Originally from Ames, Oklahoma, Bert Mackie has been a mainstay in the Enid community for many years. His strong leadership skills and gentle influence has certainly made him the “go to guy” for many local, state and national projects. Over the years he has helped Enid become a better city with his extensive experience and knowledge in all areas of Finance, Public Utilities, Communications, Postal Operations, Health Care,

Education, Industrial Development, Local-State-Federal Government Relations, and vast experience in policy making, long range corporate strategy and making successful corporate business decisions.

Bert holds a Bachelor of Science Degree in Accounting and Finance from Phillips University, getting his degree as a non-traditional student. He later earned an Honorary Master of Law degree from Northwestern Oklahoma State University.

Bert Mackie continues his 50-year banking career with the same banking institution. He began his career in June of 1962 in the Bookkeeping and Proof departments of Security National Bank of Enid. He held positions in all areas of the bank before becoming President in 1990. Bert held this position until 2006 when he became the Vice Chairman of the bank’s Board of Directors.

He continues to hold this position. Bert Mackie is the kind of man most everyone considers a friend. He is indeed a friend to the Enid community. Many grants and funding would not have come to the Enid community without his leadership.

Mr. Mackie has served on numerous boards including: The Board of Directors Vice Chairman for Security National Bank of Enid, Asset Manager for the Hamm Financial Group, Director of ONEOK, Board Trustee of the Oklahoma Foundation for Excellence, Oklahoma Academy for Goals, Board of Governors of St. Mary's Regional Medical Center, the Garfield County Joint Industrial Foundation and Enid Economic Coalition, Northwestern Oklahoma State University Foundation Board, Northern Oklahoma Foundation Board Trustee and Enid Higher Education Council. Mackie is a past Regent

on the Oklahoma Regents for Higher Education and served on the Board of Governors for the United States Postal Service for 10 years.

Bert has been a strong advocate for higher education in Northwest Oklahoma and a leader in fundraising efforts for student scholarships, particularly through the Enid Higher Education scholarship campaigns. In 2011, Northern Oklahoma College formally dedicated their planetarium as the "Bert and Janice Mackie Planetarium". The Mackies have touched so many lives through their dedication, leadership, service, and support of the college, to higher education and to the Enid community.

Bert Mackie resides in Enid and is married to Janice. Together, they have two sons, Steven and David.



Extraordinary Nursing Faculty To Be Recognized With The DAISY Award® at NOC

Nursing faculty at Northern Oklahoma College may be nominated for The DAISY Award® for Extraordinary Nursing faculty.

The award is part of The DAISY Foundation's mission to express gratitude to nurses with programs that recognize them for the extraordinary, compassionate and skillful care they provide patients and families.

NOC Nursing Instructor Kim Brewer was awarded the first NOC The DAISY Award® in May 2022.

The NOC Nursing Division Chair, Dr. Nikole Hicks says, "NOC's nursing faculty and staff work tirelessly to ensure future nurses have a strong foundation to provide nursing care for our communities. It is an honor to partner with the DAISY Foundation to recognize our exceptional nursing faculty – past, present, and future."

Nursing faculty may be nominated by colleagues, peers, patients, families, or alumni. The award recipients are chosen by a committee at NOC to receive The DAISY Award which will be presented once year at the Pinning Ceremony at NOC Enid on April 30, 2023. The DAISY Foundation expanded its' flagship brand The DAISY Award for Extraordinary

Nurses to Academic Institutions in order to recognize the faculty who inspire compassionate care in their students and the students who demonstrate it during their education.

The DAISY Foundation is a not-for-profit organization, established in memory of J. Patrick Barnes, by members of his family. Barnes died at the age of 33 in late 1999 from complications of Idiopathic Thrombocytopenic Purpura (ITP), a little known but not uncommon auto-immune disease. (DAISY is an acronym for Diseases Attacking the Immune System.)

The care Barnes and his family received from nurses while he was ill inspired the creation of The DAISY Award for Extraordinary Nurses, an evidenced-based means of providing nurse recognition and thanking nurses for making a profound difference in the lives of their patients and patient families.

