

“At the end of the day, we can’t want it more than they do.” -Mike Boettcher

Award winning journalist Mike Boettcher spoke at Northern Oklahoma College Tuesday night on the War in Afghanistan for the Carl and Carolyn Renfro Endowed Lectureship Series.

Boettcher’s 90-minute lecture highlighted his experiences imbedded with United States forces in the War in Afghanistan and what went wrong.

In his lecture, Boettcher explained a number of issues regarding the war including the lack of a cohesive strategy both militarily and diplomatically, the impact of neighboring country Pakistan on the war, and corruption of the Afghan government.

He showed four videos that characterized what U.S. forces were doing during the war including clearing enemy outposts and protecting U.S. interests in Afghanistan.

Boettcher’s more recent concern was for his translators who helped him during his time in Afghanistan when the U.S. recently pulled its forces out of the country.

“My concern was for some of the translator’s I was with in Afghanistan, we were trying to work any magic they could work to try and get them out with some success and some failures,” he said.

Boettcher said the U.S.’s involvement was easy

to predict after Sept. 11, 2001.

“I had read a short AP (Associated Press) story that one of the intelligence services had predicted a mass casualty event within one year, said Boettcher of the 2001 article. “Then, when Sept. 11 occurred, I called my wife from Atlanta and told her, ‘We are at war.’”

His biggest concern throughout the conflict was the U.S.’s attempt at nation building.

“At the end of the day, we can’t want it more than they do,” Boettcher reiterating a military official. “They (Afghans) have to want this worse than we do.”

Boettcher is recognized as one of the world’s most experienced foreign correspondents, covering wars and revolutions in every part of the globe since 1980. He spent four of the past 20 years in Afghanistan covering America’s longest war.

Boettcher helped launch the era of 24-hour live news coverage when on June 1, 1980, he performed the first live satellite report for a fledgling network called CNN. In almost four decades of assignments covering global conflict for NBC News, CNN and ABC, Mike Boettcher has witnessed, investigated and been a victim of terrorism himself. He was kidnapped and threatened with execution in El Salvador in 1985. Twenty years later, he survived a suicide bomb-

er attack and a roadside bombing in Baghdad. Boettcher covered the emergence of modern terrorist tactics in the early 1980’s in Lebanon when the U.S. Marine barracks was bombed, killing 241. Since 1998, when the U.S. embassies in Africa were bombed, he has been assigned to investigate every major Al Qaeda attack against American targets. In 2000 he created and directed the CNN Terrorism Investigation Unit and led the networks investigation of the 9-11 attacks.

Boettcher is the winner of six national Emmys and a Peabody award. He is one of 5 reporters in history to win national Emmy’s for three different networks. He teaches journalism at his alma mater, the University of Oklahoma, and serves as a Senior Fellow at the OU Center for Intelligence and National Security.

Dr. Eladio Bobadilla graduated with a BIS degree from Weber State University in Ogden, Utah in 2012.

He enrolled in the history PhD program at Duke University in 2013, where he was awarded the Dean's Graduate Fellowship. While at Duke, he also received several other prestigious fellowships and grants, including the Gilder Lehrman Scholarly Fellowship, the Mellon Fellowship for Dissertation Research in Original Sources, the Ottis Green Fellowship, a Bass Instructional Fellowship, the John Higham Research Fellowship, and the George Pozzetta Dissertation Award. In May of 2019, he completed his dissertation, titled, *One People without Borders: The Lost Roots of the Immigrants' Rights Movement, 1954-2006*, under the supervision of his primary adviser, Dr. Nancy MacLean.

In 2020, the dissertation was awarded the Herbert G. Gutman Prize from the Labor and Working-Class History Association (LAWCHA). His first book, based on his dissertation and tentatively titled *Without Border: The Roots and Consequences of the Immigrants' Rights Movement*, will be published by the University of Illinois Press as part of the Working Class in American History series.

Study Abroad Opportunities with NOC in 2022

Northern Oklahoma College Global Education and World Geography Instructor Wade Watkins announced seven opportunities to study overseas at NOC.

“One aspect of the college experience students may not have considered, or even heard about, is traveling abroad with a NOC faculty member or two on a short-term study abroad program, where students explore an amazing corner of the world while earning academic credit towards a degree,” Watkins said. “It’s a fantastic way to earn college credit hours while gaining valuable knowledge and experience from exposure to a new country and culture. And it’s easier and more affordable than students think.”

Watkins said NOC has taken more than a thousand students on short-term study abroad programs, to 39 countries, on all seven continents. And for 2022, NOC is offering seven global education programs to choose from. They are:

March 11-18/spring break: **ENGLAND & SCOTLAND*** – 3 optional credit hours of humanities/international dimension

May 18-26: **THE ALPS!*** – 3 optional credit hours of humanities/international dimension

May 21-28: **CUBA*** – 3 optional credit hours of humanities/international dimension

May 29-June 10: **NEW ZEALAND*** – 3 optional credit hours of humanities/international dimension

June 18-30: **NOC BALI SUMMER PROGRAM** – 7 credit hours (4 lab science + 3 humanities/international dimension)

July 3-15: **NOC DUBLIN SUMMER PROGRAM** – 6 credit hours (6 humanities/international dimension)

July 17-29: **NOC LONDON SUMMER PROGRAM** - 6 credit hours (6 humanities/international dimension)

“We hope you have a wonderful semester and give some thought to traveling the world to earn a few of your college credits,” Watkins added. “Students will definitely gain some valuable global experience and knowledge, which will undoubtedly expand their personal, professional, and academic opportunities. Many of NOC’s past participants have noted that their study abroad program was their most influential experience while in college.”

Non-NOC students can join the program as well and earn college credits to transfer to their home institutions. And any of the above programs marked with an asterisk (*) mean that they are one of NOC’s Global Community Programs, which means they are open to students and non-students (the credit hours are optional), so friends or family members can join the global adventure.

NOC Offers COVID-19 Vaccine Incentive Program

Northern Oklahoma College is offering a COVID-19 Vaccine Incentive Program for students and employees.

"The health of our students and employees in our NOC Family is of critical importance," said NOC President Dr. Clark Harris. "As the cases decreased this summer many people dropped their guard to COVID-19, although we are learning that the variants have increased transmission rates and that people that are testing positive is back to the November 2020 levels. We have learned that people that are vaccinated are less likely to become infected, and if infected the severity of their illness is greatly reduced."

"NOC wants to help keep you healthy, keep you learning in the classrooms, and allow you to stay active in college athletics and activities," Harris added. "We can best accomplish this by having as many people vaccinated as possible at all NOC campuses. We are incentivizing this by creating a COVID-19 Vaccination Incentive Contest."
