Diana Hernandez, Garfield County Hispanic Coalition Chair spoke Oct. 29, as the first Northern Oklahoma College Speaker Series for 2025-26.

Hernandez spoke on "Carrying the Baton, Preserving Legacies, Building Futures: Empowering Communities Through Heritage," at the Gantz Center at NOC Enid.

"This is a historic time in the Hispanic Community and I am experiencing a lot of joy in seeing the community come together," Hernandez said. "Being able to partner with the Hispanic Community in carrying the baton in preserving legacies and building futures."

"I titled this presentation, 'Carrying the Baton,' because I wanted to explain what the Hispanic heritage meant to me. One morning in May 1999, I was prepping for a big game at Garfield Elementary as a 5th grader. I love sports, I was very competitive so I was the 4th leg of my relay race and I remember tying my shoes and I could feel my heartbeat thinking about the pressure of those running before me and how I wanted to make them proud."

"I received the baton and my teammates were saying, 'Go, Diana, go!" "I ran that race but I stand before you today still running the race," she said. "I realized that I was one of many who in past generations who have run the race and I am proud to represent them as I stand before you today."

Hernandez then explained her Mexican Heritage and Hispanic Heritage in general. She said there are 26 Latino and two Hispanic countries. She explained that all these countries have passed down their art and cultures from the past and continue to do that today.

She also talked about preserving legacies. Hernandez is from southwest Mexico and she said the main occupations are fishing, farming, and tourism. She added the land is beaches, mountains, and valleys with plenty of cultural festivals. She spoke of her mother and grandmother who passed on her legacy of resilience, sacrifice, and dedication.

"It was their legacy to run the race," she said. Hernandez was born and raised in the United States but as she said, "In some ways I am neither from here or there but in some ways both. I've lived in between. I love the land I was not born in but I also loved putting my hand over my heart and pledging allegiance to the flag at school."

"Immigrant children born in the United States live in two worlds," she said. "Mexico culture at home and American culture at school. I was the fourth runner in our family relay and past generational sacrifice of trying to live a better life and intentionally pass that heritage on for future runners."

"My heritage is so valued because in order to pass that on to the next generation, we have to come and let go of family in order to have an opportunity at a better life, we do that for our grandchildren," she said. "But we never lose track of our heritage."

Hernandez said her family had a great opportunity to go back and see her grandmother who lived a simple but gratifying life," she said.

"Her bathroom was a system that flushed into a stream which made us think when we used to swim in the stream," she joked.

"We want an area where Hispanic communities belong," she added.

"I hope we can continue to hold the baton

and run the race for our community, honoring those who came before us and passing that on to those who come after," she said. "We are trying to strengthen community values again for those who come in the future."

NOC President Diana Morris thanked Hernandez for speaking to NOC students.

"Thank you for telling us about those who started the race and who continue to carry the baton and intentionally pass it forward," she said.
