If you or someone you know is graduating this semester, here is a helpful list of what to do to prepare for the big commencement! First you will need to get a degree audit with your advisor, then you will need to apply for the graduation commencement ceremony on your my-NOC account.

The application information will include your name and how you want it on your diploma, your NOC identification number, SSN, address and where you want your diploma mailed to, date of completion, year you will graduate, if you have attended other collages, and which campus you attended for most of your classes.

Cap and gowns will be in stock the first part of April. You will receive an email from the bookstore for instructions to pick up your cap and gowns, invitations, and other accessories.

May 2 will be graduation/commencement practice. The time is to be determined.

May 4 is official Commencement/Graduation ceremonies. There will be two ceremonies, Tonkawa's Commencement will be held in the morning, while Enid's Commencement will be held in the afternoon. Stillwater students may attend either campus. Times are to be determined.

Nursing students' pinning's ceremony times are to be determined for both campuses' commencements.

The group was split up into three teams, each with six participants on a team. These students mixed in from both years, as well as some alumni to join this film festival project.