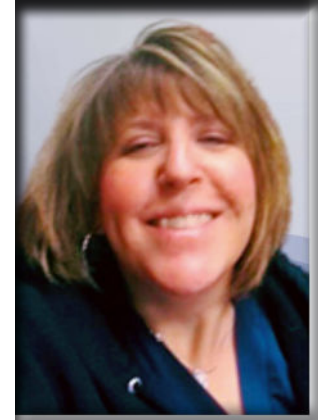

NOC Foundation Establishes Judith L. Whitmore Scholarship

The Northern Oklahoma College Foundation acknowledges the establishment of the Judith L. Whitmore Nursing Scholarship Fund.

Whitmore began her nursing career after graduating from NOC in 1990. After receiving her Bachelor's and Master's in Nursing, Judith began teaching future nurses where her nursing journey began at Northern Oklahoma College on the Enid Campus.

She started her Registered Nursing (RN) career at Bass Baptist Hospital where she worked as a surgical nurse at St. Mary's Regional Medical Center in Enid.

In 2011, she became a nursing instructor at NOC where she educated the next generation of nurses. She then moved to Tulsa, Oklahoma in 2016 and worked as a Legal Nurse Consultant at Richardson, Richardson, Boudreaux, PLLC, until 2020. She then returned to Enid and began working at Integris Meadowlake Behavioral Health Center as an RN until the time of her passing.

“We are so blessed to work with the family to establish a memorial scholarship in Judith's name,” said Sheri Snyder, Vice President for Development and Executive Director of the NOC Foundation. “Not only are they keeping her memory alive, her legacy will continue to live on in future generations of nurses in healthcare.”

Candidates must apply through the NOC Scholarship office and must be a full-time student in the NOC Enid Nursing Program. Preference will be given to applicants with the most financial need. Recipients must maintain a 3.00 grade point average.

NOC serves nearly 4,000 students through the home campus in Tonkawa, branch in Enid, and NOC/OSU Gateway Program in Stillwater. Of these students about 80% receive financial aid and/or scholarships. 75% of NOC students complete their degree with zero debt.

SHENANDOAH TO APPEAR AT THE NOC FALL RENFRO ENDOWED LECTURESHIP



The Grammy award-winning country musical group, Shenandoah, will perform at Northern Oklahoma College Tonkawa Thursday, Sept. 29, as part of the Renfro Endowed Lectureship Series' fall event.

This tour is their 35th Anniversary Tour.

The Shenandoah event is sponsored by the Renfro Endowed Lectureship Program and Northern Oklahoma College. The dinner will be held at the Renfro Center while the concert will be held in the Kinzer Performing Arts Center.

When country music lovers talk about the greatest groups in the genre, Shenandoah is always at the forefront of any discussion.

Fueled by Marty Raybon's distinctive vocals and the band's skilled musicianship, Shenandoah became well known for delivering such hits as "Two Dozen Roses," "Church on Cumberland Road" and "Next to You, Next to Me" as well as such achingly beautiful classics as "I Want to be Loved Like That" and the Grammy winning "Somewhere in the Vicinity of the Heart" duet with Alison Krauss.

The boys from Muscle Shoals have left a potent legacy in country music with more than 300 million streams, over 8 million combined album sales, and 13 No. 1 radio singles over the course of more than three decades.

Tickets may be purchased on a first come, first served basis for the event. A reserved table with seating for eight may be purchased for \$400, which includes full course dinner and concert with preferred lower section seating.

General admission tickets for concert only may be purchased at a cost of \$20 each. The concert begins at 7:30 p.m. Tickets are non-refundable.

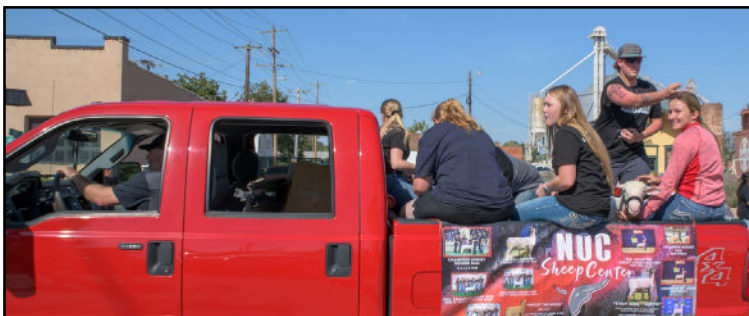
