

NOC names auditorium after Dineo Heilmann

Northern Oklahoma College named the auditorium inside the Kinzer Performing Arts Center the “Dineo Heilmann” auditorium on April 23 in Tonkawa.

Heilmann, the longtime college music instructor and Fine Arts Division Chair, taught at NOC from 1986-2017.

The plaque to be displayed in the Kinzer Performing Arts Center says, “2025 NOC Distinguished Alumnus Dineo Heilmann served Northern Oklahoma College admirably as a faculty member, division chair, and Roustabouts Director from 1988 to 2018.”

“A former Roustabout himself, Dineo built on his father Bill Heilmann’s legacy, continuing

the Roustabouts’ tradition of serving as ambassadors of the College, recruiting and attracting students to attend one of the NOC campuses. Thanks to his commitment, leadership, and vision, thousands of students have enjoyed being part of NOC’s life-changing experience.”

“During his thirty-two years of service to NOC, he remained dedicated to the students, faculty, and staff of Northern Oklahoma College and fostered the ultimate goals of higher education. The entire NOC community recognizes the meaningful and significant impact Dineo Heilmann made on our behalf.”

NOC graduation set for May 3

Former Oklahoma Governor George Nigh will address candidates for graduation at Northern Oklahoma College 2025 commencement exercises Saturday, May 3.

NOC Tonkawa candidates will march into Foster-Piper Fieldhouse on the Tonkawa campus at 9:30 a.m. on May 4.

That same day NOC Enid and Stillwater candidates will enter Briggs Auditorium on the Enid campus at 2:30 p.m.

Pinning ceremonies for graduates from the

NOC nursing program will take place at 7 p.m. on May 3 in the Kinzer Performing Arts Center in Tonkawa.

Nigh served as governor four times, first serving as the Oklahoma governor in 1963 serving an unexpired term and then later serving a second unexpired term in 1979. He then served two full terms from 1979-1987.

While a senior at East Central University in

speaking of his generosity to students throughout the years saying, “Dineo was always on the search for musical instruments better than their parents could afford. He was generous to a fault.”

President Diana Morris Watkins also spoke in honor of Heilmann.

Graduation

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1950, Nigh gave his first commencement speech to an 8th Grade class in Pittsburgh County in 1950. Since then, Nigh has never missed a year giving a commencement address now counting 76 straight years. He has given over 250 commencement speeches.

Nigh, a native of McAlester, Oklahoma, graduated from McAlester High School. After serving in the United States Navy, Nigh attended Eastern Oklahoma A & M College, now known as Eastern Oklahoma State College. He then graduated from East Central State College in Ada, Oklahoma in 1950. From 1951 to 1959, he alternated between service in the Oklahoma House of Representatives, and as a teacher in the McAlester public schools.

During his tenure in the state legislature, he introduced legislation designating "Oklahoma!" as the state song. He served as lieutenant governor of Oklahoma from 1959 to 1963. Taking office at age 31, he became the youngest state lieutenant governor in the United States.

In 1963, Nigh was sworn in as the 17th governor of Oklahoma for nine days, filling an unexpired term. He later served five days in 1979, serving another unexpired term. 1978, he was elected Oklahoma's 22nd governor serving from 1979-1987.

He later served as the president of the University of Central Oklahoma from 1992-1997. He also is an Oklahoma Hall of Fame Inductee receiving that honor in 1989.

The Nigh University Student Center at UCO was named in honor of George and his wife, Donna.

George and Donna Nigh also founded the George and Donna Nigh Leadership Academy held yearly in Oklahoma City for students planning a career in public service.

that the first naming request I received as president of Northern Oklahoma College was to name something after Dineo Heilmann. My first stage experience at NOC was as a junior high trombone player over in Wilkin as part of honor band with Dineo Heilmann. That's pretty cool."

Watkins added that signage will be placed at the KPAC in honor of Heilmann as well as the plaque.

"I'd like to thank my family, friends, and the fine arts division for coming out today for their support," he said. "I appreciate it very much, it's a great honor. I'd like to thank the (NOC) board of regents, administration, and whoever sent in the (recommendation) letter to do this, I want to thank you for making this happen."

The NOC Board of Regents voted to rename the auditorium at their February meeting.

