Green's free throws lead to Lady Mavs win

Allison Green's two free throws with :02.1 left gave the Lady Mavs a 65-63 win over rival NOC Enid Tuesday night at Foster-Piper Fieldhouse.

The Lady Mavs (4-5) improved to 3-0 in conference play.

The Lady Mavs trailed the Lady Jets 29-27 at half but the Lady Mavs came out smoking in the third quarter outscoring the Lady Jets 26-14 to take a 53-43 lead heading to the fourth quarter.

NOC Tonkawa was in control leading 60-46 midway in the fourth before the Lady Jets rallied to tie the game at 61-61 with :51 left.

Green made two free throws with :36.4 remaining giving the Lady Mavs a 63-61 lead and after the Lady Jets countered with two free throws to tie the game at 63-63, Green drove to the basket and was fouled with :02.1.

The freshman from Kingfisher calmly nailed both free throws to give the Lady Mavs the two-point win.

Green led the Lady Mavs with 16 points while Jordan Holman added 15.

"Good tough win for us," said coach Greg Krause. "It's a good way to go into Christmas

The concert will be held in the Kinzer Performing Arts Center at 2 pm.

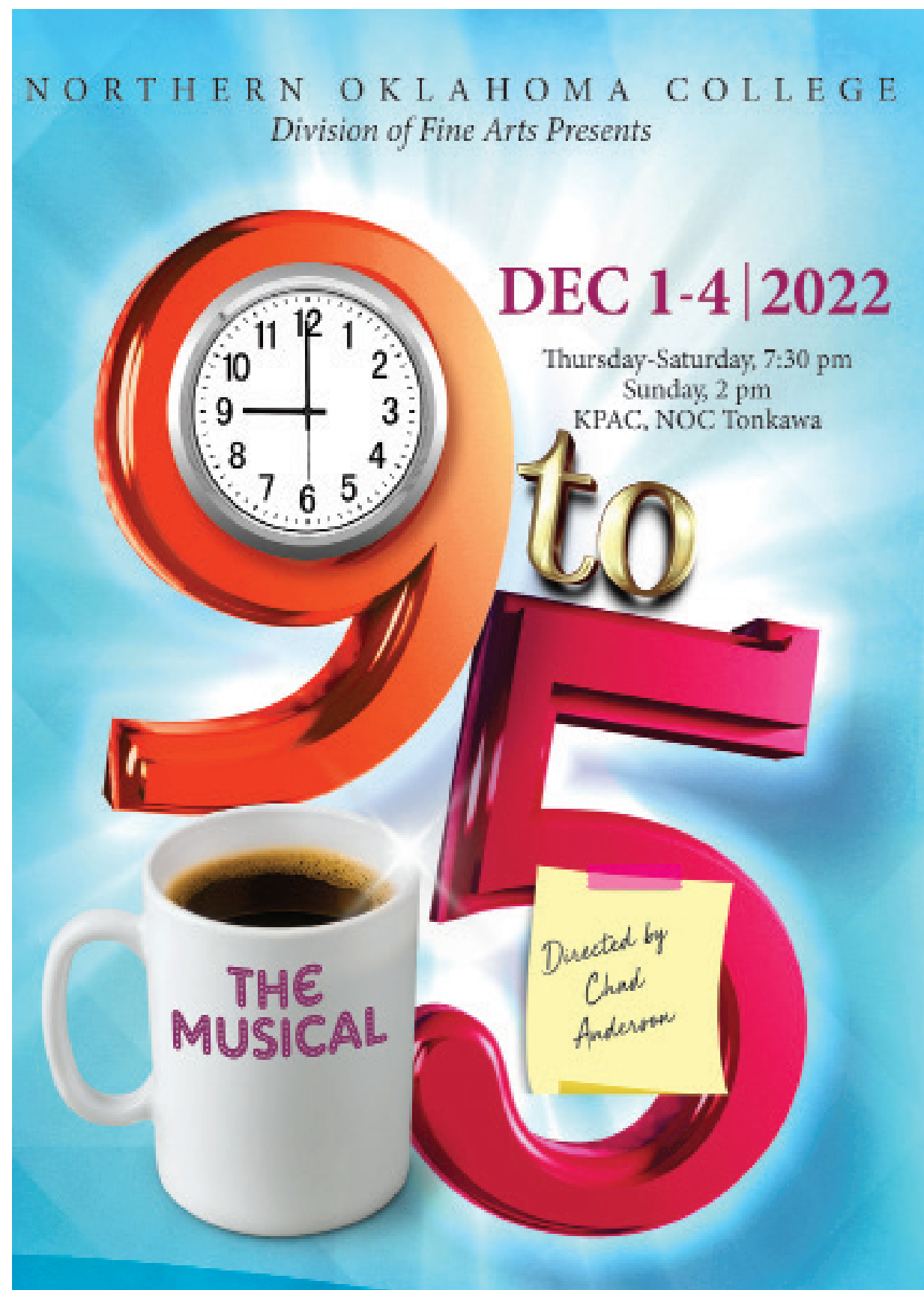

The NOC Livestock Judging Team will be recognized at the Oklahoma Governor's Mansion Tuesday, Dec. 6, after winning the 2022 North American International Livestock Exhibition (NAILE) Junior College Livestock Judging Contest in Louisville, Kentucky.

Team awards included High Team Overall, High Team Swine, Second High Team Oral Reasons, Sixth High Team Beef, and Seventh High Team Sheep.

In individual results, Cooper Thompson was the 7th High Individual, Blake Peterson was the 9th High Individual and 7th High Individual Beef, and Olivia Gerloff was 5th High Individual Swine.

Earlier this judging season, the Mavs won the October American Royal Judging Contest in Kansas City.

Coach Jennifer Bedwell said she is proud of this group of sophomores.

"When I took the position of livestock judging coach in March of 2020, I immediately began recruiting this group of kids," she said. "Hailing from all over the country, they are some of the most talented livestock judging students of their age. I am extremely proud of their success and I look forward to what the spring has in store for us."

Savannah Chenoweth broadcasting basketball on KAYE

Students in the NOC Mass Communication Program earn real-world opportunities outside the classroom to better learn their future craft.

Enter Savannah Chenoweth, a sophomore Mass Communication major from Perry. Chenoweth broadcast Mavs and Lady Mavs Basketball live on NOC radio station KAYE-FM 90.7.

Chenoweth has always shown an interest in broadcasting.

