Business division offers tax service

Northern Oklahoma College Tonkawa is providing free basic income tax return preparation for students, NOC employees, and area residents starting Feb. 12 at NOC Tonkawa.

Singles or families making less than \$75,000 per year qualify for the free service.

Trained tax preparers from the NOC Business Division and area volunteers will be available for tax assistance beginning on specific Thursdays starting Feb. 12. Taxpayers also have an option to prepare their own basic federal and state tax return using the free e-filing software.

Cara Beth Johnson, Business division chair said, "This is a great opportunity for our students to provide a community service and gain tax preparation experience."

The Cultural Engagement Center (CEC) is

hosting the Volunteer Income Tax Assistance (VITA) program Feb. 12, Feb. 26, March 12, March 26, and April 9. The CEC is located in the Vineyard Administration/Library building.

Interested parties need to bring a photo ID for all filers; Social Security cards and birthdates for taxpayer, spouse, and dependents; W-2 forms; 1099 forms; receipts for childcare costs, education expenses, and other deductions; checking account and routing number for refund; and 1095-A, -B, or -C healthcare coverage or exemption.

A Weekly Portal to the North Oklahoma Sky

This Week's Viewing Conditions:

The Moon: The Moon is still waxing, gaining in brightness until the full Moon on February 1. Then it will start to wane; if the weather holds out, it will be difficult to see some of the dimmer stars.

Weather: Check the forecast! Clear, cold nights are the best for “seeing” as atmospheric stability is often higher in the winter, making the planets look incredibly sharp. The brightness of the Moon is going to hinder our view.

Highlights for the Week of Friday, Jan. 30 – Feb. 6, 2026

This Week – The full Moon on the first is called the “Snow Moon.” This is because it typically coincides with the heaviest, most abundant snowfall of the year in North America. It may also be referred to as the Hunger Moon as it occurs during the lean time of the year. However, the Moon is still our guide, as Jupiter and the Moon will appear very close on Jan. 30 and 31. Additionally, in North America, we will witness the “Regulus Occultation”: the Moon will pass directly in front of Regulus, the brightest star in Leo, making it disappear.

During the week, 45 to 60 minutes before sunrise, you should be able to spot the planets Venus and Mercury, while Mars and Saturn will be visible in the south-southeast as dawn approaches. Mars will be in the constellation Libra, and Saturn will be in Ophiuchus.

Special Note: The four-astronaut crew, Reid Wiseman, Victor Glover, Christina Koch, and Jeremy Hansen, for the Artemis II mission began their quarantine on Jan. 23, 2026. Current reports indicate the mission launch will be no earlier than Feb. 6, 2026. This is scheduled as a 10-day Moon flyby during which the astronauts will test various operations of the Orion capsule.

Astronomical Notes


The constellation Ophiuchus, the “Serpent Bearer”, is not one of the traditional signs of the zodiac. In Greek Mythology, Ophiuchus represents Asclepius, the Greek god of medicine, healing, and rejuvenation. Asclepius is said to have discovered the secret to immortality by watching a serpent, hence the large snake in the constellation.

Pro Viewing Tip

For early morning viewing this week, you want to allow your eyes to adjust so that you can pick out the planets in the east and south-southeast. You will want to keep the Moon at your back so that you can adjust to the increasing light as dawn approaches. Remember, never look directly into the Sun.

Our guys have punched the card since day one, we want to win in everything we do and they have done that. It’s always interesting going into a year with a

new coaching staff but our guys have embraced it.”

“Our offense will be a staple of our program,” he said. “We will be to score in multiple ways, we avoid being a one-dimensional offense. We have some guys that can play the game a little bit. Coach Jeff Ray is starting his second season at NOC. The Mavs were 24-31 last season.

"I'm not quite sure what to expect this season," Ray said. "It all hinges on team chemistry when we get into conference play and how quickly some of these freshmen get rolling. We have all the talent and depth needed to compete for a region title, but it's all about who's playing together and for each other down the stretch."

Ray said depth is a strength of the 2026 Mavs.

The NOC Enid Jets open play for 2026 on Tuesday when the Jets host Rose State at 2 p.m.

The Jets, 43-18 in 2025, are coached by Ryan Bay. Bay is in his third season at NOC Enid.

Bay likes the make-up of his squad as the Jets progressed through the fall schedule to prep for the 2026 season.

"I like the overall make-up of our team," Bay said. "The players are working hard to improve daily and have bought in to the things we need to do in order to be successful this spring."

What are the strengths of the 2026 Jets?

"We are balanced, physical, very versatile on offense that have the ability to score runs in bunches or grind out innings and manufacture runs when the pitching matchup and/or weather conditions call for it," Bay said. "We also

have a little more depth on the mound than last year although roles on the mound will continue to get sorted out probably all the way to region play."

Who are some players to watch in 2026?

"We value versatile players and we have several," Bay said. "We'll move guys around early in the season to establish our best line-up by region play. Look for Noah Smith and Lucas Dunn to play a lot at 3B and 1B, with Lucas getting some time at 2B as well. We've got some talented freshman up the middle in Jake Ervin, Brock Boddie, Gunner Sattler with transfer Cade Christensen possibly getting in the mix there as well as playing some outfield.
