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NOC celebrates 25 years at Enid

Northern Oklahoma College celebrated 25 years at the Enid Campus Wednesday afternoon with a cookout on the lawn in the center of campus.

"This event recognizes a long-standing partnership in our Enid area community between our outstanding community leaders and other educational partners who believe in the

mission of Northern Oklahoma College," said NOC President Diana Morris Watkins. "While the acquisition of Phillips University predates my time at NOC, I am familiar with and grateful for the efforts that many exerted to find a home for NOC in Enid."

She then provided NOC's history at Enid.

"To purchase the Phillips University campus,

NOC formed a partnership with the Enid Economic Development Authority and submitted a bid of \$5.3 million in April 1999. Of that total amount, NOC provided \$3.8 million toward the transaction while the Enid Economic Development Authority provided \$1.5 million for the Phillips University assets and the Oklahoma State Regents for Higher Education provid-

ed an additional \$800,000."

"Community leaders along with City of Enid administrators and elected officials saw the need for access to affordable public higher education options and were proactive seeking out Northern Oklahoma College to fill a gap," she

added. “Since 1988 when NOC first started offering classes at various locations around the city, over 15,500 students have taken coursework at Northern Oklahoma College Enid.” “I would like to thank the City of Enid Administration and our elected officials for not only helping us get started but also continuing to collaborate with a focus on providing higher education opportunities in Enid and Northwest Oklahoma. The work of all those involved in the process of creating NOC Enid has resulted in great dividends for Garfield County as NOC continues to grow and provide Life Changing experiences for students while they complete their first two years of college and earn asso-

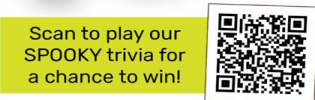

NOC reports enrollment increase

Northern Oklahoma College reported an increase in enrollment for Fall 2024 at the September Board of Regents meeting held Wednesday at NOC Enid.

The preliminary enrollment report stated at NOC has 3,126 students, an institution wide increase of 41 students. Concurrent enrollment is also up with 567 high school students taking courses at NOC, a 14% increase over last year.

NOC is also up 5% in credit hour production over Fall 2024.

The regents also approved a re-design of the school's website for the institution choosing Cave Interactive Media. The selection was made after a campus ad-hoc committee investigated three vendor finalists who submitted bids. Cave Interactive Media is the current website host for NOC since 2020 but was not the designer of the school's current site. The estimated launch of the new site is targeted for March 2025.

The financial report, provided by Vice President for Academic Affairs Anita Simpson was approved as well as the monthly purchases and monthly allocations.

Monthly purchases included NOC's Learning Management System Annual Review (Blackboard) at a cost of \$48, 715.00, Sheep Center pick-up truck at a cost of \$55,518.00, Kinzer Performing Arts Center Roof Replacement at a cost of \$164,700.00, and an upgrade of security cameras at NOC Enid at a cost of \$49,504.82. The security update, from deferred maintenance dollars provided by the Oklahoma State Legislature, would provide approximately 50 cameras.

Vice President for Academic Affairs Dr.

Shelly Mencacci reported that NOC received \$140,118.00 in additional money through the Native American Serving Non-Tribal Institution (NASNTI) Grant. The funding will be used to support three activities that will be woven into existing NASNTI objectives: leveraging texting services to strengthen student services; career and transfer coaching for students, faculty & staff; and resources for industry-standard instruction in Precision Agriculture.

Vice President for Development & Community Relations Sheri Snyder reported that NOC partnering with the City of Enid, David Allen Memorial Ballpark and Enid Public Schools have kicked off a the "All In Together" fundraising campaign to raise \$1.8 million for the renovation of Failing Field, the baseball field on the NOC Enid Campus. The upgraded facility would be used by NOC, Enid Public Schools, other area summer youth baseball and softball leagues and the City of Enid.

Jeremy Hise, Vice President for NOC Enid, reported that surveys on the OSU-TSET Pond Reclamation Project are completed and the majority of the surveys desire a walking trail and picnic area near the pond on the south part of the NOC Enid campus. NOC will apply for a grant to provide funding for improvements to the area this year.

