Hullet Family Scholarship increases awards to NOC Tonkawa students

The Hullet Family Scholarship Fund, established through the generous support of Judy Hullet Wear, Connie Mack and Pat Hullet, through the Northern Oklahoma College Foundation in 2016, has recently been amended by the family to award more scholarships and scholarship dollars to qualifying NOC Tonkawa scholarship applicants.

This permanently restricted endowed scholarship fund provides students from Oklahoma an opportunity to pursue their educational goals at Northern Oklahoma College on the Tonkawa campus. Applicants must be a full or part-time non-traditional student (20 years of age or older) with at least 12 credit hours and maintain at least a 2.50 GPA. There will be no restrictions as to a major of study in determining eligibility for this scholarship. The scholarship will be awarded annually by the scholarship committee with input from the Hullet family.

NOCF Executive Director Sheri Snyder stated, "NOC is grateful and blessed to have alumni such as the Hullet family who are continuing on their tradition and commitment to higher education and to their alma maters by providing scholarships to benefit our students." Wear, Connie Mack and Pat Hullet attended Northern Oklahoma College after graduating from Tonkawa High School in the 1970's. Wear was active in Student Senate, Phi Theta Kappa and ran hurdles for the NOC Women's Track Team.

Connie Mack Hullet returned to NOC as a dorm parent in Markley Hall and served as Assistant Dean of Students as well as Student Senate advisor for 20 years. His wife, Pat Hullet taught in the Social Science Division for over 35 years, serving as faculty president and scholarship chairman. She was one of the first distance learning instructors and developed online courses for World

Geography.

NOC's, Sage Wilcox, named New Century Workforce Scholar

Sage Wilcox, a student at Northern Oklahoma College, has been named a 2024 New Century Workforce Scholar and will receive a \$1,500 scholarship.

Wilcox is a sophomore from Crescent, Oklahoma, studying Digital Media Animation and Design at NOC Tonkawa.

This scholarship is the first of its kind to support students at associate degree-granting institutions on a national scale as they plan to enter the workforce upon completing a degree or certificate. The program is sponsored by The Coca-Cola Foundation and Phi Theta Kappa Honor Society.

"I am so excited and honored to receive this award," Wilcox said. "I appreciate the sponsors of the scholarship and Northern Oklahoma College."

New Century Workforce Scholars are selected based on their academic accomplishments, leadership, activities, and how they extend their intellectual talents beyond the classroom. Over 2,200 students from more than 1,300 college campuses nationwide were nominated. Only one New Century Workforce Scholar was selected from each state.

"We congratulate Sage for receiving this prestigious scholarship, and we are honored to partner with The Coca-Cola Foundation to recognize these outstanding achievements," said Phi Theta Kappa's President and CEO, Dr. Lynn Tincher-Ladner. "Scholarship programs like this are integral for creating opportunities for students to succeed as they prepare to enter the workforce and for putting college completion within reach."

"Sage stands out as one of the most gifted students I've had the honor to teach," said NOC Digital Media Instructor Brad Matson. "Despite entering the DMI program with

existing knowledge, she humbly embraced new methods and technical teachings, seamlessly integrating them with her prior skillset. As a result, she now possesses the expertise and talent to excel in her future pursuits."

"We are extremely proud of Sage," said interim president Diana Watkins. "Those of us at Northern were already aware that her talents extend far beyond our Digital Media Program where she certainly excels. It is wonderful to see those talents recognized by others as she is the only student in Oklahoma to receive this esteemed award."

The New Century Workforce Scholars will be recognized in the fall.

Ari Fleischer Lectureship

Former White House Press Secretary, President of Ari Fleischer Communications, and FOX News Contributor, Ari Fleischer spoke at Northern Oklahoma College about the state of politics in America and the upcoming 2024 presidential election.

His speech, entitled "The Daily Briefing: Fleischer's take on Current Events", was provided by the Renfro Endowed Lectureship Program. Approximately 375 guests attended this event.

In his political career, Fleischer said the most meaningful part was his time as President Bush's press secretary. "It was an amazing time for me personally," he said "I would drive to work, park my car, enter the West Wing and go to my office. My office was 30 feet from the Oval Office and 30 feet from the podium of the Briefing Room. I loved every day I worked for President Bush because I believed in him and what he stood for and I hope that was expressed when I did my job every day."

Fleischer said the press room at the White House is unlike any other. "There are 48 seats in the press room and they are filled with all antagonists," he joked. "They were all taking the other side than President Bush and it was up to me to deliver the president's message and I loved every minute of it."

He spoke fondly of traveling the world and seeing great places filled with amazing people.

"Being in Normandy (World War II Memorial) was definitely something I won't forget," he said. "The press secretary is afforded a lot of great opportunities and I am so thankful."

