Watkins has a Master's degree in Governance and International Development from the University of Antwerp in Belgium. He frequently presents on contemporary global issues and study abroad topics, is active in several global education associations, and has lived, worked, or traveled in more than 140 countries. Wade has taken more than a thousand students overseas on education abroad programs, in 40+ countries on all seven continents.

EXPRESSED OR IMPLIED THREAT

Threatening to commit a crime that could harm or kill people or damage a facility infrastructure or secured site



SURVEILLANCE

A prolonged interest in or taking pictures/videos of personnel, facilities, security features, or infrastructure in an unusual or covert manner



DIVERSION

Stealing or diverting items-such as equipment, uniform or badges-that belong to a facility



PROBING OF

Investigating or testing a facility's security or IT systems to assess the strength or weakness of the target



ACTIVITY

Operating or interfering with the operation of an aircraft that poses a threat of harm to people and property



BREACH/ **ATTEMPTÉD** INTRUSION

Unauthorized people trying to enter a impersonating authorized personnel



ACQUISITION OF EXPERTISE

Gaining skills or knowledge on a specific topic, such as facility security, military tactics, o flying an aircraft

ELICITING

Questioning personnel beyond mere curiosity about an event, facility

NOC participates in teacher incentive program

Northern Oklahoma College is participating in the Oklahoma Future Teacher Scholarship & Employment Incentive Program, which offers qualified Oklahoma students an opportunity to earn up to \$25,000 in scholarships and benefits as they complete their Education Preparation Program and teach in Oklahoma.

"This program is a win-win for Oklahoma students and schools as it will help future teachers fund their college education," said NOC Vice President for Academic Affairs Diana Watkins. "This program will help us keep these bright young people teaching here in Oklahoma school systems after they graduate."

The requirements include being an Oklahoma high school graduate, meet higher education admission standards at either a public or private Oklahoma university with an accredited Oklahoma teacher education program, or a community college with an approved articulation agreement with an accredited Oklahoma university teacher education program.

Students must also declare a major in an accredited Oklahoma university teacher education program with a degree leading to a stan-

dard teaching certificate, or declare a major at a community college with an approved "Inspired to Teach" articulation agreement with an accredited Oklahoma teacher education program leading to a standard Oklahoma teaching certificate.

Currently, NOC has 2+2 articulation agreements with Oklahoma State University, Northwestern Oklahoma State University, and the University of Central Oklahoma.

Also, the student must be enrolled as a full-time (12 credit hours per semester) undergraduate student each semester of eligibility in the program and maintain Satisfactory Academic Progress (SAP) and a minimum 2.5 GPA throughout matriculation.

Prior to entry into the "Inspired to Teach" program, the student shall agree to complete the Oklahoma teacher preparation education program and agree to teach in an Oklahoma public pre-kindergarten through the 12th grade.

The deadline for the program is Sept. 30.





Enid area law enforcement hold school shooting exercise

ENID, Okla. — Multiple law enforcement agencies from Garfield County and surrounding areas completed training this week on active-shooter emergency response.

The training, organized by Oklahoma Highway Patrol, with the help from instructors from Louisiana State University, was 8 a.m. to 5 p.m. Monday through Thursday at Autry Technology Center, with the law enforcement members going through classroom-type learning and different scenarios.


Enid Police Department Capt. Gary Fuxa, one of the instructors, said the training helped ensure members of law enforcement know how to appropriately respond to these types of situations.

"There's no one checklist or algorithm that's going to tell if a person is going to be an active shooter," Fuxa said. "It's a rare event, but they are appearing to be on the rise, and we're all going to have to work together to stop it."

On June 22, 2022 — less than one month after the Uvalde, Texas, school shooting — Gov. Kevin Stitt implemented Mission: Secure Oklahoma Schools (S.O.S.), saying as governor, he will do everything in his power and to the best of his ability to prevent mass violence in the state.

"That begins with planning, preparation, training and providing law enforcement and schools

with the tools needed to effectively do their job and keep our communities and schools safe," Stitt said in the executive order.

Mission: S.O.S. requires all state troopers of the Department of Public Safety to successfully complete DPS-approved and CLEET-accredited law enforcement active shooter emergency response training — and requires all CLEET-certified basic academies to include the same training — by Jan. 1, 2023.

CLEET-certified officers to be offered the aforementioned training by July 1, 2023.

training is something law enforcement agencies have undergone in the past, but this is a more "updated" version, said Lt. David Hellums with OHP's Troop A.

10 different law enforcement agencies went through the training, with class sizes of about

33 each day.

Attendees learned how to best respond to an active-shooter situation.

"How to get in there, stop the threat, treat the wounded and clear the scene is pretty much what we're teaching," Hellums said.

Volunteers from Northern Oklahoma College helped with the different scenarios, roleplaying as both victims, witnesses and active shooters.

Officers would be told of what was occurring The executive order also calls for all other and respond and, after completing the scenario, receive feedback on how to better respond entering and securing the room, locating and Similar active shooter emergency response stopping the active shooter, helping victims, calling in backup and more.

"We're always always trying to educate ourselves and the public, and to be better at serving the public," Hellums said. "It's something that Hellums, also one of the instructors, said about most officers will get behind, and ... they want to be there in case something like this happens."
