Editor's Note: Dr. Mary Ann McCoy, Biological Science Instructor, Enid and Faculty Advisor for the Hispanic Heritage Club, Viva la Raza! recently interviewed Lucero Delgadillo, Sophomore, President of the Hispanic Heritage Club, Viva la Raza!

Q: Can you describe your experience at NOC as a Hispanic student?

My experience as a Hispanic student at NOC has been nothing but great. I have always felt that NOC thrives on diversity and continues to further promote that. I am really glad that I am part of the growing number of Hispanic students hoping to attain a college degree.

Q: Why do you think it is important to celebrate Hispanic Heritage Month?

I think it is very important to celebrate Hispanic Heritage Month because it provides an opportunity to embrace and celebrate a part of who you are.

Q: What does being Hispanic mean to you?

Being Hispanic is a very important part of who I am. My Hispanic Heritage has contributed to many aspects of my character and one of the most important aspects of my identity.

Q: Can you share about your own cultural identity? (What country are you or your relatives from?)

My parents are both from a small pueblo near Guadalupe, Jalisco, Mexico. Mexico is what contributes to my Hispanic Heritage and thanks to my parents, they have provided my siblings and I with its rich culture, language, and traditions. I also visit my family in Mexico every year, giving me the opportunity to further connect with my roots and relatives.

Q: What does this month mean to you personally?

To me, Hispanic Heritage Month is a month that allows Hispanic individuals to celebrate and further embrace their identity. Also provides the celebration and recognition of influential Hispanic individuals who have achieved and contributed great things to our society. Some individuals that I admire include Ellen Ochoa, Selena Quintanilla, and Linda Ronstadt.

Q: I know Selena and Linda Ronstadt, but I am not familiar with Ellen Ochoa. Could you tell me about who she is?

Ellen Ochoa is a former NASA Astronaut who became the first Hispanic woman to travel in space in 1993. Her Hispanic Heritage comes from her paternal grandparents who emigrated from Mexico.

Q: What are some traditions, celebrations, etc. your family participate in?

Many of the celebrations and traditions my family participate in include catholic celebrations or feast days that often take place in Mexico, making a small altar for Dia de Los Muertos (Day of the Dead) to honor our loved ones who have passed, Cinco de Mayo, and we also tune in to watch Mexico's Independence Day Broadcast every September 16th. I am fortunate to have a large family and I spend a lot of time with them both here in the U.S. and in Mexico. Together we often watch soccer games, have cookouts, and go to family celebrations like Quinceañeras, birthday parties, or weddings. We as a family also share a love for Mariachi.

Q: Regarding your family traditions, would you briefly explain what Quinceaneras is and what is the English translation? Mariachi?

A Quinceañera is a celebration of a girl's fifteenth birthday that symbolizes her transition from childhood to adulthood. Friends and family come together to celebrate. It's similar to a Sweet Sixteen. Mariachi is a form of regional Mexican music and one of the most important aspects of Mexico and its culture. It is a band consisting of trumpets, guitars, and violins, singers dressed in traditional charro suits – basically uniforms with short jackets, boots, wide bow ties, sombreros, and tight embroidered pants.

Q: On a lighter note: What are your favorite foods from your Hispanic culture?

Some of my favorite foods include: Tamales, Pozole, Tacos of any kind, Horchata, Flan, and Birria.

Q: Of course, I know and love some Hispanic foods, but I am not familiar with some that you mentioned. What is Pozole, Horchata, Flan and Birria?

Pozole is a soup made with hominy, pork, and

red chiles topped with shredded cabbage, salsa, lime, and radishes. Horchata is a slightly creamy drink made from blended rice, milk, vanilla, and cinnamon. Flan, I think, is known in the US as Creme Carmel. A custard with a layer of caramel sauce on top. Birria could be described as a meat stew made from either goat or beef meat and dried chili peppers. The meat is marinated in its broth made from a variety of spices as well.

Q: Finally, what was your reaction/response when you were approached about starting a Hispanic Heritage Club at NOC?

I thought that starting a Hispanic Heritage Club at NOC was a great idea and an opportunity for students to be a part of something that they could identify with. My biology professor, Dr. McCoy, voiced her excitement to see a growing number of Hispanic students in her class and that influenced the initiation of starting a club.

Q: The club name is Viva la Raza!. What does it translate to in English?

Viva La Raza! directly translates to long live the race, but is used as a slogan or saying to promote the identity and heritage of a group of people.

Q: What would you like to say to other Hispanic Heritage students at NOC about the club and why they should join?

Anyone is welcome to join the Viva La Raza Hispanic Heritage Club! We are a club all about the promotion of the presence of Hispanic students on campus with fun events and activities surrounding Hispanic Heritage Month, Dia De Los Muertos, and Cinco de Mayo. It's also a great way to meet new people and form part of a community here at NOC!

NOC students, faculty, and staff help package over 30,000 meals

A large number of Northern Oklahoma College students participated in a Stamp Out Starvation project this past Sunday at the First United Methodist Church in Tonkawa.

According to NOC instructor Dr. Kurt Campbell, over 55 NOC Students packaged 30,240 meals in a two-hour period. The meals are sent overseas to assist developing nations with food shortages.

Stamp Out Starvation started in 2007 by founder Monte Stewart from Cherokee.

It is a non-profit organization whose mission is to provide nutritious meals to people all around the world even in Oklahoma.

“We are able to accomplish this by organizing community and youth volunteer packaging events of Stamp Out Starvation’s highly nutritious meals,” Stewart states on his website stampoutstarvation.com.

Each Stamp Out Starvation food package contains six servings and each bag is prepared in

less than 20 minutes by adding the food package to boiling water.

Each Stamp Out Starvation food package is based off of a rice and soy casserole that is fortified with 21 essential vitamins and minerals, six dehydrated vegetables, and chicken flavoring. This soy (52% protein) and nutrient-rich formula reverses the starvation process.

Stewart organizes an assembly line of volunteers who add the meal ingredients to plastic bags that are then sealed and boxed for shipment anyplace in the world.

A number of NOC student groups, Methodist church members, and community members participated in the event.

The volunteers enjoyed lunch before the event, sponsored by the church.

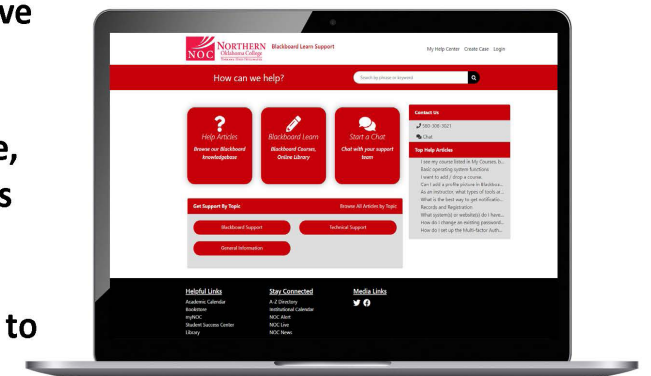
