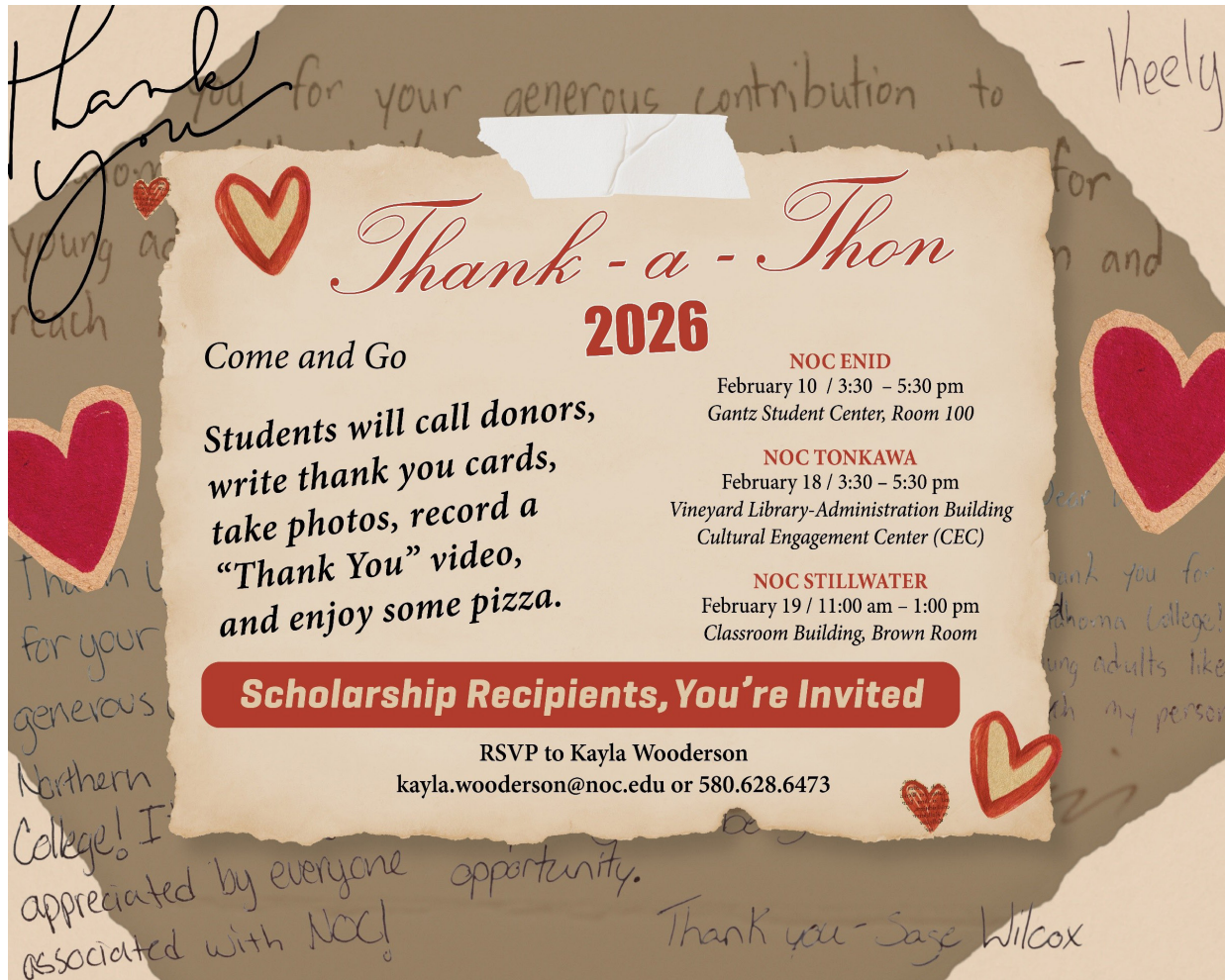

NOC Piano Re-dedication set for Feb. 15 in the KPAC

Northern Oklahoma College and Tonkawa's extended artistic community are invited to celebrate the rebuilding, return, and re-dedication of NOC's 9-foot Steinway D concert grand piano during a free concert on Sunday, Feb. 15, 2026, inside the Dineo Heilmann Auditorium at the Kinzer Performing Arts Center.

