Miss NOC held at KPAC in Tonkawa

The annual dual Miss Northern Oklahoma College Tonkawa-Miss Northern Oklahoma College Enid Scholarship Competition is set for Tuesday, Oct. 26 at NOC Tonkawa.

Nine Miss NOC Tonkawa candidates and three candidates for the Miss NOC Enid title will perform on stage in the Kinzer Performing Arts Center beginning at 7:30 p.m.

Admission to the competition is free.

Miss NOC Tonkawa candidates include Stephanie Henry, Ponca City; Emma Valgora, Ponca City; Makayla Seeney, Kingston; Hannah Haley, Tonkawa; Mariah Moberly, Oklahoma City; Addison Doyen, Tonkawa; Mikaila Kraus, Okarche; Chandler Brown, Ponca City; and Regan Clapper, Pawnee.

Miss NOC Enid candidates are Mia-Claire Jones, Morrison; Kaylyn Marr, Enid; and Carina Ramirez, Garber.

Prior to the competition, candidates will be individually interviewed by judges. During the competition, they will compete in artistic ex-

pression, presence and poise in evening wear and on-stage question and social impact statement.

Miss NOC Tonkawa 2021 and Miss NOC Enid will receive a \$1000 scholarship expense award and a \$1,000 cash scholarship to be used for their education. Scholarship expense awards in the amounts of \$600 and \$400 will go to the first and second runners-up respectively, and each non-finalist will receive a \$250 tuition waiver participation award.

Dr. Edward Dixon, NOC fine arts division chair, will act as master of ceremonies for the competition.

The current Miss Tonkawa is Carli Pendleton, the current Miss NOC Enid is Emily Hall. They have served two years due to COVID-19 cancelling the 2020 event.

Directors for the Miss NOC competition include, Shannon Varner and Terri Sunderland.

Social distancing and face masks are strongly encouraged.

Soccer playoffs start Thursday in Enid

NOC Soccer begins the 2021 playoffs next week at Enid High School.

The women's tourney begins Thursday while the men begin Friday.

The #15 NOC women (14-3, 12-3 in Region 2) finished as the #3 seed in Region 2 behind Seminole State and Rose State. The Mavs' women

will play at 6 p.m. Thursday.

The #16 NOC men (12-3-2, 9-1-2 in Region 2) won the regular season conference tournament and enter the tourney as the top seed. They play at 9 a.m. Friday morning.

The official brackets and match-ups will be released on Monday.



Investiture set for next Friday afternoon

The investiture for Dr. Clark Harris, the 14th president for Northern Oklahoma College, will be held Friday, Oct. 29, in the Foster-Piper Fieldhouse on the Northern Oklahoma College Tonkawa campus at 2 p.m.

The event also coincides with the 120-year anniversary of Northern Oklahoma College.

Dr. Harris assumed the NOC presidency on July 1, 2021 following Dr. Cheryl Evans who held the post for 10 years.

The tradition of an investiture officially marks the beginning of a new leader's administration. Sometimes referred to as an "inauguration", the investiture is an academic ceremony held to confer the official power of the office upon a new college president, usually held during their first year in office. An investiture reflects academic traditions, celebrates institutional history, and symbolizes a new era in the life of the institution. The ceremony begins with a formal procession, much like a commencement. The procession includes the individuals in the platform party participating in the ceremony, delegates from the other Oklahoma colleges and universities, and from NOC faculty. Faculty will wear full academic regalia during the investiture procession and ceremony that follows.

The ceremony will include congratulatory remarks from Oklahoma State Regents for Higher Education, greetings from NOC Foundation Board of Trustees Chair Linda Brown on behalf of supporters of higher education, and the official presentation of the symbols of a high office by president emeritus Dr. Cheryl Evans.

The NOC College Choir and Concert Band will perform. A reception will follow the in-

vestiture on the circle lawn just south of Foster-Piper Fieldhouse. An invitation-only delegate luncheon will be held at the Renfro Center from 12:00 – 1:30 p.m. The 2 p.m. investiture is open to the public.

NOC is limiting capacity to 70% of the maximum indoor facility seating to ensure possibility of social distancing. The event will be available on Livestream at <https://www.noc.edu/athletics/streaming/noc-events-streaming/>.

NOC has new live mascot

Northern Oklahoma College has a new “live” mascot.

“Mav” is a longhorn steer with a ‘legendary’ story of origin. He will be managed by the Northern Aggies Club and appear at parades, sporting events, community events and have a place of honor at the NOC Ag Facility.

There have been a number of references to a live longhorn as the NOC mascot in NOC’s history.

