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## Student artist reception Sunday

Art in Bloom —the annual Northern Oklahoma College student art exhibition is on display through May 7 in the Eleanor Hays Art Gallery in the Kinzer Performing Arts Center at NOC Tonkawa.

Visual art students Brooklyn Loney and Myra J. Mehojah of Ponca City, and MaeElla Seaboy Clift of Blackwell, planned and organized the exhibit as part of the requirements for a credited Portfolio/Gallery Seminar at NOC. Art in Bloom highlights the original art of these three artists along with works of other students enrolled in visual art and digital imaging classes during the 2023-2024 academic year.

Under the guidance of Audrey Schmitz, gallery director and art instructor, Loney, Mehojah, and Seaboy Clift gained experience in developing the infrastructure of the exhibit, including choosing the show title and collaborating with NOC graphic designer Paige Larson

on the poster design. The poster was inspired by 1970s motifs and fonts and details of each student's art is included in the floral design. They also prepared their own work to be exhibition-ready, produced artist statements and title cards and installed dozens of additional curated works made by other students, all as part of their professional growth as working artists.

"Overall, there is great diversity of media, subject matter and style in the works on view in Art in Bloom, and the student show is always the most popular event in the Eleanor Hays Gallery," Schmitz added. "This year we have added a 'gallery gift shop' of affordable art, making it a perfect opportunity to buy original work at great prices from talented artists early in their career."

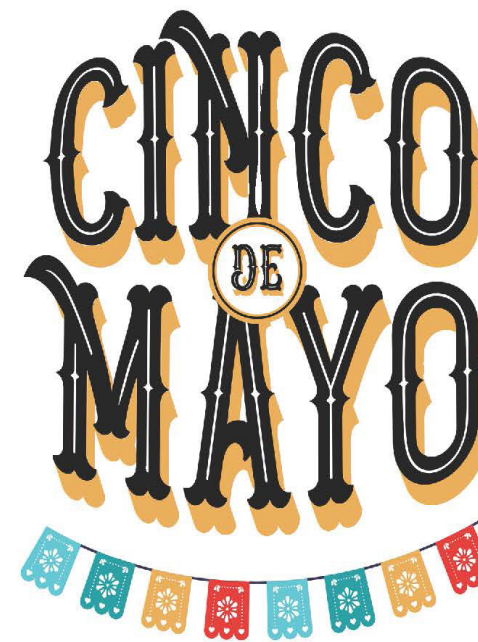
for scholars, and for stimulation of interest in continuing academic excellence."

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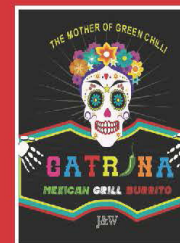

# Ruth Cole speaks at NOC Enid

Ruth Cole spoke at NOC Enid last Friday for National Autism Awareness Month.

Cole serves as Program Coordinator for the Oklahoma Autism Center's Early Foundations Model Site in Oklahoma City.

Cole provided a number of statistics regarding autism.

1 in 36 children in the United States suffer from Autism Spectrum Disorders (ASD)

- \* Environmental factors contribute 20%-40%
- \* Genetic factors contribute 60%-80%
- \* A younger sibling of a diagnosed child has a 20% higher risk of having ASD
- \* 20+ studies have disproven the myth that vaccines cause ASD
- \* Dietary causes have largely been disproven
- \* 1 in 3 children with ASD have a co-occurring functional disability and 2 of 3 have average intellectual functioning

Cole said there is no cure for ASD and all children diagnosed have some functionality affect-

ed. "It is truly a spectrum of different effects from ASD and that means that children have different needs to support those effects," she said. "It isn't one size fits all."

Children can have their relationships, self-regulation, communication, and social skills affected by autism.

She said early detection is the most important factor in better serving children with autism because the brain is still forming during those first years of life.

"The earlier we can diagnose ASD, the earlier we can treat it," she said. "If we can diagnose it at 18-24 months, we can provide better treatment and create better outcomes. Intensive early intervention helps alleviate symptoms and promotes a child to reach their full potential."

Cole said the keys to providing better out-

comes includes timely intervention, strong family participation in the intervention, children are included with peers in the community and school and parents are informed and able to effectively advocate for their child.

She concluded by adding that parents should take advantage of available services, create a team for their child, love the child for who they are, be a child's best advocate, have compassion for yourself and seek help, and connect with other parents who understand the challenges.

She holds teaching certificates in early childhood, elementary education, and special education with experience in early childhood

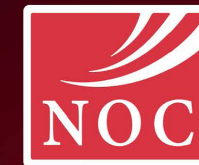
curriculum development, behavioral interventions, and positive behavior supports in general education settings. She is a leader in inclusive classroom practices and an advocate for children and families. Cole guest lectures for Oklahoma teacher preparation programs on topics related to supporting students with autism.

Cole was introduced by NOC instructor and diversity committee member Dr. Charmaine Munro.

The program was sponsored by the NOC Diversity Committee, Dr. Mary Ann McCoy, chairman.

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# Dr. Alyce Webb contributes to May Lillie documentary

Northern Oklahoma College Social Science Instructor Dr. Alyce Webb recently appeared on the OETA-TV Documentary “Back in Time,” OETA’s award-winning documentary series showcasing significant people, events, and stories that shaped the history of Oklahoma.

Webb contributed as an expert on May Lillie, the sharpshooter wife of Gordon William “Pawnee Bill” Lillie.

Together, the couple owned and operated Pawnee Bill’s Historic Wild West, an enterprise that traveled all over the country and to Europe to teach urban audiences what life was supposedly really like in the American west.

How did Dr. Webb become an expert on May Lillie?

“I did my doctoral dissertation on Pawnee Bill’s Historic Wild West, and since 2019 I have portrayed May at the re-enactment of Pawnee Bill’s Original Wild West Show every June,” Webb said.

“It is truly humbling to portray May,” she said. “May was indeed a trailblazer and paved the way for women to participate in what were considered “masculine” occupations. She pushed the envelope in so many ways for women at the turn of the century.”

May Lillie engaged in what many people of the era considered “masculine” activities, such as working for pay, traveling, owning a business, and shooting guns. To keep her actions respectable, she carefully crafted a public persona that emphasized femininity – she kept her hair long, always rode a sidesaddle, and pointed

out that her work and travel was only done to support her husband. Her plan was successful. She once won a shooting competition by hitting twenty-four out of twenty-five targets at a distance of 200 yards, in 1908 she became the first woman in the world to run a bison ranch, and she and Pawnee Bill celebrated their golden wedding anniversary in 1936.

Lillie’s skill in the Pawnee Bill Show paved the way for women to participate in rodeo and the

early western film industry during the 1920s.

Webb was interviewed for four hours for the 10-minute clip for the OETA program.

The documentary displays that Lucille Mulhall, May Lillie, and Lillian Smith were remarkable “Wild West Women” who broke gender barriers and impressed audiences in the late 1880s. Mulhall was known as the “First lady of rodeo,” while Lillie was an expert sharpshooter and trick rider. Smith set unbeaten shooting records and was Annie Oakley’s rival.

The program originally aired in July 2023.