Vice President for NOC Stillwater Dr. Marsh Howard reported that Stillwater students held a voter registration booth on Constitution Day with 20 students participating.

The next meeting is Wednesday, Oct. 16 in the President's Large Conference Room at NOC Tonkawa at 2 p.m.

NOC Enid hosts Professional Day

Northern Oklahoma College Enid, Stillwater, and Tonkawa students attended a Nursing/Pre-Engineering Day at NOC Enid's Gantz Center in early September.

The professional day was led by Dr. Frankie Wood-Black, Division Chair for Engineering, Physical Sciences & Process Technology and Dr. Nikole Hicks, Division Chair for Nursing.

Twenty-eight students attended the day long event, 18 from the nursing program and 10 from pre-engineering.

The professional day had three sections including Building a Success Plan, Building a Resume, and How to Incorporate Experience Outside the Classroom. The students also participated in group activities.

Northern Nursing students participated in afternoon sessions to learn resume preparation and interview tips from Cassandra Marlar, HR Strategy Manager at INTEGRIS Health and Terri Hummel, Nurse Recruiter at St. Mary's Regional Medical Center.

According to Dr. Hicks, "Northern Nursing is honored to be able to work with industry experts to assist our students in preparing for successful entry into the workplace."

Dr. Wood-Black said, "Northern Oklahoma College provides this opportunity to our students headed toward professional occupations to help them identify opportunities where they can develop the particular skills that will set them apart from other applicants. It is important to show the students how to what opportunities there are here at Northern and what connections they can make during their time here."

Dr. Hicks added, "This workshop exposes students to the idea that they are building a portfolio to prepare themselves for the next phase in their careers, whether academic or workplace. They can then be more intentional during their time at Northern Oklahoma College about taking advantage of opportunities to enhance their

portfolios.”

Famed author Dr. Elliot Engel reveals the life of L. Frank Baum and the reasons for the enduring and endearing fame of his "Wonderful Wizard of Oz," at Northern Oklahoma College on Tuesday, Oct. 22, as part of the Fall 2024 Renfro Endowed Lectureship Program.

Using anecdotes, analysis, and large doses of humor, Professor Engel brings to life this most fascinating of fairy-tale writers.

The event is sponsored by the Carl and Brenda Renfro/Renfro Endowed Lectureship Program, Charles and Virginia Starks, and Northern Oklahoma College/NOC Foundation. The dinner will be held at the Renfro Center starting at 6:30 p.m.

Originally from Indianapolis, Indiana, Dr. Elliot Engel now lives in Raleigh, North Carolina, where he has taught at the University of North Carolina, North Carolina State University, and Duke University. He earned his M.A. and Ph.D. as a Woodrow Wilson Fellow at UCLA. While at UCLA he won that university's Outstanding Teacher Award.

Dr. Engel has written ten books published in England, Japan, Turkey, and the United States. His mini-lecture series on Charles Dickens ran on PBS television stations around the country. His articles have appeared in numerous newspapers and national magazines including Newsweek. He has lectured throughout the United States and on all the continents including Antarctica. Four plays which he has written have been produced during the last ten years. In 2009, he was inducted into the Royal Society of Arts in England for his academic work and service in promoting Charles Dickens.

For his scholarship and teaching, Dr. Engel has received North Carolina's Adult Education Award, North Carolina State's Alumni Profes-

sorship, and the Victorian Society's Award of Merit. Most recently, he was named Tar Heel of the Week for his thirty years of delivering public programs in the humanities and sponsoring state and national literary contests for high school students.

Since 1980, Dr. Engel has been President of the Dickens Fellowship of North Carolina, the largest branch of this worldwide network of clubs. The sales of Dr. Engel's books, CDs, and DVDs have raised funds for The Great Ormond Street Children's Hospital which Dickens helped found in London in 1852.

Professor Engel continues to teach outside the classroom and give literary and historical programs throughout the world. He also presents assemblies at elementary, middle, and high schools, and his educational CDs & DVDs are used in classrooms around the country. In his spare time, he likes to imagine all the impressive hobbies and leisure pursuits he could mention here --- if he ever actually would find enough spare time to indulge in them.




