## November planetarium show Nov. 5

The Mackie Planetarium on the Northern Oklahoma College Enid campus will host the November Planetarium Show on Tuesday, Nov. 5 at 7 p.m.

November's show will present the night sky over Enid and show prominent constellations in the winter evening sky. Planetarium director Fritz Osell will also show known stars with planets and present some aspects of commercial resources available from the moon and asteroids and present novel concepts for space travel.

Osell said it has been 135 years since the Land Run of 1889 and will show how a new Land Run 135 years in the future may be a race to stake out claims and mine the resources on the moon and in asteroids.

The full dome planetarium show will take planetarium visitors into space by way of a space elevator.



The advisory boards meet annually with NOC instructors to discuss the changing workplace and how instructors can better prepare students for the future.



# Enid Hispanic Heritage Club explains 'Day of the Dead' and 'Altar'

Day of the Dead (Dia de los Muertos)

What is Day of the Dead? The Day of the Dead is a popular Mexican celebration that honors the deceased. It is celebrated on November 1 and 2 and originated with the Nahua peoples, who considered death a natural phase of life. It is a mixture of pre-Hispanic religious rites and Christian festivals. The dead are temporarily returned to earth and offered an altar with offerings. The Day of the Dead reminds us that death is a part of life and we should celebrate it.

What are its origins? The origin of this festivity dates back to pre-Hispanic times, since in the indigenous vision it implies the return of the souls of the deceased, who return home to the world of the living to live with relatives and eat the essence of the food offered to them on the altars. (It is said that after midnight the food on the altar no longer tastes and smells because the dead have already eaten its essence.)

#### Altar

Altars can have different levels, 2-step altars represent the division between Heaven and Earth. The 3-step altars represent Heaven, Earth, and hell. The 7-steps are the most common and relate to the 7 levels that a soul must pass before reaching eternal rest, it is also related to the 7 deadly sins. The 7 floors of the altar (the lowest floor being the 7th and the highest being the 1st). "The offering is the re-encounter with a ritual that summons memory."

What does the altar represent? The altar represents the vision that pre-Hispanic cultures had of death. The altar of the dead consists of several floors where the amalgamation (merging) of pre-Hispanic religions merged with the Catholic religion. According to the belief, the gifts placed on the altar attract the spirits to facilitate the journey from Mictlan (the place of the dead) to the homes of their relatives to enjoy a night of celebration.