Local favorite Jerry Steichen and Tulsa native Cathy Venable will join forces to present a special four-hand piano concert demonstrating the power, flexibility, and virtuosity of the newly refurbished instrument. Doors open at 7 p.m., with the concert beginning at 7:30 p.m.

NOC's 9-foot Steinway concert grand piano has long been a crown jewel of the Kinzer Performing Arts Center since the facility first opened. After more than 25 years of constant use, the instrument was in need of extensive care and maintenance.

"Thanks to the tireless efforts of Emeritus Fine Arts Chair Dineo Heilmann, along with the leadership of President Diana Morris, Vice President for Financial Affairs Anita Simpson, the NOC Fine Arts Division, NOC's Board of Regents, and countless community arts supporters, NOC was able to commit to the refurbishment of this grand instrument," Steichen said.

According to Steichen, the Steinway Company transported the piano in July to its facility in New York, where it underwent a comprehensive restoration. The refurbishment included new tuning pins, strings, hammer action, and felts. The piano's case was sanded and refinished to its original luster, lettering was replaced, and the interior was completely cleaned.

"What gives each grand piano its unique sound is the relationship between the wooden soundboard — the 'soul' of the piano — the

iron plate that bears 18 to 20 tons of string pressure, and the wooden outer frame, which is carefully aged before assembly," Steichen explained. "All of these essential elements were preserved in NOC's piano. It is still our piano — but now with a new and greatly extended life expectancy."

The piano was delivered back to NOC in early January. Steichen noted that newly restored pianos require time to "settle back in" to their environment, followed by repeated tunings and mechanical adjustments before reaching optimal performance condition.

The Feb. 15 program will include Gabriel Fauré's evocative *Dolly Suite*, a four-hand sona-

Ben Johnson statue unveiling at Pickens learning Common Feb. 18

A statue for famed actor and rodeo cowboy Ben Johnson will be unveiled on Wednesday, Feb. 18 at Northern Oklahoma College Tonkawa.

Johnson's statue, created by sculptor John Dale Free, Sr. and painted by Yatika Starr Fields will be unveiled at the Pickens Learning Commons in the Vineyard Library/Administration Building on Feb. 18, from 12:30 p.m. – 2 p.m. with brief remarks at 1 p.m. The event is free to the public. The event will be livestreamed by NOC.

The art is sponsored by the Hugh and Dr. S.J. Pickens Museum.

Ben Johnson

A native of Foraker, Oklahoma, Johnson was an American film and television actor, stuntman, and world-champion rodeo cowboy. Johnson brought authenticity to many roles with his droll manner and expert horsemanship. The son of a rancher, Johnson arrived in Hollywood to deliver a consignment of horses for a film. He did stunt-double work for several years before breaking into acting with the help of director John Ford. Johnson also operated a horse-breeding ranch throughout his career. Although he said he had succeeded by sticking

to what he knew, shrewd real estate investments made Johnson worth an estimated \$100 million by his later years.

John Dale Free, Sr.

Born in Pawhuska in 1929, John Dale Free grew up on his grandfather's ranch near McAlester, Oklahoma. There, he earned a lifelong admiration of cowboys and the ranching lifestyle. By 1971 he had his first one-man show at the National Cowboy Hall of Fame (now the National Cowboy and Western Heritage Museum) in Oklahoma City and was becoming recognized for his talent. Many of his creations depicted American Indian subjects, reflecting his Osage/Cherokee heritage. In 1981 Free founded the Bronze Horse Foundry, a fine arts bronze foundry, to provide himself and others a convenient facility for casting their sculptures. This successful enterprise continued into the twenty-first century as a family business under the management of John Dale Free, Jr.

