Human Trafficking lecture at NOC Enid

Human trafficking experts discussed efforts and strategies to hinder the on-going human trafficking issue at a community forum at NOC Enid on Oct. 30, at the Gantz Center.

Oklahoma Commission on the Status of Women subcommittee led by Dr. Nyla Ali Kahn. Other panel experts included law enforcement officers Matt Varney and Mike Hoskins. Varney is an agent for the Oklahoma Bureau of Narcotics and Dangerous Drugs Control while Hoskins, a former Oklahoma City Police Officer and human trafficking consultant.

The forum started with a video of a young woman who was a groomed by a boyfriend which led to a human trafficking situation. The panel then discussed human trafficking explaining the many scenarios that can lead to human trafficking.

Each year, several thousand Oklahomans seek the trap." help from human trafficking situations.

"The commission for over a decade has worked to provide Oklahomans with information on human trafficking by hosting summits, expert panels and webinars," Kahn said. "We have made recommendations to the state Legislature that have resulted in the establishment of an office to fight human trafficking through the state to recognize the first, second and third phases Attorney General's Office.

"The definition of human trafficking is the use of force, fraud or coercion in the exploitation of someone to obtain some type of labor or commercial sex act," said Matt Varney, agent in The forum was sponsored by NOC and the charge of professional standards of the Oklahoma Bureau of Narcotics and Dangerous Drugs

> The panel agreed most human trafficking in Oklahoma is not happening by people passing through on highways, but by members in their circle of trust, such as family members, friends or acquaintances, who entrap them into involuntary servitude through labor, sex or drugs.

> "People especially vulnerable to this are people pleasers, especially female adolescents or women," said Mike Hoskins, a national consultant on the subject. "They will try to become the boyfriend, groom them by spending time, attention and money on them until they fall into

> The Oklahoma Commission on the Status of Women is focusing on rural colleges, universities, CareerTech schools and high schools. Many victims are unaware they are being trafficked because it is typically a slow, methodical recruitment process by a trusted relationship.

> The commission is educating Oklahomans used by traffickers and empowering Oklaho-

mans to stand strong and say, 'Not Me, Not My Community' to the trafficker.

"We must educate Oklahoma teens, young adults, teachers and parents on how to recognize early signs of a person being targeted for human trafficking servitude," said Khan.

NOC president Diana Morris Watkins closed the panel discussion.

"We all agreed that bringing in programming to improve the safety and security of our campus communities is always a good idea. I'm

grateful to our dean of students, Ryan Paul, and NOC Enid Vice President Jeremy Hise for doing the logistical work to make this happen," said NOC President Diana Watkins.

The program is sponsored by the NOC Diversity Committee, Dr. Mary Ann McCoy, chairman.





ar was honored Oct. 31 at the NOC-Trinidad (CO) wrestling match as the men's program has been re-established at NOC along with the establishment of the women's program.

Fifteen former NOC wrestlers attended the event.

Zweiacher started the wrestling program at Northern Oklahoma College in 1968 and was the only wrestling coach in school history.

In NOC's very first year, the team compiled a 10-1 record and finished eighth out of 64 teams in the National Junior College Athletic Association tournament. Between 1968 and 1983 when the program was dropped, his teams finished in the Top 10 of the NJCAA seven times, including four Top-Five finishes and compiled an overall record of 118-37-2.

Five of his wrestlers won individual national Fieldhouse. titles, including Karl Lynes, a two-time junior college national champion who went on to become an All-American for Zweiacher's alma mater, Oklahoma State.

Zweiacher placed second at the NCAA Division I wrestling tournament at 167 pounds

Former NOC Wrestling Coach Bob Zweich- for the Cowboys in 1964. He was a Big Eight champion and a four-time letterman for the Cowboys.


In 1972, he was named National Junior College Athletic Association Coach of the Year and Zweichar was presented a plaque and signed inducted into the National Junior College Hall of Fame in 1983.

> For his contributions to the development a new wrestling program, he was honored with the Lifetime Service to Wrestling Award by the Oklahoma Chapter of the National Wrestling Hall of Fame in 2013.

State regents approve plan to meet Oklahoma's workforce needs

The Oklahoma State Regents for Higher Education voted Thursday to request an additional investment in public higher education to address workforce demands in our state's critical occupations. For FY26, the State Regents rethe FY25 appropriation.

high-demand fields remains the top priority for public higher education," said State Regents' chair Dennis Casey. "Our FY26 budget request reflects continued investment to meet growing workforce needs in STEM, education, and healthcare."

The State Regents seek \$9.3 million for FY26 to fund implementation of the Strong Readers Act provisions and expand concurrent enrollment.


Public higher education's budget request also includes strategic investments that align with Oklahoma's projected workforce demand in STEM (science, technology, engineering, and math) and healthcare and focus on increasing adult degree completion. The State Regents request \$42 million for critical workforce development initiatives, including funds to increase enrollment and graduation in STEM, nursing, and other healthcare disciplines and provide additional scholarships for adult students nearing completion of a college degree or pursuing an industry-recognized micro-credential or certificate.

"Consistent with our Blueprint 2030 strategic plan, this budget request builds on successful workforce development initiatives and supports continued innovation at our public colleges and universities," said Chancellor Allison D. Garrett. "Our primary objective is to produce more college graduates to address Oklahoma's evolving workforce needs."

The State Regents seek \$43.7 million in FY26 to fund performance-based institutional allo-

cations; strengthen college access and academic success services and FAFSA completion; expand student scholarships; fund innovations and efficiency initiatives; and enhance campus physical and cyber security. Additionally, the quest an increase of \$95 million or 9.3% over State Regents will advocate for institution-specific allocations of \$403 million to meet campus "Increasing college degree completion in needs, including system and structure maintenance projects, and fund strategic collaborations.




