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State regents allocate funds for colleges with incentives for workforce graduates

The Oklahoma State Regents for Higher Education allocated state appropriations for Oklahoma's state system of higher education for Fiscal Year 2023 today, including targeted investments in workforce development initiatives in critical high-demand fields, such as STEM and teacher education. State Regents approved \$873.4 million in state appropriations, representing a 7.5% increased investment by legislators and the Governor over FY 2022.

"We are focused on ensuring Oklahoma's higher education system is producing graduates in critical occupations to not only meet our state's workforce needs, but to give Oklahomans the greatest advantage possible to have economic security for themselves and their families," said State Regents' chairman Jeff Hickman. "States with a higher percentage of college degree-holders have higher per capita incomes and stronger, more diversified economies, and we are pleased that legislators and the Governor recognize this and have entrusted us with resources to accelerate opportunities for Okla-

homa's future."

For public colleges and universities, the next step in the budget process is to formulate their operating budgets for FY 2023. Following approval by institutional governing boards, the State Regents will consider these proposed operating budgets at the June 23 meeting.

"Of Oklahoma's 100 critical occupations, 66 will require a college degree by 2028," said Chancellor Allison D. Garrett. "As demand for a college educated workforce continues to grow, this significant investment in public higher education will enable our state system to build Oklahoma's workforce and drive economic growth."

State Regents also prioritized funding for innovations in institutional shared services, online education and scholarships to incentivize college degree completion.



Kim Brewer earns first NOC Nursing DAISY Award®

Northern Oklahoma College nursing faculty member Kim Brewer was honored with The DAISY Award® for Extraordinary Nursing Faculty at the NOC 2022 Nurses' Pinning Ceremony Saturday, April 30, at Briggs Auditorium at NOC Enid.

The award is part of The DAISY Foundation's mission to express gratitude to nurses with programs that recognize them for the extraordinary, compassionate and skillful care they provide patients and families.

DAISY Award recognitions honor the super-human work nurses do for patients and families every day wherever they practice, in whatever role they serve, and throughout their careers – from Nursing Student through Lifetime Achievement in Nursing.

The DAISY Award for Extraordinary Nursing Faculty was established by The DAISY Foundation in memory of J. Patrick Barnes who died at age 33 from Immune thrombocytopenia (ITP), an auto-immune disease. The Barnes Family was awestruck by the clinical skills, caring and compassion of the nurses who cared for Patrick. They created this international award to demonstrate appreciation to faculty for their commitment and inspirational influence on their nursing students and to say thank you to nursing faculty everywhere.

NOC Nursing Division Chair Dr. Nikole Hicks said, "NOC's nursing faculty work tirelessly to ensure future nurses have a strong foundation to provide nursing care for our communities. Kim Brewer is an exceptional example of what nursing faculty should be." According to Brewer's nomination letters, "she has worked extremely hard to make our learning experience exceed expectations, listened to our voices, and advocated for our best interest as future

nurses. She is the master of therapeutic communication and has shown a respect for each of us. She is knowledgeable, dependable, and consistent. Brewer takes every new challenge thrown at her with perseverance and spirit. She has shown me how a great attitude can affect the people around you positively. All of these qualities make a great nurse AND an amazing instructor."

Brewer earned a Bachelor of Science in Nursing from Northwestern Oklahoma State University in 1996 and a Master of Science in Nursing Education from the University of Oklahoma in 2019. She graduated summa cum laude from both programs and, while at OU, received the Dean's Award for Academic Excellence from the Fran & Earl Ziegler College of Nursing. Mrs. Brewer has been a faculty member in the Nursing Division at NOC for four years, but her love of teaching began more than a decade ago in the Science department at NOC in 2007. Teaching at NOC gives Brewer the opportunity

Phelps' family provides scholarships for Ponca City students

Ten \$1,000 scholarships will be awarded this fall to Po-Hi deserving graduates.

Ponca City High School (Po-Hi) graduates and Northern Oklahoma College (NOC) alumni William W. (Bill) Phelps and Dorotha L. (Susie) Bristow are amending their endowment to the NOC Foundation (NOCF) to begin offering scholarships to qualified Po-Hi graduates attending NOC Tonkawa this fall semester. Even though they now reside 300 miles south in the Dallas area they decided to give back to the community where they grew up.

The William W. and Dorotha L. Phelps Educational Loan and Scholarship fund, originally established in 2011 and amended in 2014 and again this summer, will now provide 10 (ten) \$1,000 scholarships to deserving students majoring in engineering or business. Recipients must be a graduate of Ponca City High School and enrolled full-time at NOC Tonkawa.

"We strongly believe in the mission of the two-year college and are excited to help those individuals who have the ability to be successful in the chosen fields of engineering and business," the couple said. "We are excited to provide Po-Hi graduates the same educational opportunities we had."

Bill and Susie met in the first grade and are 1956 graduates of Po-Hi and 1958 NOC graduates where they both received associate degrees, Bill in engineering and Susie in business administration. They continued their education at Oklahoma State University where both earned bachelor's degrees, Bill in mechanical engineering and Susie in business administration. Bill later received his master's degree in petroleum engineering from The University of Oklahoma. In 2017, Bill Phelps was inducted into the Northern Oklahoma College Distinguished Alumni Hall of Fame.

NOC receives grant for wind turbine

Northern Oklahoma College received a FedEX grant May 18 that will provide a wind turbine for the new NOC Wind Energy program.

NOC will receive a Primus Air Turbine, associated hardware, and a small cash award this summer for use this fall, according to Dr. Frankie Wood-Black, Pre-Engineering, Physical Sciences and Process Technology Division Chair.

NOC students in Wind Energy and Pre-Engineering will use the turbine for research projects this fall.

"This is an exciting opportunity as it is going to allow our students to have hands on experience with a wind turbine as well as be able to conduct real world studies and research," said Dr. Wood-Black.

The grant was awarded at the Clean Power Conference in San Antonio on May 17. NOC adjunct instructor Kathy Jackson attended the grant announcement. The announcement was also made on Facebook Live.

REpowering Schools (REpS) worked with FedEx to offer a research opportunity for university, college and community college students that will introduce them to the fundamentals of

wind turbine testing, evaluation, and validation through hands-on, experiential learning.

The project provides a small-scale wind turbine such as the Primus Air turbine, some testing equipment, and a small research grant to expand research capabilities at applying schools.

The turbines will be used for capstone or other research classes or through independent studies and renewable energy clubs during the fall semester of 2022. The specific learning objectives would focus on applied engineering with a focus on small wind turbine design and distributed generation.

NOC was one of four schools to receive a small wind turbine and associated hardware for which they are expected to complete a set of defined turbine operational characteristics and then conduct research of the school's choosing. Small research grants will also be given to support equipment purchases and/or staff/faculty time.

Results of research may be presented at a student symposium at the Distributed Wind Energy Association Conference in Washington DC, currently scheduled for late February 2023.