Yatika Starr Fields

Yatika Starr Fields, is a Painter and Muralist. While attending the Art Institute of Boston

Fields has spent the last decade on the East Coast, New York City and most recently Seattle where the energy of urban life inspires and feeds the creative force in his artwork. He seeks to influence his viewers to rethink and reshape their relationships to the world around them. His canvasses and Murals

are alive with movement and filled with images that rely on vibrant colors and swirling patterns to build narratives that carry the eye.

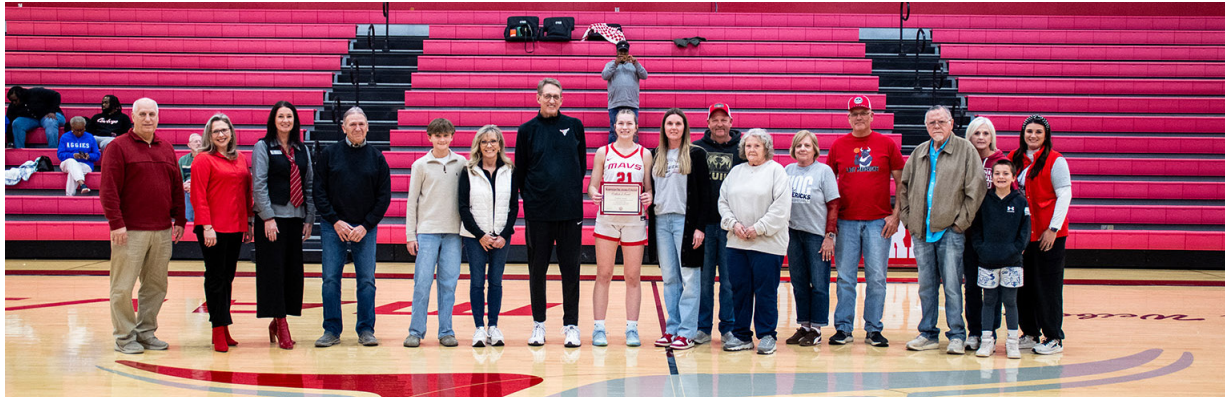

Courtlyn Traxler named Leo Canaday Memorial Scholarship winner

The Leo Canaday Memorial Scholarship was awarded to Maverick Women's Basketball Player Courtlyn Traxler as the recipient for the 2026-27 academic year.

Traxler is a freshman Biological Science/Pre-med major from Tuttle, Oklahoma.

Leo Canaday attended Northern Oklahoma Junior College in 1954 and was a member of the Maverick Football team. Leo returned to NOJC in 1963 where he served as Athletic Director and Physical Education Department Chairman for 30 years, retiring in 1993. While at Northern he coached football, men's and women's basketball, track, tennis and golf. His women's basketball teams won seven conference championships, one regional championship, a 3rd place finish at the 1975 National Tournament and were National Champions in 1979. He was named conference Coach of the Year seven times, and was named Regional and National Coach of the Year in 1979. In 2004 he was honored with the Northern Oklahoma College Distinguished Alumni Award.

Following his death in 2004, the Leo Canaday Memorial Scholarship was established by

Leo's wife Pat. Through the generous support of family and friends, this scholarship provides students an opportunity to pursue their educational goals at Northern Oklahoma College in Tonkawa.

Representing the Canaday family for the presentation were Leo's daughter, Vicki Canaday Hardesty and husband Allen, and their grandson Leo Hardesty.

Assisting the Canaday family in the scholarship certificate presentation were NOC President Diana Morris, Vice President for Development and Community Relations and Foundation Executive Director Sheri Snyder, NOC Athletic Director Alan Foster and Lady Maverick's Head Coach Greg Krause.

Traxler was joined on the court by her parents, Jennifer and Billy Traxler; Grandparents Mark and Tonna Shoffit, and Jack and Barbara Traxler, Sister-in-law and nephew Nicole Traxler and Wyatt Traxler, and her Aunt Rhonda Walker.

