'Legally Blonde' on stage through Sunday at KPAC

The NOC Division of Fine Arts presents "Legally Blonde, The Musical" Nov. 11-14 at the Kinzer Performing Arts Center in Tonkawa. Show times are 7:30 p.m. Thursday – Saturday and 2 p.m. Sunday.

The musical is directed by NOC Fine Arts Instructor Chad Anderson.

Anderson said the following in his director's notes:

"Movies adapted into musicals go back a long way (An American in Paris, High Society, State Fair) but their recent popularity is undeniable. In the mid-nineties, Andrew Lloyd Webber's Sunset Boulevard launched a trend of film-to-





stage musicals with questionable critical success but considerable commercial triumph. 1997's Footloose musical didn't please critics, but audiences still flock to see the classic 80s film's stage version today. Since then, writers have found abundant source material for many modern musicals. Now it seems most new Broadway musicals originate from the screen (Millie, Shrek, The Wedding Singer, The Addams Family, The Producers, The Color Purple, Mean Girls, Beetlejuice).

I, for one, am a fan. We hope you are tonight, as well."

Music and lyrics by Laurence O'Keefe and Nell Benjamin. Based on the novel by Amanda Brown and the Metro-Goldwyn Mayer motion picture. The book is by Heather Hach.

Admission is free, there is limited seating. Social distancing and face masks are strongly encouraged. Children Under 12 must be accompanied by an adult.

Pueblo Pottery exhibit at NOC

"Many thanks to Ron Licklider who has graciously loaned over 30 outstanding pieces to the college," Schmitz said. "I also want to recognize art students from this semester's Ceramics class who contributed research and narrative for the exhibit: A.J. Aguilar, Kelsey Grigg, Jackie Galvin, Ash Herard, Thomas Jenkins and Zoe Oxford."

"The art of making pottery among the Pueblo peoples dates back at least 2000 years.," she said. "Pueblo" is the Spanish word for 'village' or 'small town' and is associated with a distinct cultural group in southwestern United States. When Spanish explorers first arrived in "New Mexico" in the 16th century, they encountered Native settlements in the fertile Rio Grande Valley. The Pueblo people subsequently lost

occupied the area prior to this consolidation."

She said originally pieces were used as a function of society but then many pieces were produced due to western expansion and tourism.

"After the Santa Fe Trail opened in the 1820s, manufactured goods became readily available and there was a decrease in functional pottery production," she said. "Despite fewer vessels being produced, many of the forms and designs that characterize each Pueblo's style were well established by 1880 when the Transcontinental Railway cut across the Southwest. The railroad and Route 66 highway system that followed in the 1920s and 30s stimulated rapid changes in Pueblo life brought by tourism and commercialization of Pueblo art and culture."

The exhibit is open 1 p.m. - 5 p.m. Monday -Friday and also during performing arts events.




NOC Sheep Center at Tulsa State Fair






What are the strengths of this year's team?
