"We are really excited to celebrate the academic achievements of these students," said interim president Diana Watkins. "We hope that holding the pinning ceremonies on Friday evening will open up more time for our nursing graduates to celebrate with their families after they cross the stage and receive their diplomas on Saturday."

Chancellor Allison D. Garrett is the chief executive officer for the Oklahoma State System of Higher Education. Garrett leads a state system comprised of 25 state colleges and universities, 11 constituent agencies, one university center, and independent colleges and universities coordinated with the state system.

Garrett provides leadership on matters relating to standards for Oklahoma higher education, courses and programs of study, budget allocations for institutions, fees and tuition, and strategic planning. She is responsible for an annual higher education budget in excess of \$2.8 billion as well as the state endowment fund.

Garrett and her husband live in Edmond, Oklahoma. They have three adult children and two grandchildren.





Oklahoma Promise Day at the Capitol on Thursday, April 11.

Oklahoma Promise Day at the capitol

Students, faculty, representatives from Oklahoma's public colleges and universities, and other supporters gathered at the state Capitol today to show appreciation for the Governor, Legislature and state Board of Equalization's ongoing support of the Oklahoma's Promise scholarship program and to encourage legislators to continue to fund the program.

State Regents' Chair Jack Sherry and Secretary of Education Nellie Tayloe Sanders provided opening remarks during the event, and Rep. Cyndi Munson, Oklahoma House of Representatives; Rep. Arturo Alonso-Sandoval, Oklahoma House of Representatives; and Jeff Peters, chief of staff, Office of the Senate President Pro Tempore, spoke to Oklahoma's Promise students about the significant positive impact of the scholarship in their lives.

Oklahoma's Promise was created in 1992 by the state Legislature to help more Oklahoma families send their children to college.

"Oklahoma's Promise is a life-changing program that encourages students to dream, to prepare for college and to earn degrees," said Chancellor Allison D. Garrett. "More than 110,000 Oklahomans have earned the Oklahoma's Promise scholarship, covering tuition at a time when a college degree and an educated workforce have never been more valuable. We thank Governor Stitt and our legislators for continuing to keep the promise."

Nationally recognized as one of the country's best college access programs, Oklahoma's Promise is a transformational model that combines emphases on academic preparation and financial support for college. The scholarship pays tuition at any Oklahoma public college or university until the student receives a bachelor's degree or for five years, whichever comes first. It will also cover a portion of tuition at

an accredited Oklahoma private institution or for certain public career technology programs. The scholarship does not cover the cost of fees, books, or room and board.

Students must enroll in Oklahoma's Promise in the 8-11 grades. Family income may not exceed the following levels at the time of application: \$60,000 for families with onetwo dependent children; \$70,000, three-four dependent children; or \$80,000, five or more dependent children.

To receive the scholarship upon high school graduation, students must achieve a minimum 2.50 GPA in 17 core courses that prepare them for college and an overall GPA of 2.50 or better for all courses in grades nine through 12. Oklahoma's Promise graduates must attend class regularly, stay out of serious trouble, and avoid drugs and alcohol. A student's family income must not exceed \$100,000 each year the student is enrolled in college.

Students completing the Oklahoma's Promise program continue to be successful academically, with high school GPAs that exceed the state average and ACT scores that exceed those of non-Oklahoma's Promise students.

The college-going rate of Oklahoma's Prom-

ise students exceeds the state average for high school graduates. They also have above-average full-time college enrollment, persistence and degree-completion rates. In addition, Oklahoma's Promise college graduates are employed and remain in Oklahoma after college at a higher rate than non-Oklahoma's Promise graduates. More than 96% of Oklahoma's Promise graduates earning an associate or bachelor's degree remain and work in the state one year after graduation, and over 91% still live and work in Oklahoma five years later.

For the high school graduating class of 2023, over 7,000 students met the program requirements to be eligible for the scholarship. During the current academic year, more than 14,300 students are expected to receive the scholarship in college. Approximately 15,000 students are projected to receive the scholarship next year.

By law, the program has a dedicated funding source that helps ensure the scholarships are fully funded each year.


NOC Jets, Mavs sports update

Today, NOC Nursing is one program with three locations. The program expanded to the Enid campus in 1994 and opened its Stillwater location in 2002. Courses are delivered with distance technology from the teaching site to the other campuses. The program has maintained continuous national accreditation since 1972 and is fully accredited by the Accreditation Commission for Education in Nursing {ACEN) through 2030. Students are now admitted to the program every semester, and we will host our first December pinning ceremony this year.

NOC Nursing has established strong relationships with clinical facilities in our communities

and across the state. We have developed Academic Practice Partnerships at Integris Health nursing program at the Alumni & Friends Re- Ponca City, Stillwater Medical Center, St. Mary's Regional Medical Center in Enid, and Hicks said NOC Nursing was established in Saint Francis Health System in Tulsa. > NOC Nursing has exceptional faculty, including two Certified Simulation Specialists who lead our innovative simulation program. During simulation, students are immersed in real-life clinical situations with life-like computerized mannikins that have pulses, a heartbeat, and breathing so they can practice situations they may not encounter very often in their clinical settings but in a safe environment for learning. We received grant funding to upgrade our practice labs on each campus so students are better prepared for clinical practice when they graduate. The Student Nurses Associations on each campus actively provide service in our communities, and NOC Nursing is honored to be the Omicron Delta chapter of the Organization for Associate Degree Nursing Alpha Delta Nu National Nursing Honor Society, inducting our first full members in 2023. NOC Nursing participates with the DAISY Foundation to honor exceptional faculty members with the DAISY Award for Extraordinary on the Nurse Educators. Watch social media later this month for announcements showcasing this

year's nominees. The DAISY Award will be presented during the Nurses Pinning Ceremony in May.

NOC Nursing was named a Top 10 Nursing Program in Oklahoma in 2021 and is a featured success story for our educational partner Elsevier, from which we have resources that are fully integrated throughout our program to produce exceptional outcomes. Last year's nursing graduates achieved a 100% first-time pass rate on the licensure exam, and 95% of our graduates are employed as RNs within 6 months of graduation.
