State Academic Teams were introduced in 1994 as a way to provide scholastic recognition to community college students, while promoting excellence at two-year colleges.

OACC is the organization of Oklahoma's 14 NOC students were recognized during a two-year colleges. Formed to advocate for the two-year college system as a powerful resource for economic and educational development, OACC also works to build awareness of community colleges as an excellent resource for students of all ages, at all stages of their careers.


He said they can dim the sun and show the planets near the sun in our afternoon sky. Visitors will be able to see which zodiac constellation the sun and planets are visiting this month

from Mercury to Pluto.



Irene Asai Clem is a member of the Garfield County Bar Associate and currently voluntarily assigned as Assistant District Attorney.






This trip was only possible with fundraising efforts and a generous grant from the NOC Foundation.