In regards to politics, Fleischer commented that the democratic and republican parties have changed over the years.

"People who used to be democrats (lower income, less educated) have now become republicans and those of higher incomes and better educated have become

democrats. It's fascinating what has happened in today's politics," he said.

"That is something we need to be aware heading to the 2024 election," he said.

Fleischer then spoke of the 2024 election which he sees will be very close.

"The election boils down to seven (swing) states," he said. "It's going to be a close race that can go either way." In foreign policy, Fleischer said the Middle East is the most important crisis for the United States going forward.

"We need to support Israel any way we can to defeat Hamas in Gaza," he said.

Interestingly enough, Fleischer was raised a liberal democrat in New York state.

"I walked into Middlebury College a liberal democrat and left as a conservative. I became a conservative the first time I paid taxes," Fleischer joked.

As a former White House Press Secretary, Ari Fleischer was the primary spokesperson for President George W. Bush and delivered the daily White House briefings from 2001 to 2003. He served as spokesman during the historic presidential recount, September 11th, two wars and the anthrax attack.

His best-selling book, *Taking Heat*, details his years in the White House and reached #7 on *The New York Times* best-seller list. His most recent book; *Suppression*, *Deception*, *Snobbery*, *and Bias: Why the Press Gets So Much Wrong – And Just Doesn't Care*; was released in July 2022.

Since leaving the White House, he manages Ari Fleischer Communications, a company that helps corporations and sports organizations with their communication and media needs.

He has worked for a variety of major companies and leading sports leagues, teams, schools, and individual athletes as well. He graduated from Middlebury College.





The Northern Oklahoma College Foundation Donor Recognition Dinner was held on Thursday, March 14 at the Renfro Center, NOC Tonkawa

During dinner, guests watched a slideshow highlighting the 2024 Donor Honor Roll, scholarships, along with activities and






NOC President Diana Watkins closed the program saying, "Thank you for spending your evening with us celebrating these wonderful students and recognizing the incredible generosity of our donors."




Thank - A - Thon





All About Roustabouts

How it Began

The Roustabouts were organized on the Tonkawa campus of Northern Oklahoma College in 1964 by Bill "Old Man" Heilmann, NOC Fine Arts Division Chair. The original group consisted of 15 singers primarily from Kay County, but also included students from all around Oklahoma. In 1967, the

roster grew and Mr. Heilmann started to institute a standard of consistency and dress for the members. The Roustabouts recorded their first album at Sound Studios in Oklahoma City in 1971, and a second album at Mercury Studios in Nashville in 1972. The trip to Nashville also saw the Roustabouts perform for a joint session of the Tennessee legislature. The Roustabouts called Wilkin Hall home throughout the 1960's, 70's and 80's. The success of the group and the buzz it created over the years led to the construction of the Kinzer Performing Arts Center in the mid-1990's. The state-of-the-art facility was designed to house musical theatre, classical performances, recitals and, of course, The Roustabouts.

Through the Years

The Roustabouts continued to build on the legacy set forth by Mr. Heilmann, including expanding the backing ensemble from a piano, bass and drums to include a horn section in the 1970's. Bill Heilmann was succeeded by his son, Dineo Heilmann who was also a Roustabout and NOC alum. Dineo led the group through the 90's and 00's until his retirement in 2014. He was originally supposed to lead the group for a year, but one year turned into 29 years. Upon his retirement, Dineo was succeeded by Edward Dixon, who led the band under the direction of Dineo since 2007. Since its beginning the Roustabouts have only had three directors. However, dozens of NOC Performing Arts faculty and instructors have shaped the group into what it is today. Pianists (Pam McNeal, Wilma Harmon and Linda Fiscus), choreographers (Mariann Cook, Mary Schmitz, Cara Kem and others), vocal directors (Donna Fath, Rick Edgington and Brandon Haynes), band leaders (Mike Moore, Paul Montomurro and Gray Smith) and technical director, John Michael Warburton, all spent years with the group under the direction of Bill "Old Man" Heilmann and Dineo Heilmann.

The World Traveling Roustabouts

The nickname "The World-Traveling Roustabouts" came about when the Roustabouts performed in Bucharest, Romania in 1974 and again in 1979. The Roustabouts spent three weeks in Romania and Soviet Union in 1982. The 33 member group performed in Moscow, Riga, Leningrad, and Bucharest. The 1990's saw the Roustabouts perform in the United Kingdom. In the 2000's, the Roustabouts performed multiple times aboard the Royal Caribbean and Carnival Cruise lines as they traveled throughout the Caribbean to Mexico, Grand Cayman, Jamaica and other ports.



Dr. Salazar-Lee joined NOC in August of 2023 and is