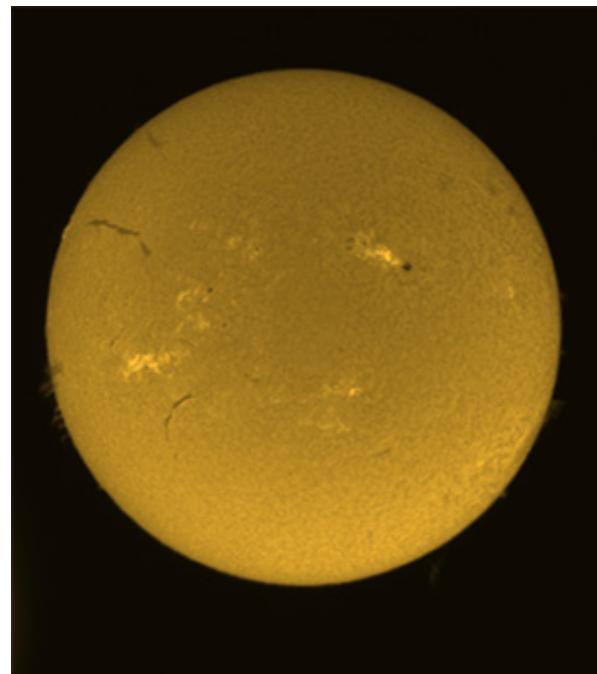
This Week's Viewing Conditions:

The Moon: The Moon is waning. It is going to drop from its current 80.4% illumination to less than 18% by the end of the week. This is going to make viewing easier as the dimmer stars will now be visible.

Weather: Check the forecast! The next week is going to be fairly temperate making it easier to spend time outside. While there are some clouds predicted it should be relatively clear. A good week for viewing.

Highlights for the Week of Friday, Feb. 6 to Feb 13, 2026

This Week – The planets are going to put on a parade this week. If you look to the southwest just after sunset, you will be able to see Venus. Mercury is going to be close by and will climb higher each night, with Saturn close by. Jupiter which has been prominent for the past few weeks is still with us, and will be easy to spot. Neptune and Uranus are also visible as well. Using Venus and Jupiter as markers, the planets will line up with Mercury closer to Venus, Saturn and Neptune will be side-by-side and Uranus will be closer to the star Aldebaran.



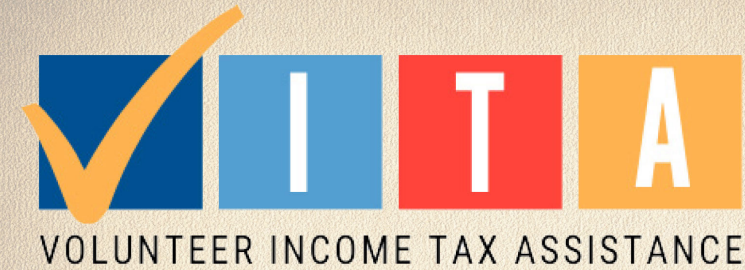
The constellation of Orion will be between Uranus and Jupiter.

Astronomical Notes

This planetary parade allows us to see the "Line of the Ecliptic." All of the planets in the solar system lie roughly on the same plane, much like the rings around the planet Saturn. This week you can see how all the planets line up giving us a clear view of the plane.

This Week's Mission: The Planetary Colors

Take some time to view the “colors” of the planets in the solar system. Are they the same color? The colors of the planets tell us something about their atmospheres. Venus tends to appear brilliant white, as it has a thick cloudy atmosphere. Saturn tends to appear pale-yellow or gold, while Jupiter has a creamy color.

Pro Viewing Tip

For this week, it is best to start your viewing as soon as the sun drops below the horizon, as that will give you the markers of Venus and Mercury. As the sky darkens you can find the other planets.