He received his Associate degree from Northern Oklahoma College, his Bachelor of Music Education from Oklahoma State University where he was named Outstanding Music Student his senior year. He then received a fellowship to complete his Master of Music Education degree at Wichita State University.

Heilmann has been honored twice by the Northern Oklahoma College board of Regents, the first with a "Resolution" of outstanding contribution to music culture and the second he was honored along with his father with a "Resolution" for the 50th anniversary of the Roustabouts for "50 years of inspiring performances".

Heilmann, Class of Northern Oklahoma College 1982, was recently inducted into the NOC Distinguished Alumni.

Department of Commerce partners with NOC Enid to construct athletic training, education center

OKLAHOMA CITY, OK --- The Oklahoma Department of Commerce is taking steps to enhance the state's workforce pipeline by awarding the first-ever Public-Private Partnership (P3) incentive for Education and Workforce Development. Commerce is partnering with Northern Oklahoma College Enid to construct a new state-of-the-art Athletic Training and Education Center.

"A skilled workforce is critical for Oklahoma to be competitive on the national stage, and this new facility will make Enid a leader in athletic training education and sports medicine services," said Heather Turner, Deputy CEO of Commerce & Executive Director of CORE. "I'm proud of Northern Oklahoma College for stepping up to address the state's rapidly growing need for athletic trainers. This P3 award is just the beginning of Commerce's efforts to enhance and facilitate industry workforce development."

The new Athletic Training and Education Center will add 2,000 square ft. of additional space allowing more students to enroll in high-demand courses. It will also combine the classroom, lab and athletic training room into one centralized location, and equip students with modern, industry-standard equipment to prepare them for real-world careers in sports medicine. The new facility will benefit three area hospitals and Enid Public Schools. This project also provides additional training opportunities for nursing students, particularly in rehabilitation and injury prevention.

"NOC so appreciates ERDA Director Dr. Mar-

cie Mack for guiding us through the P3 process," said Diana Morris Watkins, President of Northern Oklahoma College. "From our own experiences in trying to hire athletic trainers, we are keenly aware of the need to grow the pipeline for athletic training students in Oklahoma. Through this partnership with Enid Public Schools, Great Salt Plains and St. Mary's, NOC will be able to offer a high-quality facility that will increase the number of athletic training and pre-health care students transferring to our four-year partner schools and supplying workforce needs in K-12 schools, colleges and hospitals across the state."

NOC is making a \$1.5 million capital investment in the project, which is expected to be completed in 2026. The P3 award from Commerce is for \$675,000. With the additional space and improved facilities, NOC projects it will be able to serve an additional 27 students in its Allied Health, Athletic Training, and Physical Fitness programs.

About the Oklahoma Department of Commerce

The mission of the Oklahoma Department of Commerce is to cultivate environments and relationships that foster economic growth in Oklahoma. In 2024, Commerce helped incentivize 274 businesses to open or expand in Oklahoma, leading to \$7.865 billion in private capital investment in communities across the state. Brian Baird

Brian Baird received his B.S.N. from the University of Oklahoma in 1986 and his M.S. from Southern Nazarene University in 2008. The majority of his nursing career has been spent serving special needs children in their homes and serving within the ICU. His work in the ICU included a nearly 14-year period at Hillcrest Hospital Cushing when it was named Cushing Regional Hospital and a stint at Mercy Hospital in OKC. In 2006, he began teaching freshman nursing students at Northern Oklahoma College; a privilege he continues to enjoy to this day.

Baird’s passion for teaching has been life-long and has been evident to anyone who has known him. He loves to use creativity in his approach and is known for his use of multiple teaching/learning methods. He himself loves to learn and wants his learners to enjoy the process as well. His use of simulation and gaming has earned him a lead role in NOC Nursing’s simulation

Region playoffs begin May 7

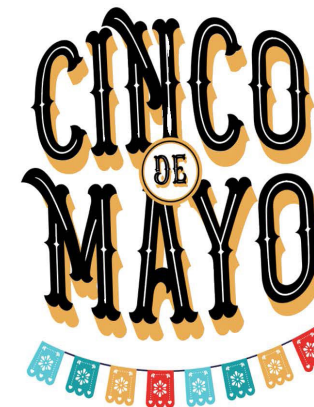
