



## Scholarship priority deadline Feb. 20

Northern Oklahoma College is continuing to accept scholarship applications for Fall 2022.

Applicants applying for the Presidential Leadership Scholarship, the NOC/OSU Gateway Ambassadors Scholarship or the State Regents Academic Scholarship must apply by Feb. 20. Priority deadline for all other scholarships is Feb. 20 with scholarships awarded to qualified applicants on a first come, first serve basis until Aug. 25.

To apply, simply apply for admission to NOC,

For the 2020-2021 fiscal year budget, the college allocated over \$2.7 million in waivers and scholarships support, which is 11.6% of our operational budget. These waivers and scholarships continue to assist our students with academic accomplishments and participation in college activities.

Additionally, through the NOC Foundation during the 2020-2021 academic year, the Founda-

tion awarded over \$197,000.00 in scholarships to 394 recipients from the Tonkawa, Enid and Stillwater campuses. So far, this 2020-2021 academic year, NOC has awarded over \$94,000 in scholarships to 176 students.

According to Sheri Snyder, Vice President for Development and Community Relations, "PLC and State Regents scholarships will be awarded based on the upcoming February 20 deadline. However, priority deadline for all other scholarships, which will begin February 20, is ongoing with scholarships awarded to qualified applicants on a first come, first

serve basis until August 25."

To be considered for scholarships, applicants are required to complete the Free Application for Federal Financial Aid (FAFSA) at [www.fafsa.ed.gov](http://www.fafsa.ed.gov) (Northern's Title IV Institutional Code is 003162) within 30 days of accepting a scholarship award.

## Jets walk-off win in season opener

Tanner Holliman had quite a day on opening day crushing two home runs including a walk-off grand slam leading NOC Enid past NE Nebraska 6-5 in Game 1 of a doubleheader at David Allen Memorial Ballpark.

Holliman, a sophomore from Edmond's Oklahoma Christian School, also doubled for the Jets while second baseman Zach Escovedo had two hits and two runs scored. Catcher Blake Scott added a double and two runs scored.

Holliman's first blast scored Scott in the fourth inning tying the score at 2-2.

Then in the seventh, the Jets were down to their final out when Holliman's no doubter scored Scott, Escovedo, and Ty Chapman giving NOC the 6-5 win.

Piercen Mcelyea started for the Jets allowing two runs over three innings, Murphy Gienger allowed three unearned runs in 3.2 innings. Gunner Phillips struck out the only batter he faced to earn the win from the Jets' bullpen.

In Game 2, NE Nebraska won the daylight shortened nightcap 5-3 in five innings.

Dillon Dibrell was the starter allowing one run on three hits over three innings. He had relief help from Jack Cline and Lane Behmyer.

NE Nebraska scored a four spot in the fourth erasing a 3-1 early Jets lead.

# Shortages at local facility leaves staff vulnerable

Due to the overwhelming staff shortages at Liberty Health Corporation, a local mentally disabled facility, clients have been unable to enjoy activities in the community, causing many to become agitated and hostile towards the already exhausted staff.

“People are having to pull a lot of hours so people are quitting because they are tired,” says employee Rhonda Julian. “This field is very challenging.”

With many clients having attacked staff in the past, Rhonda says the limited employees “leaves staff on the wing more vulnerable”.

When asked if the staff shortages seem to be affecting the clients, Rhonda replied, “Yes. They’re used to doing activities like going out into the community and doing things to keep their mind occupied. Without the staff to take

them to do those things, they are stuck in the wing, and they get agitated.”

Liberty Health in Enid works with dually diagnosed clients suffering from mental disabilities, some with years of mental and physical abuse. Clients may enter this Enid facility for a variety of reasons such as criminal activity or the inability to function in society.

“Our company trains us and writes up programs on how to deal with the diagnoses they have,” says Rhonda. “We teach them how to become a normal functioning person in society like keeping a job and learning how to take care of themselves, how to do laundry, how to bathe. They learn to be responsible.”

Staff shortages continue to be an issue across the United States with the omicron covid variant and the call for businesses to pay higher wages.