According to the NOC history book “A century of excellence,” *The Maverick* student newspaper was founded in 1921 with a steer as the

emblem of the newspaper.

In 1955, *The Maverick* was honored for the story, “Old Mav Comes Home.”

the story says that “Old Mav was the longhorned mascot who, along with the rest of the college herd, had been pastured all summer on the Frank Midgely ranch east of Newkirk. Student writer Henry DeVilliers won the Silver Cup at the Oklahoma College Press Association for his personification of the return of the favored maverick.”

Legend has it that back in the great blue northern of '21, a newborn calf lost his mother. After days of surviving subzero temps in an abandoned badger den, the calf emerged and set out to find his lost herd. Northern Oklahoma College is offering SMS services for NOC students that are single parents.

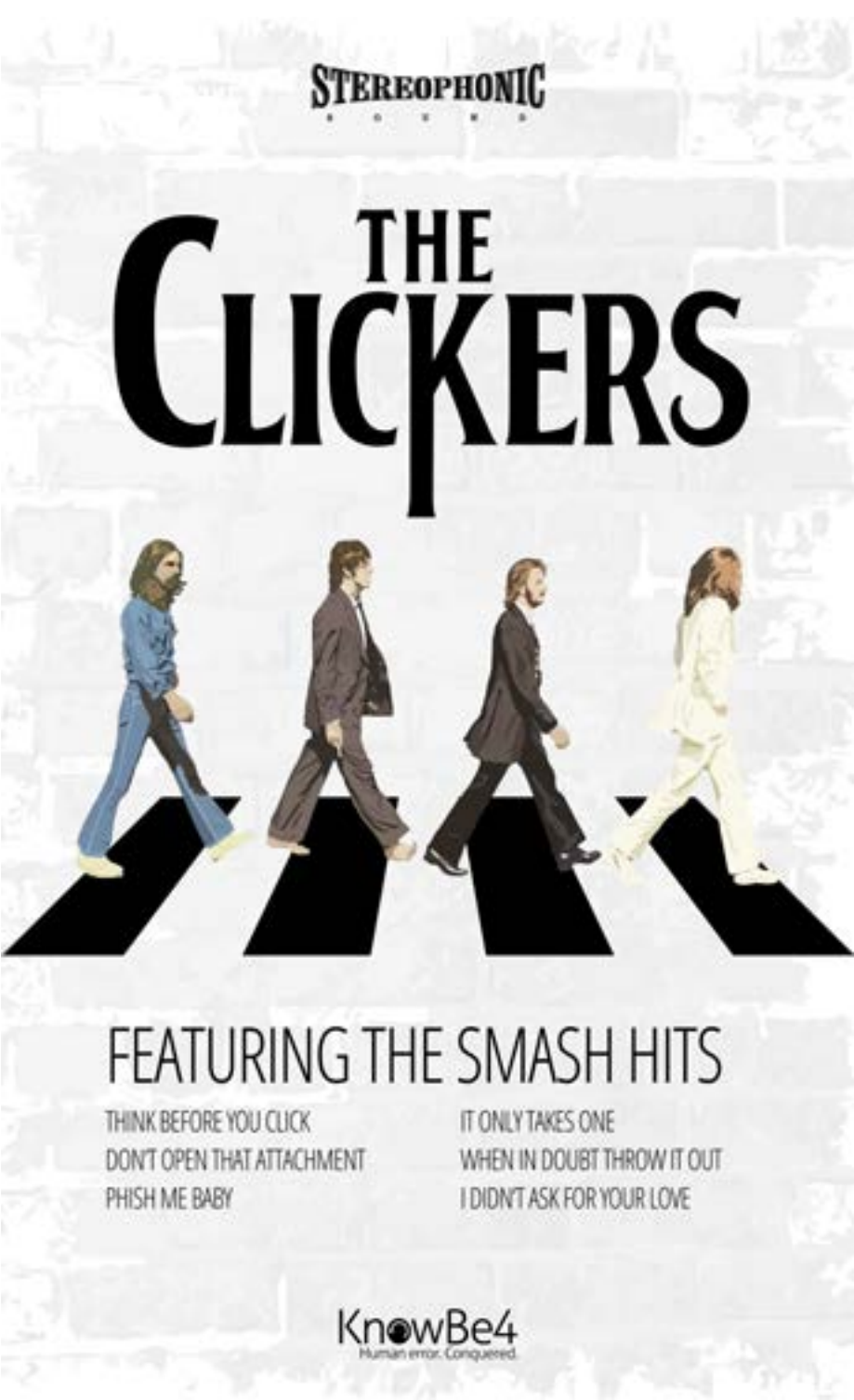
