garriott Road. The \$35,000 sign is funded by a combination of private and college funds.

Vice President for Community Relations and Development Sheri Snyder reported that Dr. Cheryl Evans, President Emeritus, was named the Enid YWCA Woman of the Year at a ceremony in Enid July 15.

Snyder and Vice President for Enrollment Management Dr. Rick Edgington also explained to the regents the marketing plans for NOC to reach prospective students through regular mail and digital means. The plan targets NOC's service area but also other areas in the Oklahoma and Kansas markets.

Vice President for Student Affairs Jason Johnson reported that NOC had one positive COVID-19 case currently ongoing. Johnson said that his office will continue to track COVID-19 cases as students come back to campus this fall.

Vice President for Stillwater Diana Watkins said she has been meeting with Oklahoma State officials to better incorporate NOC Gateway students into student activities at OSU to provide a better experience for students interested



Lorraine Caddy makes memorabilia donation to NOC

Choctaw's Lorraine Cadrecently donated a number of historical artifacts to North-Oklahoma College in memory of her companion and 1939 NOC graduate Charlotte Dee Mansfield, SMSgt (Ret) USAF.

Mansfield, originally from Garber, Oklahoma, was a journalism student at NOC and editor of The Maverick, NOC's student newspaper, in ing Herbert Hoover and Harry Truman. 1939.

Caddy's donation on Mansfield's behalf included a bound book which includes copies of The Maverick from 1935-1939. The bound book will be housed at the A.D. Buck Museum lahassee, Florida. on the NOC Tonkawa campus.

Mansfield passed away in 2007 at the age of 92 but her memory lives on in Caddy, who now lives in Choctaw.

Mansfield was born in California and moved to Garber at age 8. She graduated from Garber High School in 1934. She studied journalism at NOC before joining the military and beginning a career as a photojournalist.

After joining the United States Air Force, Mansfield was sent to aeriphotography school in Colorado and then served in WWII arriving in shortly England before D-Day (June 6, 1944) where she was assigned to the 325th Photo Wing.

Florida State University recently produced a documentary in 2020 on Mansfield's life and career. Her war memorabilia are housed at the Florida State University WWII Institute in Tal-

The documentary was entitled "Charlotte Mansfield: A Woman Photographer Goes to War" using unpublished military photographs and personal correspondence from the Institute on World War II and the Human Experience at Florida State, as well as expert and family interviews, to tell the story of Mansfield's experiences during the war.

After attending NOC, Mansfield attended According to Caddy, Mansfield's father was UCO, graduating with a bachelor's degree in English in 1941, she returned there in 1981 to complete a BS in Photo Journalism and a Master's Degree in Journalism in 1983.