“My interest in broadcasting began when I was younger,” she said. “My mother would always have The Today Show on in the morning getting ready for school. I loved when Kathy Lee and Hoda would come on because their hour time slot looked so fun, and I thought it would be the perfect job. Then, around my freshman year of high school, I turned more to sports broadcasting. I would watch MLB Tonight with my dad and I realized that I could sit around like those men on the screen and just talk and analyze the sport of baseball as well, and the interest grew from there.”

Women have become more prominent in the broadcasting profession something Chenoweth has noticed.

“My broadcast role models are Holly Rowe and Jessica Mendoza. If you turn on the TV to any big sports game the chances are that the sideline reporter is Holly Rowe,” Chenoweth said. “She’s the one who interviews Tom Brady or LeBron James after a game, and seeing her on the screen made me realize that my dream could be a reality.”

“Jessica Mendoza played center field for Stanford University and is an Olympic Gold and Silver Medalist, as well as many other accolades. However, the reason she is one of my role models is because she was the first woman to be an analyst for Sunday Night Baseball. I had never heard a woman’s voice while watching MLB before she came along. Holly Rowe and Jessi-

ca Mendoza took a career field that is heavily dominated by men and showed women like me that we deserve to be a part of it too,” she added.

Though a rookie in actual broadcasting, Chenoweth said the nerves are starting to go away.

“I was nervous at first, but I think I’m getting the hang of it,” she said.

“The toughest part of radio broadcasting is remembering the names of opposing players,” she added. “Players get subbed in and out all the time, especially in basketball. The game moves so fast that you don’t have time to look down and see who has the ball. About halfway through the first half, I can start remembering who’s who. It is also difficult to call the game by

myself. I have to be a color commentator and do play-by-play at the same time. It can get difficult but I think it will help me in the future.”

Chenoweth said the easiest part for her is calling the game.

“I played basketball growing up and all through high school so I know the game well. I just tell people what’s happening as I see it.” She concluded. “I didn’t have to learn new terms or rules of the game. It also helps that the listeners can’t see so I can call the game at my own pace. If a play happens quickly, I have time to assess who did what and tell the audience in my own time.”
